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<p>2014 Communities</p> <p>Big Lottery Fund</p> <p>Building a lasting legacy for communities across Scotland</p>	<p>Are you eligible?</p> <p>We will offer grants to sports clubs, voluntary and community organisations, community councils and schools. Branches of a larger organisation may be eligible to apply, but we will request the written support of the larger organisation in the event of an offer. Branches that are independent can apply in their own right. Groups can only apply for one grant in a 12 month period, with decisions made within 15 working days. Further information on how to apply can be found in page 8 of the</p> <p>Summary of the programme</p> <p>Glasgow is hosting the 2014 Commonwealth Games and the Big Lottery Fund Scotland wants to ensure that we are providing support to groups who want to benefit from this once in a lifetime opportunity for people and communities across Scotland.</p> <p>To do this BIG has developed a new funding programme, 2014 Communities, which is focused on building a legacy of well-being before and beyond the Commonwealth Games. 2014 Communities is a micro grant programme aimed at grass roots sports and community organisations. Through the programme BIG hopes to encourage more people to take part in sport or physical activity, and to increase the numbers of those volunteering in sport or physical activity, and to bring communities together through sport and volunteering.</p>	<p>What is 2014 Communities grants programme?</p> <p>2014 Communities is a new micro grants programme, offering local sports clubs, voluntary and community organisations, community councils and schools grants of £300 to £1,000 to support and stimulate grass roots involvement in sport and physical activity. In year one of the programme, Big Lottery Fund has £0.5 million to award in grants. 2014 Communities will continue to operate up to the Glasgow Commonwealth Games in 2014, but what we focus our funding on and how we deliver our funding may change based on learning leading up to 2014.</p> <p>We would like the projects we fund to reach people who are less likely to take part in sport or physical activities. 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<p>Investing In Ideas (Big Lottery Fund) Up to £10,000</p> <p>Who can apply for an Investing in Ideas grant?</p> <p>A range of organisations can apply, including voluntary and community sector groups, social enterprises, charities, local authorities and health bodies, companies limited by guarantee and community councils. However, we will prioritise smaller voluntary and community groups with an income of less than £50,000.</p>	<p>Do you have an idea that could help benefit your local community but do not know if it would work? The Big Lottery Fund has money to invest and we want to use it to turn your ideas into reality. We want to invest in Scotland's communities – and we want you to come to us with ideas we can invest in.</p> <p>The Scotland Committee is keen to continue funding the development of ideas, so Investing in Ideas will be open for applications using the current form and guidance materials until further notice.</p>	<p>We have an additional £1.3 million to invest in the development of project ideas. So, would you like to start up a new activity for older people in your area but do not know if people would back it and make it viable? Investing In Ideas could help you carry out a survey and see if there is support for your idea.</p> <p>Or maybe you want to bring an existing building into community ownership and need to explore the feasibility of the project? Investing in Ideas could pay for a feasibility study to help you find out if the idea would work.</p> <p>Investing in Ideas can award grants of £500 to £10,000 to test and develop ideas that could eventually become fully-fledged projects. Investing in Ideas could pay for the things that can turn your basic idea into a well-planned project including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • market research • feasibility studies • business planning • training for your committee • exchange visits in the UK to see how other projects work • community consultation • professional advice • technical reports and scheme design studies <p>It is important that your idea has the potential to fit with one of our four areas of investment. 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<p>Your Heritage</p> <p>£5,000 to £50,000</p> <p><i>Activities can last up to 5 years. Match funding can either be in cash or in-kind.</i></p>	<p>Priority is given to not-for-profit organisations. To apply for a grant your organisation must have a constitution and a bank account.</p> <p>Grants are designed to support community focused heritage projects. To qualify for a grant, projects should either have a conservation focus, or encourage local people to identify, look after and celebrate their heritage or both.</p>	<p>Projects should also ensure that everyone can learn about, have access to, and enjoy their heritage. These can include caring for the natural landscape, conserving historic buildings, places and objects, involving people in exploring local cultures, traditions, languages and ways of life. There is no minimum contribution that you have to make towards your project, but you need to be able to contribute something to the costs of the project, either in cash or 'in kind', for example, time, materials, premises and so on.</p> <p>In the current climate of increased competition and reduced funding, we are strongly recommending applicants not to apply for the maximum available grant of £50,000 but to keep your grant request well below this amount - applying only for what is essential. This will enable us to fund more projects - for example, we can fund twice as many projects at £25,000 than at the full amount of £50,000. In the future we are only likely to fund grants close to £50,000 in exceptional circumstances.</p> <p>We have three main aims which relate to learning, conservation and participation. All projects must meet the learning aim as well as conservation and/or participation. Learning and participation activities must be related directly to or focus on heritage (i.e. not the general day-to-day uses of a building for example or non-heritage activities). Your project should therefore include a programme of heritage focused activities as well as opportunities for new audiences/volunteers to get involved in the delivery of the project. 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<p>Young Roots</p> <p>£5,000 to £25,000</p> <p><i>Projects need to be completed in 18 months.</i></p>	<p>This programme is designed for organisations that work with people aged 13 to 20 (or 13 to 25 for young people with additional learning needs). You will need to be able to show your project will be youth-led. Youth groups must also work with at least one heritage partner to deliver the project, (e.g. your local wildlife trust or museum).</p>	<p>Young Roots aims to involve young people in finding out about their heritage, developing skills, building confidence and promoting community involvement. Your project must show how young people are managing and participating in the project. Your project needs to have a history/heritage focus. If private owners are involved, you will need to show that the public benefit is greater than any private gain.</p>	<p>Learning and participation</p> <p>We have three main aims which relate to learning, conservation and participation. All projects must meet the learning aim as well as conservation and/or participation. Learning and participation activities must be related directly to or focus on heritage (i.e. not the general day-to-day uses of a building for example or non-heritage activities). Your project should therefore include a programme of heritage focused activities as well as opportunities for new audiences/volunteers to get involved in the delivery of the project.
