Review of Statement of Licensing Policy for 2023-2027: Responses to Initial Consultation and Further Procedure

1. Introduction

1.1 The purpose of this report is:

- (i) To advise the Board of responses received to the initial, informal consultation in relation to the Board's Statement of Licensing Policy and to seek the Board's agreement on the terms of a proposed draft Statement of Licensing Policy and other documentation for the purposes of formal consultation; and
- (ii) To request the Board identify localities for the purposes of formal consultation on its required assessment of overprovision in terms of section 7 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 ("the Act"), in order to enable the Board to seek the views of consultees as to whether there may be overprovision, in those localities, of all licensed premises or premises of a particular description.

2. Background

2.1 The Board considered a report by the Clerk to the Licensing Board on 5th September 2022 in relation to the arrangements for preparation of a new Statement of Licensing Policy. The Board agreed at that meeting to carry out an initial, informal consultation on the terms of the Board's existing Statement of Licensing Policy. The existing Statement of Licensing Policy is attached at Appendix 1. This policy was published in 2018. The Act, as amended, now requires a Board to publish a new Statement of Licensing Policy within 18 months of the local government election (on this occasion, by 4th November 2023).

2.2 The Board consulted with a wide range of stakeholders between December 2022 and February 2023. A list of the parties initially consulted is attached at Appendix 2. In response to this initial, informal consultation, responses were received from the following persons and organisations:

- Police Scotland
- Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership
- Renfrewshire Licensing Forum
- Alcohol Focus Scotland
- Khalid Javed

- Scottish Grocers' Federation
- Scottish Enterprise

- 2.3 A copy of these initial responses is attached at Appendix 3, together with comments on each response from the Clerk.
- 2.4 The Board is invited to consider the terms of these responses and the Clerk's comments. The terms of the existing Statement of Licensing Policy have meantime been revised in draft, for the purpose of formal consultation. This proposed revised draft is attached at Appendix 6. The revised version at this stage takes account of necessary changes to the Scheme of Delegation at Section A, Paragraph 5, as well as other changes by way of update, including some changes suggested in the initial consultation responses. Given the detailed suggestions made in response to the initial, informal consultation, however, a separate "Issues Paper" has also been prepared for the purposes of the formal consultation. This is attached at Appendix 7. The proposed Issues Paper seeks views from consultees on various matters raised in responses to the initial, informal consultation, to assist the Board to agree the final terms of its new Statement of Licensing Policy. The Board is asked to agree the terms of the proposed draft Statement of Licensing Policy and Issues Paper for the purposes of the formal consultation.

3. Overprovision

- 3.1 The Board's Statement of Licensing Policy must, in particular, include a statement as to the extent to which the Board considers there to be overprovision of licensed premises, or licensed premises of a particular description, in any locality within the Board's area. This may now include the whole of the Board's area. It is for the Licensing Board to determine the localities for the purpose of assessing overprovision.
- 3.2 The existing Statement of Licensing Policy, at Section A, Paragraph 16, declares an area in Paisley Town Centre as overprovided, in respect of "Liquor or Pub Type Premises, which includes Pub Type Premises used exclusively or predominantly for the sale of alcohol and, as such, does not include restaurant, hotel or nightclub premises. This Paragraph has not been updated at this stage in the draft, revised Statement of Licensing Policy at Appendix 6. This section will be updated when, following the formal consultation, the final version of the Statement of Licensing Policy is reported to the Board for its approval.
- 3.3 During the initial, informal consultation, the Board sought views from consultees as to what localities should be identified as possibly overprovided, to assist the Board in selecting localities for the purpose of the formal consultation.
- 3.4 Several of the responses contained comments relevant to overprovision. However, specific responses proposing localities to be considered as being possibly overprovided were received from Police Scotland, Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership and Renfrewshire Licensing Forum.

- 3.5 Police Scotland wish the Board to consider, for the purposes of the overprovision assessment, an enlarged area in Paisley Town Centre. They have not identified a need for any other additional areas to be declared overprovided. They have produced information at this stage in support of this request in the form of a plan showing what they consider to be a new “hotspot”, referencing terminology used in earlier statutory guidance (which was replaced in January 2023). Police Scotland have not, at this stage, provided detailed statistics or indicated which types of licensed premises they consider may currently be overprovided in this enlarged area, but they do make reference to the night time economy in their response.
- 3.6 Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership have asked the Board to consider as possibly overprovided a number of areas. They have identified these areas using intermediate geographies (referred to as “intermediate datazones”) where they consider there to be poor alcohol-related health statistics and/or high levels of outlet density. While asking the Board to consider some 28 intermediate geography areas as possibly overprovided, they have prioritised some of these areas according to how many of the stated health indicators and outlet density criteria they meet.
- 3.7 Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership ask the Board to consider that any overprovision policy be not restricted, as at present, to liquor or pub type premises and appear to suggest that it should cover all licensed premises.
- 3.8 Renfrewshire Licensing Forum suggest in their response that an area in Millarston should be considered overprovided. However, they have not provided any information on the geographical extent of this area.
- 3.9 The Board is asked to identify localities upon which to focus at this stage, for the purpose of formal consultation as to whether overprovision exists in any or all of them, either in respect of all licensed premises or certain types of licensed premises, as during the policy review in 2018. The Board is now able to choose its entire area as a locality. It is not, however, required to identify localities throughout its entire area. The selection of localities is a matter for the discretion of the Licensing Board. The choice of locality must, however it is done, be rational and capable of justification in the event of a legal challenge and be consistent across the Licensing Board area.
- 3.10 Appendix 4 provides plans of possible localities (as well as of the current declared locality) which the Board may identify for the purposes of formal consultation, following the initial, informal consultation described above. These plans also contain details of the numbers and capacities of licensed premises in those possible localities (as at 16th March 2023), together with information as to the licensed hours of those premises. Under section 7 of the Act, as amended, the Board will, in carrying out its assessment, require to have regard to the number and capacities of licensed premises in an identified locality and may have regard to such other matters as the Board thinks fit including, in particular, the licensed hours of licensed premises in the locality,

when it assesses overprovision in the identified localities (Guidance in relation to these considerations is set out in Chapter 5 of the new statutory guidance). At that stage, the Board will require to consider if there is a dependable causal link between the operation of licensed premises in a locality/ localities and alcohol-related harms. To provide an overall context in Renfrewshire, Appendix 9 provides a list of all licensed premises within Renfrewshire, together with details of their capacities.

3.11 The possible localities which have been identified for the purposes of formal consultation, and which are shown on Plans A to DD in Appendix 4, are-

- A) Existing declared overprovision area in Paisley Town Centre
- B) Alternatively, an extended Paisley Town Centre overprovision area, as proposed by Police Scotland
- C) Johnstone North East
- D) Johnstone North West
- E) Johnstone South East
- F) Paisley Central
- G) Paisley East
- H) Paisley Ferguslie
- I) Paisley Gallowhill and Hillington
- J) Paisley North
- K) Paisley North East
- L) Paisley North West
- M) Paisley South East
- N) Renfrew West
- O) Paisley Foxbar
- P) Linwood North
- Q) Linwood South
- R) Paisley Glenburn West
- S) Paisley West
- T) Renfrew North
- U) Houston North
- V) Johnstone South West
- W) Kilbarchan
- X) Lochwinnoch
- Y) Paisley Glenburn East
- Z) Paisley South
- AA) Renfrew East
- BB) Renfrew South
- CC) Renfrewshire Rural North and Langbank
- DD) Renfrewshire Rural South and Howwood

3.12 The Board is asked to consider which, if any, of these possible localities to identify as possibly overprovided for the purposes of further, formal consultation. This will enable consultees to address, in response to the formal consultation, whether any identified localities may be overprovided, either in terms of all licensed premises, or premises of a particular description.

- 3.13 The Board should note, however, in selecting the localities for further consultation, that the existing Paisley Town Centre overprovision area and the extended Paisley Town Centre area proposed by Police Scotland are contained within the Paisley Central intermediate geography area which is one of the possible localities proposed by Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership. It is not legally permissible for the Board to select overlapping localities, as this would result in the same premises falling into both of these. This would result in particular difficulties on considering a subsequent application for a licence within those localities and associated risk of appeal. The same principle would apply were the Board to declare both Paisley North West (and possibly also Paisley West), as proposed by Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership, and Millarston, as proposed by the Forum, as localities where overprovision exists.
- 3.14 The replacement statutory guidance sets out, at Chapter 5, guidance in relation to considerations for the Board in carrying out its overprovision assessment. The guidance reminds Boards to be mindful of the five licensing objectives and to ensure that the approach to ingathering, weighing and interpreting evidence, and consultation responses, is robust. It asks the Board to ensure that all of the relevant evidence before them is taken into account, and the rationale for regarding/ disregarding that evidence in developing the policy is clearly set out.

4. Further Procedure

- 4.1 The draft Statement of Licensing Policy at Appendix 6 has been partially updated in relation to straightforward matters, in advance of the formal consultation which is now required. It is proposed that the Board seek views from consultees at the formal consultation stage in relation to the terms of the draft Statement and the matters highlighted in the Issues Paper at Appendix 7. It is proposed that the Board obtains as many views as possible in relation to these matters prior to agreeing the final terms of its Statement of Licensing Policy. Respondents will however be able to comment on the terms of the draft policy as they think fit, other than in relation to the matters highlighted in the "Issues Paper".
- 4.2 The Board is also requested to select localities at this stage to allow it to seek views in the formal consultation as to whether overprovision exists in those selected localities, in respect of all, or certain types, of licensed premises. This is also reflected within the terms of the Issues Paper.
- 4.3 A list of proposed consultees is attached at Appendix 9 and it is also recommended that the Board instruct officers to take steps to publicise the consultation. In preparing a licensing policy statement, a Licensing Board must consult the licensing forum (and certain representative people, if the Forum membership is not representative of specified people), the health board and such other persons as the Board thinks appropriate. Further, in relation to the assessment of overprovision, the Board is required to consult the chief constable, the health board, representatives of premises licences

and residents and such other persons as the Board thinks fit. The Board is asked to agree to consult on these matters in tandem.

- 4.4 The Issues Paper asks members of the public, as far as overprovision is concerned, to identify whether they live in one of the localities selected for the purposes of the formal consultation and, if they do, invites their comments in relation to whether they think their area is overprovided, either for all premises or certain types of premises. The proposed list of consultees for formal consultation includes a number of persons representative of people with protected characteristics. This will assist in the identification of any adverse equality impacts to be considered prior to agreement, and subsequent publication, of the policy.
- 4.5 It is proposed that the formal consultation commences as soon as possible upon the terms of this report being agreed, with a final date for responses to the consultation of 21st July 2023. Once the formal consultation is complete, a further report will be brought back to the Board in August or September advising the Board of the responses received and requesting the Board to determine the terms of its Statement of Licensing Policy for the period to 2027. It is likely a further report will require to be brought to the Board thereafter to approve the final version of the report for publication.
- 4.6 The Board is requested at this stage to agree publication of the responses to the initial, informal consultation and will be asked to agree to publish the responses also to the formal consultation in due course.

5. Additional Information

- 5.1 The Board, in exercising its functions, requires to have regard to the terms of statutory guidance published under section 142 of the Act. New, replacement guidance was published in January 2023, to replace the previous statutory guidance issued in 2007. This new guidance can be accessed at the following link:

The new guidance contains particular sections relevant to review of the Board's Statement of Licensing Policy and assessment of overprovision at Chapters 4 and 5. Section 3 of this report makes some specific references to the new guidance in relation to assessing overprovision.


It should be noted that, while regard must be had to the guidance, it should not be allowed to usurp the terms of the Act.

- 5.2 The Board will note that its Statement of Licensing Policy should seek to promote the five licensing objectives set out in the Act. In setting its policy, a Licensing Board must have regard to the above statutory guidance and also give appropriate weight to the views of those consulted. A Statement of Licensing Policy may set out a general approach to the making of decisions but must not ignore, or be inconsistent with, the provisions in the Act.
- 5.3 By way of additional information, Appendix 5 contains details of the number and capacities of licensed premises within the existing declared overprovision locality in Paisley Town Centre over recent years. It also provides numbers of licensed premises, both on and off sales, within Renfrewshire over the same period.
- 5.4 The Board should note that, in addition to the introduction of the new statutory guidance, other developments have also occurred since the last policy review in 2018. Decisions of the courts have been issued in relation to the relevance of the impact of minimum unit pricing to the assessment of overprovision and, separately, in relation to the repeated use of occasional licences for premises. With regard to minimum unit pricing, a series of evaluations have now been carried out. Further information on these matters is set out in the initial consultation responses and the Clerk's Comments at Appendix 3.

6. Recommendations

- 6.1 It is recommended that the Board:-
- 6.1.1 Agree to publish the responses received during the initial, informal consultation;
- 6.1.2 Consider the terms of the draft proposed Statement of Licensing Policy for formal consultation at Appendix 6, the responses to the informal consultation and accompanying Clerk's comments at Appendix 3 and the information provided at Appendix 4 detailing the numbers and capacities of licensed premises and information on current licensed hours in relation to those premises;
- 6.1.3 Approve the terms of the proposed draft Statement of Licensing Policy attached at Appendix 6 and the proposed "Issues Paper" attached at Appendix 7, for the purposes of the formal consultation;
- 6.1.4 Authorise officers to consult formally, as required by section 6 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005, in relation to the said proposed draft Statement of Licensing Policy and "Issues Paper";
- 6.1.5 Consider the possible localities listed at Paragraph 3.11 of the report and identify such localities as the Board thinks fit for the purpose of formal consultation on assessment of overprovision in terms of section 7 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005;

- 6.1.6 Authorise officers to consult formally in relation to the identified localities, as to whether overprovision of all licensed premises or premises of a particular type, exists in respect of any of those localities, in accordance with section 7 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005;
- 6.1.7 Agree that the formal consultation should commence forthwith and end on 21st July 2023;
- 6.1.8 Instruct officers to take steps to publicise the consultation; and
- 6.1.9 Authorise officers, following the formal consultation, to report the responses to that formal consultation to the Board to enable the Board to agree the terms of the Board's new Statement of Licensing Policy, including its assessment of overprovision.

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SECTION A - STATEMENT OF LICENSING POLICY

1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 This Statement of Licensing Policy has been prepared by Renfrewshire Licensing Board in terms of Section 6 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 (“the Act”) to assist in the implementation and administration of the licensing of premises for the sale of alcohol within Renfrewshire and to outline the way in which it intends exercising its functions under the 2005 Act. The Board is required to ensure that its policy promotes the licensing objectives.

These are set out in Section 4 of the Act and are:-

- Preventing crime and disorder
- Securing public safety
- Preventing public nuisance
- Protecting and improving public health; and
- Protecting children and young persons from harm.

Subject to the promotion of the licensing objectives the Board recognises and supports the contribution which licensed premises make to the economy of the area, to employment, tourism and the vitality of the area.

1.2 The Board will have regard to this policy when undertaking any of its functions. This includes officers of the Board when determining applications of a type delegated to them.

1.3 A Statement of Policy (hereinafter referred to as “the Statement”) came into effect on 30 November 2007 and was reviewed in 2010 and 2013. This

Statement will have effect from 4th November 2018, subject to review, until 18 months after the next ordinary local government elections. It will be subject to regular review and monitoring and further consultation during this period. If necessary, the Board will prepare and publish supplementary Statements of Licensing Policy. If you wish to make comment on the statement or wish the contents to be reviewed, please contact the Licensing Section at the contact point stated on the front page.

1.4 The review of liquor licensing law in Scotland commenced with the appointment of the Nicholson Committee in June, 2001 and was fully implemented on 1st September, 2009 when all the provisions of the Act came into force.

1.5 The Act introduced a modernised statutory framework for liquor licensing to allow more flexibility for the licensed trade balanced by extensive and, in appropriate cases, immediate enforcement powers for the Board. A number of changes have been made to the Act since it came fully into force in 2009.

2. CONTEXT – RENFREWSHIRE

2.1 Renfrewshire is situated to the West of Glasgow on the south bank of the River Clyde and covers 261 square kilometres. Renfrewshire's population is estimated at approximately 176,000 making it the tenth largest Council area in Scotland in terms of population.

2.2 Paisley with an estimated population of 76,000 forms the commercial and transport hub for Renfrewshire.

2.3 Renfrewshire has a rich and diverse environment. Paisley, Scotland's largest town, has a rich architectural heritage and is complemented by the Royal Burgh of Renfrew, Erskine New Town, the 18th Century planned town of Johnstone and several villages amidst countryside. There are, as at, 29th October 2018, 432 licensed premises in Renfrewshire, which includes 62 registered clubs.

2.4 In the Renfrewshire Local Development Plan (LDP) adopted Spring 2014 reference is made to the key role of Renfrewshire as "the main international gateway to Scotland and makes a major contribution to the life of the rest of Scotland."

3. PREPARATION OF STATEMENT

3.1 The Statement of Licensing Policy has been prepared having regard to:-

- the Licensing Objectives;
- the statutory Guidance for Licensing Boards and Local Authorities issued by the Scottish Executive;
- the terms of the Act with particular reference to Section 6, and
- the terms of the Alcohol Etc., (Scotland) Act 2010, the Criminal Justice and Licensing (Scotland) Act 2010 and the Air Weapons and Licensing (Scotland) Act 2015.

3.2 In preparing the Statement, the Board consulted widely and took account of the views submitted in its adoption.

4. GENERAL PRINCIPLES

4.1 This Statement of Licensing Policy seeks:-

- to promote the five licensing objectives; and
- to comply with the terms of the 2005 Act and ancillary licensing legislation.

4.2 The Statement sets out a general approach to the way the Board will make licensing decisions but nothing in this Statement will:-

- undermine the rights of any person to apply under the Act and to have that application considered on its individual merits; or
- override the right of any person to make representations on any applications or seek a review of a licence where permitted to do so under the Act.

4.3 It relates to how the Board will exercise its licensing functions under the Act, specifically as regards the regulation of the sale of alcohol and premises in which alcohol is sold all within the terms of the Act. Only material relevant to the Act and the Licensing Objectives will be taken into account by the Board when determining applications or considering reviews.

4.4 It should be recognised also that licensing law is not the primary mechanism for the general control of nuisance and anti-social behaviour by individuals

once they are no longer in the licensed premises and beyond the direct control of the individual, club or business holding the premises' licence. If, however, the nuisance or anti-social behaviour is caused by misuse of alcohol, then supply of alcohol could be a relevant factor in that misuse and the Board, when provided with appropriate information about the misuse, may consider using its powers appropriately in the circumstances. For example, if the anti-social behaviour is linked with unlawful or inappropriate sales of alcohol, relating to particular premises whether to someone under 18 years of age, to a drunken person or as part of an irresponsible drink promotion the Board would be entitled to consider a premises licence review proposal under Section 37 of the Act.

5. TYPES OF APPLICATIONS AND SCHEME OF DELEGATION

5.1 The Board is responsible for the consideration of applications for:-

- premises licences;
- occasional licences;
- temporary licences;
- provisional licences;
- personal licences;
- variations of licences;
- review of licences;
- transfer of licences;
- extensions of licensing hours;
- the sale of alcohol by retail; and

- the supply of alcohol in members' clubs.

5.2 The Board will provide an efficient and cost effective service to all those who are involved in the licensing process. The Board recognises that any application should only be submitted to the Board when necessary and, where straightforward, should be decided by officers to create as little inconvenience to applicants as possible.

5.3 The Board has therefore agreed, as a general rule, that only those applications and matters which by statute are required to be considered by the Board will be submitted to it and the other applications will be determined by the Clerk and Depute Clerks to the Board, except as otherwise provided below.

5.4 Those applications and matters which require to and will be submitted to the Board are:-

- a premises licence application;
- a premises licence variation where the variation applied for is not a minor variation;
- an application for transfer of a premises licence where (i) the applicant has been convicted of a relevant offence or a foreign offence, (ii) the Chief constable has provided a notice stating that the Chief Constable considers it necessary that the application for transfer be refused, or (iii) information is provided by the Chief Constable in relation to the proposed licence holder (and other persons as set out in the Act);

- determining a personal licence application or a personal licence renewal application where a notice has been received from the chief constable recommending refusal;
- conducting any hearing including issuing a written warning, revoking or suspending the licence, making a variation of a licence or, in respect of a personal licence, making an order revoking, suspending or endorsing a personal licence;
- making a closure order; and
- refusing an application for confirmation of a provisional premises licence.

5.5 All other matters with the exception of the specific delegations to Board Members narrated at paragraph 5.6 hereof are delegated to the Clerk and Depute Clerks to deal with, including:-

- granting an application for confirmation of provisional premises licence;
- all applications for transfer of a premises licence where the transferee has not been convicted of a relevant offence or a foreign offence and no notice recommending refusal or other information has been provided by the chief constable;
- all applications for variation of a premises licence where the variation is a minor variation as defined in the Act;
- all applications for personal licences or for the renewal of personal licences where the applicant has not been convicted of a relevant

offence or a foreign offence, no notice recommending refusal has been given by the chief constable and no information has been received from the chief constable or a Licensing Standards Officer which they consider relevant to the application (provided no personal licence held by the applicant has expired or been surrendered within the last three years);

- all applications for occasional licences where there is no objection or representation received or no notice from the Chief Constable recommending refusal or where conditions proposed by the Chief Constable or other consultees have been accepted by the applicant;
- grant of occasional extensions of licensed hours for a special event of local or national significance (following consultation with the Convener);
- grant of extended hours applications within the Board's normal licensing hours policy and when there is no notice of objection or representation or where conditions have been proposed by the Chief Constable or other consultees and have been accepted by the applicant;
- to decide, where an application for an occasional licence or for extended hours is lodged late, whether the reason given for lateness is sufficient for the application to be processed;
- where satisfied that an application for an occasional licence or for extended hours requires to be dealt with quickly, to determine a shortened period for notification being not less than 24 hours.

- revocation of a personal licence where the personal licence holder has failed to complete, and provide evidence of, refresher training to the Board within the periods set out in the Act.

5.6 Determination of the following are delegated to the Convener and one other Board Member, or in the absence of the Convener, two other Board Members:-

- grant of extended hours or occasional licences for hours which are outwith the Board's Licensing Policy Hours or where objections/representations have been received or conditions proposed and not accepted and which in the opinion of the Convener and one other member (or in the Convener's absence, two Board Members) may be determined without a hearing;
- authority to decide whether any application for a premises licence review is vexatious or frivolous and if so to reject it on behalf of the Board;
- grant of a personal licence where no recommendation has been received from the chief constable recommending refusal but either: a) notice has been received from the chief constable confirming the existence of a relevant or foreign offence, or from the chief constable or a Licensing Standards Officer providing information relevant to the application; or (b) the applicant has previously held a personal licence which expired or was surrendered within the last three years;
- authority to decide whether to extend the 28 day period following upon a decision to revoke a premises licence at a review hearing (on the ground

that a person is not fit and proper), pending determination of an application for transfer or variation made within that period;

- authority to decide whether to hold a hearing or to take no action in relation to a premises licence or personal licence, where no recommendation has been received from the chief constable after notification of a relevant conviction.

5.7 The Board will receive regular reports regarding licences determined under delegated powers.

6. OPERATING PLANS

6.1 All applications for premises licences must be accompanied by an operating plan and a layout plan all complying with the Act and Regulations made under that Act, as well as a disabled access and facilities statement. The Board also asks applicants for premises licences to provide, with their applications, a note setting out how they propose to promote the licensing objectives. Operating Plans must make clear how the premises are to be run, what activities will be undertaken on the premises and at what time.

6.2 More specifically, an “operating plan” in relation to any premises is a document in the prescribed form containing:-

- (a) a description of the activities to be carried on in the premises;
- (b) a statement of the times during which it is proposed that alcohol be sold in the premises;

- (c) a statement as to whether the alcohol is to be sold for consumption in the premises, off the premises, or both;
- (d) a statement of the times at which other activities, in addition to the sale of alcohol, are to be carried on in the premises;
- (e) where alcohol is to be sold for consumption in the premises, a statement as to whether children or young persons are to be allowed entry to the premises and, if they are allowed entry, a statement of the terms on which they are allowed entry including, in particular:-
 - (i) the ages of children or young persons to be allowed entry;
 - (ii) the time at which they are to be allowed entry; and
 - (iii) the parts of the premises to which they are to be allowed entry;
- (f) information as to the proposed capacity of the premises;
- (g) prescribed information about the individual who is to be the premises manager; and
- (h) such other information in relation to the premises and the activities to be carried on as may be prescribed.

6.3 Where alcohol is to be sold both for consumption on and for consumption off any premises, the operating plan for the premises may state different times for:-

- (a) the sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises; and
- (b) the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises.

6.4 In preparing and presenting the operating plan, applicants should be aware that the Board expects premises to be run in a way compliant with, and promoting, the five licensing objectives:-

- preventing crime and order;
- securing public safety;
- preventing public nuisance;
- protecting and improving public health; and
- protecting children and young persons from harm.

6.5 Although basic guidance may be sought from the Clerk and Licensing Standards Officers, it is for the applicant to make sure that the operating plan is in the correct form and covers all aspects of the operation of the premises. It is strongly recommended that any person seeks independent legal advice.

7. BOARD MEETINGS

7.1 The proceedings of the Board shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 12 of Schedule 1 to the Act. Unless there are justifiable reasons for or as provided in regulations made under the Act, the Board will meet in public.

8 HEARINGS

8.1 Where a hearing is to take place, the Board will attempt to make the experience as informal as possible consistent with the carrying out of the Board's quasi-judicial function.

8.2 The normal procedure will be to hear the submission of the objector or representor in relation to an application or person seeking review of the premises licence. The applicant or agent will then have an opportunity to address the hearing and Board members may ask questions of any of the parties. There will then be an opportunity for final submissions by all parties before the Board makes a decision.

8.3 The Board is entitled to adjourn to consider the application in private. If they do so, the Board will thereafter reconvene in public to resume consideration of, or make a decision on, the application, as appropriate.

8.4 Normally formal evidence will not be called for. It is noted, however, that under Section 133 of the Act, Scottish Ministers may make Regulations providing procedures to be followed at any hearing.

9 NOTIFICATIONS OF APPLICATIONS, OBJECTIONS AND REPRESENTATIONS

The Board will give notice of each premises licence application it receives to those persons referred to in Section 21 of the Act, namely:-

- each person having a notifiable interest in neighbouring land;
- any community council within whose area the premises are situated;
- Renfrewshire Council;
- Chief Constable of Police Scotland;
- NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde, and
- Scottish Fire and Rescue Service

Additionally, the Board will list all applications received on Renfrewshire Council's website, www.renfrewshire.gov.uk.

10. CONSIDERATION OF PREMISES LICENCE APPLICATIONS

10.1 The grounds for refusal of a premises licence are set out in full at Section 23 of the Act. If the Board consider that none of these grounds apply it must grant the application and if it considers that one or more apply it must refuse the application.

10.2 When considering whether or not any application should be granted, the Board will take into account relevant matters including:-

- the nature of the premises, the style and type of use, the potential number and profile of the customers likely to attend the premises;
- the proposed hours of operation;
- the means of access to the premises including the location and adequacy of customer entrances and exits;
- the location, character and condition of the premises;
- whether the applicant is a fit and proper person to hold the licence, having regard to the licensing objectives.

10.3 Where it is possible to take steps to mitigate or prevent any potential impact, the Board may still be able to grant a licence subject to conditions; each case

will be considered on its own merits and appropriate advice will be sought by the Board.

- 10.4 When considering any application for premises which have been previously licensed or in any review of an existing licence, the Board will take into account any historical evidence, especially of the impact on local residents and will also look at the measures put into effect by the applicant to mitigate the adverse impact.
- 10.5 The Board may also, at any time before determining a premises licence application, request from the chief constable a report in relation to antisocial behaviour on, or in the vicinity of, the premises, complaints or other representations within the year prior to the date of the Board's request.
- 10.6 Where proposed licensed premises are yet to be, or are in the course of being, constructed or converted for such use, an application for a provisional premises licence may be made. A provisional premises licence will not take effect until it is confirmed by the Board. Where confirmation of a provisional premises licence is sought, the Board may vary the conditions of the licence for the purposes of ensuring consistency with any licensing policy statement since the provisional premises licence was issued. This may be relevant if a supplementary licensing policy statement is issued after the issue of a provisional premises licence.

11 OCCASIONAL LICENCES

11.1 An occasional licence authorises the temporary sale or supply of alcohol which is not authorised by a premises licence.

11.2 It may be applied for by:-

- the holder of a premises licence;
- the holder of a personal licence; or
- a representative of any voluntary organisation;

to cover a period of a maximum of fourteen days.

11.3 The grant of an occasional licence is subject to the mandatory conditions laid out in Schedule 4 to the Act.

11.4 While premises and personal licence holders can make unlimited applications there are restrictions on the number of applications a voluntary organisation can make, in any period of twelve months. Voluntary organisations are required to submit a copy of their organisation's constitution with each application made. Guidance on applications and the number that can be applied for in any twelve month period can be obtained from the Licensing Standards Officer.

11.4.1 While the Licensing Board is aware that the Act does not refer to the holding of an "event" in the provisions dealing with occasional licences, given their short-term nature and that they are not subject to any requirements for

certification, neighbourhood notification or public site notices then where an application is to allow premises to trade on a regular basis prior to a premises licence application having been determined, the application may be referred to the Licensing Board for consideration.

11.5 Event organisers are encouraged to provide as much notice of their event as possible to the Board and to the Chief Constable. Information relating to the event will require to be detailed on the application form and the applicant may be asked to provide supporting documentation. The Board will consult with the Chief Constable and the Licensing Standards Officer on all applications. The Board will normally require at least 28 days notice and if applications are lodged later than this date then no assurances can be given that they will be processed in time. Accordingly applicants lodge them at their own risk. In exceptional cases having regard to the circumstances of the application, the Board, if satisfied that there is a reason to process the application more quickly, may reduce the period of notification to a period of not less than 24 hours.

11.6 The Board will consider on a case by case basis whether it is necessary to impose conditions to give effect to the licensing objectives.

12 EXTENDED HOURS APPLICATION

12.1 Extended hours applications allow for an occasional extension of licensed hours and operate only for a period of up to one month. If the Board receives a number of applications to extend licensed hours, it will expect the applicant

to consider whether an application should be made to vary the premises licence by adjustment of the operating plan.

12.2 The Board may make a determination under Section 67 of the Act to extend licensed hours to enable premises to remain open longer for certain special occasions. In addition to consulting the Renfrewshire Licensing Forum, the Board will request observations from the Chief Constable and from other relevant parties on the issues of crime prevention, public safety and preventing public nuisance. It will notify its determination to the Chief Constable, to holders of licences and other relevant parties and will take appropriate steps to publicise the determination as widely as possible.

12.3 Each year the Licensing Board will issue a Statement of its Policy on trading hours for on sale premises for the festive period as stated at paragraph 15.4. Such extended hours will apply automatically to all those premises which make reference to the Board's Policy on the festive period within Part 4 of the Operating Plan, without the need for an extended hours application.

12.4 The timeous lodging of an application set out at paragraph 11.5 above in respect of occasional licences applies equally in terms of the processing of extended hours applications and all applications should be lodged at least 21 days before the proposed date. Late lodged applications are lodged at applicants' own risk. The Board, if satisfied that there is a reason to process the application more quickly, may reduce the periods of notification to a period of not less than 24 hours.

13 EXCLUDED PREMISES

13.1 In terms of Section 123 of the Act, excluded premises includes:

- premises used as a garage; and
- premises used as a garage which form part of larger premises.

No premises licence or occasional licence can be obtained for excluded premises.

13.2 Premises are used as a garage if used for one or more of the following:-

- the sale by retail of petrol or fuel for diesel engined road vehicles (DERV);
- the sale of motor vehicles; or
- the maintenance of motor vehicles.

13.3 There is an exception to this exclusion but only if persons resident in the locality of the garage are or are likely to become reliant to a significant extent on the garage as the principal source of:

- petrol or DERV; or
- groceries.

If that is the case the garage is not excluded premises and may therefore be the subject of a premises or occasional licence.

13.4 The Board will expect an applicant making an application to provide evidence of local residents' reliance on the service together with an impact assessment

in relation to the anticipated impact taking into account the licensing objectives.

13A MEMBERS CLUBS

13.A.1 Members' clubs have been included in the premises licensing system. The Scottish Government acknowledges that it would be reasonable to reflect their special characteristics.

13.A.2 In order to benefit from the exemptions available members' clubs will require to meet the criteria prescribed in the Licensing (Clubs) (Scotland) Regulations 2007.

13.A.3 When members' clubs apply to the licensing board they will be asked to certify whether or not they comply with the criteria referred to at paragraph 13.A.2 in order to benefit from the exemptions. If they do the members' clubs will have to submit to the Board a copy of their written constitution and rules. They will be subject to inspections by Licensing Standards Officers, who will check clubs for compliance.

13.A.4 Members' clubs will be subject to the same provisions regarding access by children and young persons as other licensed premises. They will require to specify in their operating plans whether or not it is proposed that children and young persons are to be allowed entry to the premises and, if so, to specify the terms, to include the times, the ages of such children and young persons and the parts of the premises to which they would be permitted access.

Appropriate conditions relating to access by children and young persons may be attached by the Licensing Board.

13.A.5 Members Clubs are aware that they benefit from exemptions under the Act and as such functions held within the club premises should be for the benefit of the club and its members. Where a club wishes to use its facilities to allow non-members or non-club functions to take place they should consider applying for an occasional licence for that function. Clubs should note that the number of occasional licences that can be obtained for such functions over a calendar year are limited by regulations. Members clubs requiring further information should contact the Licensing Standards Officer.

14 OBJECTIONS

14.1 The following information should in no way be seen as overriding the right of any person to make an objection to an application or to seek a review of a premises licence.

14.2 Any person may submit an objection or representation to the Board in relation to a premises licence. The objection must relate to one or more of the licensing objectives or other relevant ground of refusal under the Act. Information to assist people wishing to make an objection or representation is provided in resources developed by Alcohol Focus Scotland, "Alcohol Licensing in Your Community: How You Can Get Involved". This is available at <https://www.alcohol-focus-scotland.org.uk/media/133477/Community-licensing-toolkit.pdf>

A proforma to assist anyone wishing to make an objection or representation is available at <http://www.renfrewshire.gov.uk/media/2003/notice-of-objection-of-representation-proforma/pdf/cs-ae-ProformaObjectionorRepresentation.pdf>

14.3 Although anyone is entitled to object to an application for a premises licence or seek a review of a premises licence, the Board may reject an objection or an application for review where it is considered to be “frivolous” or “vexatious”. “Frivolous” and “vexatious” are the words used in the Act. In determining this, the Board is entitled to recover any expenses incurred by the Board in considering the objection or application for review.

14.4 Objections will be considered on their merits and the ordinary meanings of “vexatious” and “frivolous” will be adopted.

15 LICENSING HOURS

15.1 While each application is assessed on its own merits, the following section sets out the Licensing Board’s policy on licensing hours and the reasons for adopting that approach. For applications for licensed premises at times outwith the Board’s policy, applicants will require to demonstrate to the Board that the additional requested hours are appropriate in the circumstances to those particular premises.

In forming this policy for licensing hours the Board has been mindful of the licensing objectives:-

- Preventing crime and disorder;

- Securing public safety
- Preventing public nuisance;
- Protecting and improving public health; and
- Protecting children and young persons from harm

15.2 **Off-Sale Premises - Reasons for Approach and Policy**

Where applications relate to premises licences and to occasional licences, the licensed hours for the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises (off-sale hours) are in terms of the Act 10am until 10pm every day of the week. The Licensing Board must refuse an application which proposes licensed hours outwith these times for off sales premises. It is open to the Board to further restrict off sales where it considers that the hours proposed would be inconsistent with one or more of the licensing objectives. In particular, in determining applications and licensed hours, the Board will, in considering the merits, have particular regard to the effect (if any) which the proposed off-sale hours would have on the occurrence of anti-social behaviour. Unless so restricted, the Board will generally permit off sales hours from 10am until 10pm.

15.3 **On-Sale Premises – Reasons for Approach**

The Board recognises that licensing hours are important not only to individual premises but also can have a wider impact on the area in which the premises are situated. Accordingly in determining their policy the Board has had regard

to how the dispersal of customers late at night from licensed premises throughout Renfrewshire can be managed.

In particular, the Board considers that a policy setting staggered closing times for different types of premises taking into account the policing of the late night economy and the availability of late night transport within Renfrewshire promotes the licensing objectives of (i) preventing crime and disorder; (ii) securing public safety and (iii) preventing public nuisance.

In considering licensed hours the Board has also taken into account the presumption against 24 hour drinking set out at Section 64 of the Act and the Statutory Guidance for Licensing Boards which states “in considering applications for licensed hours Boards may wish to consider applications for up to 14 hours as being reasonable but local circumstances and views of Local Licensing Forums should always be considered. Any application for licensed hours for more than 14 hours should require further consideration to the effect of granting extra operating hours”.

The Board has also had regard to the views of Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde on licensing hours in relation to the link between availability of alcohol and alcohol related harm. The Board therefore considers that the licensing objective of Protecting and Improving Public Health is relevant to its policy on licensed hours, particularly in relation to the number of hours a day during which alcohol may be sold and thereafter consumed.

Although promotion of the licensing objectives is paramount the Board recognises that licensing hours contribute to the development of local

economies which may be important for investment, employment and tourism within the area.

After consulting widely on the formulation of their updated policy and taking account of all responses received, the Board is of the view that their previous policy on opening hours for on sales premises should remain. This will continue to allow on sales premises the flexibility to commence trading at 11am every day of the week. The Board previously introduced this Policy to reflect social changes within Renfrewshire and considers that it has not detracted from the promotion of the licensing objectives.

On Sale Premises - Policy

Whilst considering every application on its individual merits, the Board therefore considers the following policy to be appropriate:-

Commencement Hours: Monday - Saturday

9.30am: premises, for the purpose only of funeral purveys/receptions (or in the case of registered clubs where club activities are taking place).

and otherwise

11.00am: all premises

Sundays

11.00am: all premises

Terminal hours: Sunday – Thursday

12.00 midnight: all licensed premises (including registered clubs), except premises, the primary purpose of which is to offer entertainment in the form of dancing.

2.00am premises, the primary purpose of which is to offer entertainment in the form of dancing.

Friday & Saturday

1.00am all licensed premises (including registered clubs), except premises, the primary purpose of which is to offer entertainment in the form of dancing.

2.00am premises, the primary purpose of which is to offer entertainment in the form of dancing.

3.00am premises, the primary purpose of which is to offer entertainment in the form of dancing and where such premises are members of Paisley Town Centre Radio Link.

15.4 The Board has an existing practice of permitting longer licensed hours over the festive period and that will continue to be the case. The festive period for the purposes of this aspect of the policy will be determined by the Board on an annual basis.

16 OVERPROVISION OF LICENSED PREMISES

16.1 Overprovision of licensed premises in a particular locality impacts on the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Board is under a duty in terms of Section 7 of the Act to produce a statement as to the extent that the Board considers there to be overprovision of licensed premises or licensed premises of a particular description in any locality within the Board's area.

16.2 In determining any "locality", the Statutory Guidance for Licensing Boards indicates that the process is largely a matter for the Board and will no doubt involve the use of its local knowledge. The Guidance also recommends that the information which the Chief Constable is capable of providing is a reasonable starting point. The Chief Constable would be able to:-

- Identify 'hot spot' areas within the Board's area where it can be demonstrated that crime, disorder and nuisance are caused by customers of a concentrated number of licensed premises;
- Suggest other areas in which the number of licensed premises or premises of a particular description is moving closely towards overprovision; and
- Provide the Board with the geographical boundaries of these areas.

16.3 On the basis of the information provided by the Police and having regard to the Board's own local knowledge the Board have continued to determine Paisley Town Centre, as shown on the plan below, as a locality for the purposes of Section 7 of the Act.

16.4 In considering whether there is overprovision for the purposes of Section 7(1) of the Act the Board must have regard to the number and capacity of licensed premises in a particular locality as determined by the Board and may have regard to other matters, including the licensed hours of those premises. In this connection the Board have had regard to the number, capacity and description of licensed premises for the above locality and have also taken into account the licensed hours of those premises.

Following consideration of (i) the responses received to consultation (and, in particular, representations from Police Scotland) (ii) the number, capacities and licensed hours of licensed premises in this locality and (iii) the Board's local knowledge of the area, the Board determined that this locality remains overprovided in respect of "Liquor or Pub Type Premises". The Board considers "Liquor or Pub Type Premises" includes Pub Type Premises used exclusively or predominantly for the sale of alcohol and, as such, does not include restaurant, hotel or nightclub premises. The Board considers that this policy, which had been agreed previously as a Supplementary Statement of Licensing Policy in 2015, remains relevant to the licensing objectives of preventing crime and disorder, securing public safety and preventing public nuisance.

The effect of this policy, in terms of the statutory guidance, is to create, in this locality, a "rebuttable presumption" against the grant of applications for any further licences (or to increase the capacity of existing licences) of the description stated. Those applications would normally be refused on the

ground provided by Section 23(5)(e) of the Act, that the Board considers that, if the application were to be granted, there would as a result be overprovision of licensed premises, or licensed premises of that description in the locality.

Each application will still be considered on its own merits and there may be exceptional cases in which an applicant is able to demonstrate that the grant of the application would not undermine the licensing objectives or that those objectives would not be undermined if the applicant's operating plan were to be modified or the grant of the licence were made subject to appropriate conditions.

The Board reached its decision to adopt this policy following lengthy consultation, during which it received submissions from a number of interested parties. 
PAISLEY TOWN CENTRE OVERPROVISION AREA

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17 PERSONAL LICENCES

17.1 The Board will consider applications for personal licences from individuals living in the area of Renfrewshire.

17.2 Any individual may seek a personal licence. The Board will grant a personal licence if it is satisfied that the applicant:-

- is over 18 years of age
- possesses a relevant licensing qualification
- has not had revoked in the previous five years, ending with the day on which the application was received, a personal licence (except where that revocation arose from a failure to complete refresher training)
- has not been convicted of any relevant or foreign offence and the application has not resulted in a notice recommending refusal from the chief constable or other information being provided by the chief constable or a Licensing Standards Officer which they consider relevant.

17.3 Otherwise, the Board will consider whether the application should be refused under the Act. In making a decision the Board will have regard to the seriousness and age of any conviction along with any other circumstances, recommendation or information provided which it considers to be relevant.

17.4 The holder of a personal licence issued by the Board must undertake further training prior to the 5th anniversary of the issue of the licence and each subsequent period of 5 years during which the licence has effect. The

licenceholder must produce evidence that the required training has been completed, to the Board no later than 3 months after the expiry of each 5 year period. Failure to undertake the training as required or to notify the Board will result in the licence being revoked.

17.5 To comply with paragraph 17.4 above all licenceholders are required to return their original personal licence to the Board along with a copy of any certificate issued as evidence of completion of the required training. The licence will be updated and returned.

17.6 All licenceholders are advised that they have a duty to notify the Board of any change in name or address within one month of that change taking place. Any changes should be notified in writing to the Board and be accompanied by the original licence.

18. LOCAL LICENSING FORUM

18.1 The formulation of this policy involved consultation with the Renfrewshire Licensing Forum which will keep under review the operation of the Act in Renfrewshire and will advise and make recommendations to the Board as appropriate. The Board will have regard to any advice given or recommendation made to it. If the Board does not follow the advice or guidance, this will be for good and substantial reasons, which reasons will be given in writing within fourteen days of the decision.

18.2 In order to ensure proper communication with the Renfrewshire Licensing Forum, the Board may from time to time provide reports to the Forum to enable it to have an appreciation of, and due regard to, the detail of such matters during their deliberations.

SECTION B - PROMOTION OF THE LICENSING OBJECTIVES

19 INTRODUCTION

19.1 The Board will continually promote the licensing objectives and calls on licence holders and other stakeholders to be mindful of these when providing their services. The Board recognises that there are some types of alcohol misuse issues which are not connected to consumption of alcohol in licensed premises.

19.2 The licensing objectives are:-

- preventing crime and disorder;
- securing public safety;
- preventing public nuisance;
- protecting and improving public health; and
- protecting children and young persons from harm.

19.3 The following paragraphs set out the Board's general policy in respect of the objectives. The Board may when necessary impose a range of conditions which will be appropriate to a particular licence. The purpose of such conditions will be to promote the licensing objectives.

19.4 In each section relating to the objectives, the Board has defined its intended outcome. Each section lists the influencing factors on the achievement of that objective but, because of the wide variety of premises and activities to which this policy applies, the lists provided are not exhaustive. Applicants will know their own premises best and will be expected to address all aspects relevant to the individual style and characteristics of their premises and the licensable activities for which they are seeking authorisation.

19.5 In each sub-section, a list of possible control measures is provided. This is intended to be of assistance to applicants, but again is not intended to be an exhaustive list. Many control measures achieve more than one objective but have not necessarily been listed under each objective.

20 THE PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

20.1 The Board, in carrying out its functions, will have regard to the likely impact of licensed activities and related crime and disorder when considering the location, operation and management of all licence applications, reviews and variations.

20.2 The Board supports a strategy aimed at making Renfrewshire a safe place to live and visit. The Board is committed to improving the quality of life for the people of Renfrewshire by ensuring that licensed premises are managed in such a way as not to contribute to crime and disorder. Applicants are expected to consider how they will promote the prevention of crime and

disorder. The applicants should also be able to demonstrate that all those factors which impact on crime and disorder have been considered. These include:-

- underage drinking;
- drunkenness on the premises;
- public drunkenness;
- illegal possession and/or use of drugs;
- violent behaviour;
- anti-social behaviour; and
- litter.

20.3 Applicants are encouraged to discuss crime prevention procedures in their premises with the Council and Police Scotland. Factors may include underage drinking, drunkenness on premises, public drunkenness, drugs, violent behaviour and antisocial behaviour.

20.4 The following examples of control measures are given to assist applicants who may need to take account of them in their operating plan having regard to their particular type of premises and/or licensable activities:-

- having a written crime prevention strategy;
- effective and responsible management of premises;
- training given to staff to include preventing crime and disorder and conflict management;
- training and effective supervision of staff;

- written policy on mandatory proof of age scheme;
- provision of effective CCTV in and around the premises which complies with current legislative requirements, is fully maintained and an employee trained in its operation always available on the premises, with the CCTV footage being retained for a minimum period of 28 days;
- security policies and regular toilet checks;
- employment, when necessary, of Security Industry Authority licensed door staff;
- door supervisors to be easily identifiable by wearing high-visibility clothing;
- door supervisors to be instructed to encourage persons leaving the premises to do so in an orderly fashion without causing disturbance;
- active membership of Pubwatch or Radiolink or similar schemes; participation in initiatives such as 'Best Bar None'.
- provision of litter bins and lighting outside premises;
- provision of plastic or toughened drinking vessels;
- justification for size of measures; and
- choice of size of wine glass.

20.5 Licenceholders are called upon to take positive action to discourage drinking and driving which is a serious offence and can have catastrophic effects on families of both victims and offenders. Licenceholders are, therefore, encouraged to play an active part in preventing drink driving by:-

- displaying anti-drink driving materials;

- supplying reasonably priced non-alcoholic drinks; and
- promoting awareness of campaigns such as designated drivers scheme.

21 SECURING PUBLIC SAFETY

21.1 The Board recognises that “licensed premises” will cover a wide range of premises and activities, each with its own safety risks or issues. The premises must be constructed or adapted and operated in such a manner as to safeguard occupants from those risks or issues. The Board is committed to ensuring that the safety of any person visiting or working in or in the vicinity of licensed premises is not compromised.

21.2 Issues may involve:-

- occupancy capacity of the premises;
- age, design and layout including means of escape;
- nature of activities such as music and dancing;
- hours of operation;
- customer profile (e.g. age, disability, sexual orientation, gender, race, ethnicity); and
- use of special effects such as lasers, pyrotechnics and, smoke machines.

21.3 The following examples of control measures are given to assist applicants who may need to take account of them in their operating plan having regard to their particular type of premises and/or licensable activities:-

- suitable and sufficient risk assessments;
- effective and responsible management of premises;
- sufficient number of staff;
- appropriate instruction, training and supervision of staff;
- training need not only relate to licensing, the sale or supply of alcohol and its misuse but wider issues especially those relating to equal opportunity and diversity;
- having an effective glass management policy either involving the removal of all glassware regularly or by providing toughened or plastic drinking vessels.
- having a written policy on how to deal with customers and any other person in the premises who may become incapacitated or vulnerable due to drink or drugs;
- having first aid facilities;
- informing Police Scotland of any special events taking place in the premises or issues relating to public safety;
- having a written accident recording system;
- displaying local transport information to facilitate safe journeys home for customers;
- adoption of best practice guidance;
- provision of effective CCTV which complies with current legislative requirements, is fully maintained and an employee trained in its operation always available on the premises, with the CCTV footage being retained for a minimum period of 28 days;

- coverage;
- door supervisors to be easily identifiable by wearing high-visibility clothing;
- door supervisors to be instructed to encourage persons leaving the premises to do so in an orderly fashion without causing disturbance;
- implementation of crowd management systems; and
- proof of regular testing and certification where appropriate of procedures, appliances and safety systems.

21.4 The Board may request sight of Electrical Safety Certificates, Ceiling or Structural Certificates, Fire Safety Certification, Risk Assessments and a Health and Safety Policy. As other Services may have enforcement powers in this connection with these forms of documentation, it is expected that such requests by the Board will be fairly rare and be taken in consultation with those other services.

22 THE PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

22.1 Licensed premises have a significant potential to impact adversely on communities, through public nuisances that arise from their operation. The Board wishes to maintain and protect the amenity of residents and local businesses from the potential consequences of the operation of licensed premises whilst recognising the valuable cultural, social and business importance that such premises provide.

- 22.2 Although interpretation is ultimately a matter for the Courts, the Board intends to interpret “public nuisance” widely and understands it to include such issues as noise, light, odour, litter and anti-social behaviour where these impact on those living, working or otherwise engaged in normal activity in an area or locality. Public nuisance may also include waste generated by licensed premises (including where necessary arrangements for dealing with discarded needles) and smoking litter associated with licensed premises.
- 22.3 “Anti-social behaviour” is defined in the Antisocial Behaviour, etc. (Scotland) Act 2004 as behaviour where a person acts in a manner that causes or is likely to cause alarm or distress or pursues a course of conduct that causes or is likely to cause alarm or distress to at least one person who is not from the same household as the person engaging in the behaviour; conduct includes speech.
- 22.4 The Board acknowledges that smoking is not a licensing matter but one for other legislation. The Board expects that licenceholders will be aware of their own statutory responsibilities concerning smoking in public places.
- 22.5 The Board expects that licenceholders will have regard to good practice. It is their responsibility to ensure that patrons do not create a nuisance or disturbance for residents living nearby. This includes noise arising as a result of patrons smoking outside the premises and any associated littering of the area. Licenceholders are reminded that they are responsible for sweeping up cigarette ends and other smoking related waste left by customers when taking

a smoking break immediately outside the premises and then re-entering the premises.

22.6 Every business has a duty to ensure that waste is disposed of securely and to keep their premises clear of all litter generated by staff and customers. The Board expects licenceholders to be aware of their responsibilities and of the possibility of statutory street litter control notices in the case of non-compliance.

22.7 When applicants propose to provide outside seating, tables or other facilities in any outdoor area, whether covered or not, regard should be had to the need to ensure that the use of such areas will not cause disturbance or nuisance to the occupiers of other premises in the vicinity. Licenceholders are responsible for ensuring that all other consents and permissions are obtained including from Planning, Building Standards and any road consent or permit.

22.8 When addressing the issue of preventing public nuisance, the following factors are relevant and should be considered:-

- The location of premises and proximity to residential and other noise sensitive premises such as hospitals, hospices, care homes and places of worship.
- The hours of opening, particularly after 11pm.

- The nature of activities to be provided, including whether those activities are of a temporary or permanent nature and whether they are to be held inside or outside the premises.
- The design and layout of premises and in particular the presence of noise limiting features and a CCTV system, which complies with current legislative requirements, is fully maintained and an employee trained in its operation always available on the premises.
- The occupant capacity of the premises.
- The availability of public transport and taxis.
- The wind down time between the end of the licensable activities and the closure of the premises.
- The last admission time.

22.9 The following examples of control measures are given to assist applicants who may need to take account of them in their operating plan, having regard to their particular type of premises and/or licensable activities:-

- Effective and responsible management of premises.
- Appropriate instruction, training and supervision of those employed or engaged to prevent incidents of public nuisance.
- Control of operating hours for all or parts of the premises – for instance, garden areas, bottle disposal and deliveries.
- Adoption of best practice guidance.
- Installation of soundproofing, air conditioning, acoustic lobbies and sound limitation devices which should also be used for external equipment brought onto the premises.

- Management of people, including staff and vehicular traffic and resulting queues, arriving and leaving the premises.
- door supervisors to be easily identifiable by wearing high-visibility clothing;
- door supervisors to be instructed to encourage persons leaving the premises to do so in an orderly fashion without causing disturbance;
- Liaison with public transport providers.
- Siting of external lighting, including security lighting and installation of an effective CCTV system which complies with current legislative requirements is fully maintained and an employee trained in its operation always available on the premises, with the CCTV footage being retained for a minimum period of 28 days;
- Effective ventilation systems to prevent nuisance from odour.

23 PROTECTING AND IMPROVING PUBLIC HEALTH

23.1 Licenceholders can help promote this objective in many ways. They can use materials such as posters, beer mats which promote moderate consumption of alcohol along with awareness of units of alcohol and the recommended current guidelines for consumption of alcohol by men and women. A wine list, for example, might state how many units of alcohol per glass or bottle together with a reminder of the guidelines. The Board is concerned about the link between the consumption of alcohol and public health. The Board wishes to see premises thriving in Renfrewshire but this cannot be at the expense of patrons' health and wellbeing. The Board will have regard to the views of,

and take advice from the relevant bodies responsible for and interested in the protection and promotion of public health in Renfrewshire.

23.2 Licence applicants, door stewards where employed and premises managers as well as other staff employed in the premises must remain vigilant at all times to the risks of excessive consumption. There should be an established practice within the premises to ensure that a standard approach is taken where a patron's demeanour demonstrates an excessive consumption of alcohol. There should also be a clear understanding of the offences committed in connection with the service of alcohol to children or young persons or persons who appear drunk and allowing drunkenness on the premises.

23.3 Reference is also made to paragraph 22.4 of this statement relating to smoking.

23.4 The following examples of control measures are given to assist applicants who may need to take account of them in their operating plan having regard to their particular type of premises and/or licensable activities:-

- displaying anti-drunkenness materials along with information on units of alcohol in the context of current recommended guidelines;
- having a workplace alcohol policy in order to raise awareness, minimise harm and ensure that staff are able to access help (without fear of a job loss) when a problem arises; and

- ensuring customers are aware of choice in relation to alcohol measures particularly wine eg small, medium or large glasses should be available.

24 PROTECTING CHILDREN AND YOUNG PERSONS FROM HARM

24.1 The Act defines children as persons under the age of sixteen and young persons as those aged 16 or 17. The Board encourages applications that make venues family friendly and safe for children and young persons. The Board, however, will have particular regard to this objective when:-

- there have been convictions of staff or licenceholders for serving alcohol to underage persons or where premises are in an area where there is a history or other evidence of underage drinking;
- there is a serious element of gambling within the premises;
- entertainment of an adult nature is provided;
- the operating plan shows that the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises is the exclusive or primary purpose of the service provided (referred to as vertical drinking establishments);
- licenceholders or staff have criminal convictions for offences against children or have otherwise been found unsuitable to work with children.

24.2 The Board wishes to see family friendly premises thriving in Renfrewshire. Where applicants wish to operate such premises, the Board expects them to appreciate that this places additional responsibilities upon them at the same time recognising that parents and other adults accompanying children and/or young persons also have responsibilities.

24.3 The following examples of control measures are given to assist applicants who may need to take account of them in their operating plan having regard to their particular type of premises and/or licensable activities:-

- effective and responsible management of premises;
- appropriate instruction, training and supervision of staff;
- adoption of best practice, including a written policy on prevention of sales of alcohol to children and young persons;
- limitation on the hours when children and/ or young persons may be present, in all or parts of the premises;
- limitations or exclusions by age;
- written policy on mandatory proof of age scheme;
- measures to ensure children and/ or young persons do not unlawfully purchase, acquire or consume alcohol;
- measures to ensure children and/ or young persons are not exposed to incidences of strong and offensive language, violence or disorder; and
- use of fixed fire guards on open fires and prohibition of mobile heaters when young children are in the premises; and
- availability of high chairs and suitable drinking vessels for young children.
- ensuring staff involved with the delivery of alcohol along with takeaway food have appropriate training.

24.4 When preparing the operating plan or submitting an application or an occasional licence, applicants must set out the terms on which children and young persons are to be allowed entry including the ages of children and young persons to be allowed entry, times and parts of the premises to which children and young persons will have access. The Board will have regard to these terms and if the Board consider it to be necessary will arrange a visit to the applicant premises to inform their determination of the application.

25 RELATIONSHIP WITH OTHER STRATEGIES

25.1 The Board will endeavour to secure proper integration with local crime prevention, community safety, health, planning, transport, tourism and equality and cultural strategies.

25.2 There are a number of wider issues which require to be given due consideration when dealing with applications. The Board will receive, when appropriate, reports on the needs of tourism in relation to Renfrewshire, from the Council's Director of Communities, Housing and Planning and the Town Centre Action Plan to make sure that these are reflected in the Board's consideration.

25.3 The Board recognises that licensing applications are not, and should not be seen as, a re-run of the planning application process and that there is a clear separation of the planning and licensing regimes. There will, however, continue to be proper liaison and communication between these two regimes.

25.4 In addition, the Board will not attach conditions to a premises licence unless these are considered necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. Conditions will generally be considered unnecessary where these would relate to matters already also covered by other legislation.

26 AVOIDING DUPLICATION

26.1 The Board will, so far as possible, avoid duplication with other regulatory regimes such as health and safety at work, fire safety, building standards and planning. However, the Board recognises that there will be areas where responsibilities overlap between the Board and other public authorities or bodies, e.g. the Board's responsibilities under Equalities legislation.

27 CONDITIONS

27.1 The Act, in Schedule 3, provides mandatory conditions for premises licences. The Board also has power to impose licence conditions. These conditions will not be inconsistent with or seek to strengthen or restrict mandatory conditions and will only be imposed when considered necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

27.2 In line with the above, the Board have agreed various local conditions to be applied to particular premise type/activities. These are attached at Appendices I, II and III hereof.

28 THE HUMAN RIGHTS ACT 1998

28.1 The Human Rights Act 1998 incorporates the European Convention on Human Rights and makes it unlawful for bodies such as the Board to act in a way which is incompatible with a Convention Right. The Board will have particular regard to the following relevant provisions of the European Convention on Human Rights in respect of its licensing responsibilities:-

- Article 6: that in the determination of civil rights and obligations, everyone is entitled to a fair and public hearing within a reasonable time by an independent and impartial tribunal established by law;
- Article 8: that everyone has the right to respect for their home and private life; and
- Article 1 of the First Protocol: that every person is entitled to the peaceful enjoyment of their possessions including, for example, the possession of a premises licence.

29 EQUALITY

29.1 The Board values and celebrates the diversity that exists within Renfrewshire and wants to ensure that everyone can fully participate in the social, cultural, political and economic life of Renfrewshire.

29.2 The Board opposes all forms of unlawful discrimination including discrimination on the grounds of race, sex, gender reassignment, sexual orientation, age, religion/ belief, pregnancy/ maternity and disability and

recognises that discrimination creates barriers to achieving equality for all people.

29.3 The Equality Act 2010 provides Scottish Ministers with power to impose “specific duties” through regulations on Scottish Public Authorities. The Equality Act 2010 (Specific Duties) (Scotland) Regulations 2012 came into force on 27 May 2012 and can be accessed online at:
<http://www.legislation.gov.uk/sdsi/2012/9780111016718/contents>.

29.4 The “specific duties” set by the Scottish Ministers support and enable better performance of the “general duty” which requires public authorities to pay due regard to the need to eliminate unlawful discrimination, advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations as set out in Section 149(1) of the Equality Act 2010.

29.5 Renfrewshire Licensing Board as a public authority is required to publish progress made in mainstreaming the equality duty and a set of equality outcomes in order to meet the requirements of the equality duty. Equality outcomes are defined by the Equality & Human Rights Commission as results intended to achieve specific and identifiable improvements in people’s life chances.

29.6 Reference is made to the Progress Reports on Mainstreaming Equalities and Equality Outcomes of the Board and Renfrewshire Council which are set out

30 ENFORCEMENT, LICENSING STANDARDS OFFICERS AND OTHER SOURCES OF INFORMATION

- 30.1 The Board will follow best practice in enforcement including adoption of the best Regulation Principles and the Hampton Standards, namely, that its actions will be: proportional, accountable, consistent, transparent and targeted.
- 30.2 Renfrewshire Council have appointed two Licensing Standards Officers (LSOs) (i) to investigate allegations of unlicensed activities, (ii) to ensure that licence conditions are complied with and (iii) to provide information, guidance and a mediation service. It is a mandatory condition of the Act that the LSOs are fully trained thus enabling them to carry out their functions efficiently. The LSOs will be members of the Renfrewshire Licensing Forum.
- 30.3 The Act provides that Licensing Standards Officers' general functions include providing information and guidance; supervising compliance by licence holders with licensing legislation and their licence conditions and providing mediation. Premises covered by a premises licence are visited by Licensing Standards Officers for their compliance with licensing legislation and licence conditions. Where a premises licence has recently been issued, or where a variation (other than a minor variation) has been granted, Licensing Standards

Officers will visit those premises as a priority to ensure compliance with the above requirements.

30.4 The Board recognises that, for members of the public who do not deal with the complexities of the licensing legislation on a daily basis, lodging objections or representations to a licence application (or an application for a review hearing) is likely to be a daunting experience. The Board also recognises that, for those people, the Licensing Standards Officers may be the first contact they have with the licensing authority. The role of Licensing Standards Officers is not to make applications, or objections, on behalf of members of the public, but they are available to offer appropriate support to all parties seeking to be involved in the Board's licensing processes. They will also be able to provide information as to application procedures and may be able to signpost members of the public to helpful resources, such as the Toolkit Resource published by Alcohol Focus Scotland.

30.5 The Licensing Standards Officers may be contacted by email at enforcement.licensing.cs@renfrewshire.gov.uk and by telephone at 0141-618-7084. Where issues are raised with the Licensing Standards Officers which do not relate wholly to licensing matters, the Licensing Standards Officers will be able to provide contact details for other Council Services who may be suitably placed to assist.

30.6 Initially, it is anticipated that resources will be targeted towards high-risk premises and activities that require greater attention whilst a lighter touch will be provided in respect of low-risk premises which are well operated.

30.7 The Board will liaise closely with its partners to assist licenceholders to comply with the law and the five licensing objectives it seeks to promote. Proportionate but firm action will be taken against those who commit offences. In particular the Board anticipates co-operation with the Police and to share information where appropriate in order to enhance the promotion of the five licensing objectives.

30.8 When a matter is submitted to the Board by the Licensing Standards Officer, it is expected, except in the most serious cases, that attempts will already have been made through advice, mediation and negotiation to address the matter. It is, therefore, envisaged that very few such cases will need to be submitted to the Board.

It should be appreciated, however, that, in appropriate cases, the Board will not hesitate to use its powers to suspend or revoke a licence, notwithstanding that this may have a detrimental impact on the business.

FUNERAL CONDITION

Funeral purveys taking place from 9.30am where alcohol is to be sold require a formal intimation to the Board 24 hours before the function.

APPENDIX II

Local Conditions for Nightclub Type Premises

1. The premises licence holder at all times when the premises are open to the public during the permitted hours shall operate a mechanical or electronic counting system which is capable of accurately recording the number of persons entering and leaving the premises.
2. In relation to the said counting system, the premises licence holder or person or persons appointed by the premises licence holder for that purpose shall at any time upon a request being made by a Police Constable, a Licensing Standards Officer or any member or person authorised in writing by the Licensing Board immediately provide accurate information on the number of persons within the premises.
3. During the licensed hours when the premises are open to the public, the premises licence holder shall have present on the premises stewarding personnel licensed by the Security Industry Authority to provide for the maintenance of public order and the proper management control, safety and the general well being of patrons on the premises.
4. During hours when the premises are open to the public, the premises licence holder shall ensure that empty glasses and bottles from the premises are reasonably cleared from areas to which the public have access. No glasses or bottles shall be permitted in cloakrooms, toilets or on dance floors located in the premises. Sufficient shelves, ledges, tables and counters shall be provided in the premises to accommodate glasses and bottles for collection. It is recommended that any receptacles used in the premises are made of plastic.
5. A person trained to the satisfaction of the Licensing Board in administering first aid must be present on the premises from the initial time of opening the premises to the public.
6. The premises licence holder shall prominently display at the entrance to the premises a noticeboard with a warning in the following terms:-

WARNING

DRUGS AND OFFENSIVE WEAPONS

Under no circumstances will the use of illegal drugs or the carrying of offensive weapons be permitted on these premises.

As part of our commitment to our customers and to achieve a safe and drug free environment, all persons entering these premises are liable to be asked as a condition of entry to submit to a search.

If you are found in possession of drugs or offensive weapons, these will be taken from you and the Police will be informed.

7. Unless there are good reasons for not implementing a search policy in relation to all patrons which reasons shall have been intimated to the Licensing Board in advance of any change in practice, the premises licence holder shall implement a system of searching of all patrons at the point of entry using appropriate search techniques.

APPENDIX III

Local Conditions for Premises Offering Alcohol Deliveries

1. A robust age verification policy requires to be in place for deliveries that include alcohol and must be strictly adhered to by all delivery staff, incorporating a Challenge 25 approach. Documentation presented as verification of age requires to be of a type prescribed in the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 or Regulations under that Act as suitable for that purpose.
2. An order register must be kept on the premises containing details of the items ordered/ despatched, with details of when the order was placed and when the alcohol was despatched.
3. A delivery/refusal register requires to be maintained by the delivery driver containing details of the person accepting delivery or, if delivery was refused, the reason for any refusals.
4. No delivery of alcohol should be left unattended or with children or young persons where there is no adult available to accept delivery.

Re the Initial Consultation on the Statement of Licensing Policy - Renfrewshire.

The following is a summary of what stakeholders were provided with:

The Licensing Board has not, to date, identified particular aspects of the current policy. However, while it is open to you to comment on such aspects of the policy as you see fit, previously views have been received from consultees in relation to matters such as those listed below, as well as in relation to overprovision:

- **licensing hours**
- **children and young persons' access to licensed premises**
- **occasional licences**
- **extended hours**

Our proposed Divisional response is:

- **Overprovision** - The attached Renfrewshire Licensing Overprovision Assessment - The analysis clearly identified an area of proposed overprovision in Paisley Town Centre, with a significant overlap in terms of the main hotspot area for licensed premises, violent crime and ASB within the same area.
- **Licensing Hours** - Having regard to the Board's current policy, the Chief Constable has not identified any issues with regards to its provisions in terms of licensing hours, and is satisfied that there is sufficient opportunity under its terms and under those of the legislation, to allow Police Scotland to make pertinent comment on individual cases as and when a need arises. Accordingly, the Chief Constable does not propose any amendment and would not wish to make further comment.

- Children and young Persons' access to licensed premises - Similarly, in regard to the above, the Chief Constable is satisfied that the provisions of the current policy serve and have served Children and Young Persons well in Renfrewshire. In the absence of any substantial increase in the prevalence of incidents or crimes involving Children and Young Persons in Renfrewshire licensed premises, the Chief Constable has no comment to make, nor amendment to propose.
- Occasional Licences/Extended Hours - In terms of Occasional Licences and Extended Hours licences, once again, the Chief Constable remains satisfied that the arrangements existing under the current policy allow Police Scotland sufficient scope to make comment and/or representation when necessary in individual cases, and to have a sufficient degree of oversight and control over occasional and extended hours licences generally. Accordingly, the Chief Constable has no comment to make nor amendment to propose.

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RENFREWSHIRE LICENSING – OVERPROVISION ASSESSMENT

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AIM

To provide an assessment as to the current provision of licensed premises within Renfrewshire, specifically identifying any 'hotspots' of licensed premises and whether these bear any relationship to hotspots for violence and antisocial behaviour (ASB) within the Local Authority Area.

DATA

Data relating to licensed premises operating within Renfrewshire was provided by the Renfrewshire & Inverclyde Licensing Department.

Crime data for the period 2018 – 2022 was extracted from ScOMIS, crimes for inclusion being common assault (including assault of emergency worker), serious assault, robbery (including assault with intent to rob), attempted murder and murder.

Incident data for the period 2018 – 2022 was also extracted from ScOMIS, incorporating all relevant ASB codes.

CONCLUSIONS


- Analysis identified a high degree of overlap in terms of hotspots for licensed premises in Renfrewshire and areas with a high concentration of violent crime and reports of antisocial behaviour.
- The principal 'hotspot' for licensed premises identified within Renfrewshire was Paisley Town Centre (see Map 1) – covering an area of 0.38 square kilometres.
- The primary hotspot for violent crime predominantly overlapped the licensed premises hotspot in Paisley Town Centre, albeit this extended over a wider area (0.68 square kilometres). It is likely that a higher level of footfall in the surrounding area associated with foot traffic to and from the primary night time economy area in Paisley is a contributor to the violence hotspot which extends beyond the borders of the identified licensed premises hotspot.
- The primary hotspot for reported incidents of antisocial behaviour also significantly overlapped the licensed premises hotspot in Paisley Town Centre, although the ASB hotspot covered a significantly larger area that extended well beyond the bounds of the licensed premises hotspot. As before, it is likely the concentrated area of licensed premises in Paisley Town Centre contributed to this wider spread of ASB incidents due to increased footfall to/from the night time economy area and the contribution of alcohol to such incidents, including on the surrounding area.
- The analysis would suggest that there is a high correlation between increased concentration of licensed premises and the occurrence of violent crime and disorder. It is therefore recommended that the licensed premises hotspot


located in Paisley Town Centre (as shown on the following maps) is regarded as an area of current overprovision.

KEY TO INTERPRETATION OF MAPS

The circular black contour line denotes the identified licensed premises hotspot, with black dots identifying the location of specific licensed premises. The blue contour indicates the identified hotspot for violent crime in Renfrewshire, while the green contour shows the hotspot for antisocial behaviour incidents. The area contained within the circular black contour line is therefore the area identified for consideration as having ‘overprovision’, due to the high degree of overlap between concentration of licensed premises, crimes of violence and ASB incidents within this zone.

Clerk's Comments on Response from Police Scotland

Police Scotland have indicated in an email response that they do not propose any changes to the Board's current policy in respect of licensing hours, children and young persons' access and occasional licence/ extended hours applications.

Police Scotland have proposed that the existing area designated as overprovided be extended to a significantly larger area. Police Scotland have not provided detailed statistics for this area at this stage, although they have identified the extended area as a new 'hotspot' (referencing the terms of previous statutory guidance under the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005, which guidance was in operation until its replacement in January 2023). In this regard, Police Scotland have provided, at this stage, a colour coded plan, showing this area outlined in black, under explanation that this area has a high overlap between concentration of licensed premises, crimes of violence (area outlined in blue) and antisocial behaviour incidents (area outlined in green).

The Board will note that Police Scotland have not indicated at this time which types of licensed premises they consider to be overprovided in the proposed extended area, although they have referred in general terms to footfall to and from the night time economy. Ultimately, this will be a matter for the Board to determine, following further, formal consultation, should the Board decide to select the extended area proposed by Police Scotland as a locality for the purposes of formal consultation.

It should be noted that Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership have proposed a number of localities based on intermediate geographies (referred to as "intermediate datazones"). Neither the existing area declared overprovided by the Board nor the extended area now proposed by Police Scotland are based on these intermediate geographies. The Board should note that both the area declared in the Board's current overprovision assessment and the extended area now proposed by Police Scotland fall within the Paisley Central intermediate geography proposed by Renfrewshire Health and Social Partnership.

The Board will require to ensure that any localities identified for the purposes of further, formal consultation do not overlap. It is not legally permissible for the Board to introduce an overprovision policy which results in a licensed premises being located in more than one locality. This would cause practical difficulties in relation to the application of the policy following receipt of an application so located and raise the potential for legal challenge.

The identification of localities, as stated in the main report, is a matter for the Board. The locality proposed by Police Scotland is shown as plan B within Appendix 4 together with accompanying information.

Paper Title: Renfrewshire HSCP Response to Consultation on Statement of Licensing Policy 2023

The response has been prepared by Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP), in conjunction with Renfrewshire Alcohol and Drug Partnership (ADP) and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde Public Health Department. This response will assist the Licensing Board to identify areas of over-provision as well contributions within the following areas :-

- Licensing Hours
- Childrens and young persons' access to licensed premises
- Occasional licences
- Licensing Conditions for Alcohol Delivery

1.0 Overprovision

Alcohol is responsible for significant levels of morbidity and mortality (Scottish Health Survey, 2015). Research shows that higher availability of alcohol is associated with alcohol-related hospital admissions and mortality for all alcohol-related conditions in general, and for liver cirrhosis (Richardson EA, 2015) and is associated with:-

- increased overall alcohol consumption
- greater average levels of drinking among students
- alcohol-related violence
- self-reported injuries
- alcohol-related road traffic crashes
- sexually transmitted infections (STI)
- child abuse and neglect
- suicide
- domestic violence

Availability of alcohol refers to how easy it is to purchase alcohol either from on sales such as pubs, restaurants or clubs or off sales like supermarkets and shops. Research carried out over the last few years has clearly shown an association between alcohol availability and alcohol related harm.

In considering areas for over-provision within Renfrewshire, the HSCP have analysed Renfrewshire data for both Alcohol Related Hospital Admissions and Alcohol Specific Deaths

at Intermediate datazone level (Appendix 1 & 2) as well as considering Alcohol Outlet Density within Renfrewshire (Appendix 3 & 4).

Studies from other countries have consistently found an association between alcohol availability and alcohol-related problems, particularly outlet density (the number of alcohol outlets in a given area). Previous research carried out in 2014 by Centre for Research on Environment, Society and Health at the Universities of Edinburgh and Glasgow (CRESH) suggests that this relationship is also true for Scotland.

This CRESH research identified the existence of an outlet availability threshold of 6 offsales, 9 onsales or 14 total outlets within 800m – below which hospital admission rates do not differ but above which rates increased significantly.

The table below outlines 28 areas within Renfrewshire - 25 of which have higher levels of Alcohol Related Hospital Admissions and/or Alcohol Specific Deaths than the national average and 17 that contain have areas with alcohol outlet density at or above the CRESH threshold of 14 total outlets within an 800m radius.

Recommendations

In light of the data presented Renfrewshire HSCP recommends:-

1. All over-provision areas should cover on sales, off sales and clubs – not just liquor or pub type premises as per the current Statement.
2. All areas identified within the table above should be examined by the Licensing Board when formulating over-provision policy in Renfrewshire. Particular attention should be taken when considering those 12 areas with a red status – as these meet all 3 indicators set out by the HSCP – namely higher than the national average for

both Alcohol Specific Deaths and Alcohol Related Hospital Admissions and also contain a total outlet threshold on or above the CRESH Threshold of 14 outlets within an 800m radius. These are:

3. Paisley West Area meets outlet availability above the CRESH Threshold and has an Alcohol Related Hospital Admission rate 50% higher than National rate and should also be considered for over-provision status within this review.

4. Although not containing an outlet density that meets the CRESH Threshold the following areas experience a very high level of alcohol related harm and close regard should be paid to them when considering areas of over-provision:

Kilbarchan - Alcohol Specific Death rate among highest in Renfrewshire over twice as high as National rate 2016-2021.

Linwood South - Alcohol Specific Death Rate 50% higher than the National rate 2016-21.

Paisley Foxbar - Alcohol Related Hospital admission rate more than 50% higher than National rate 2016-22 & Alcohol Specific Death rate double National rate 2016-21

Paisley Glenburn West - Alcohol Related Hospital admission rate 50% higher than National rate 2016-22 & Alcohol Specific Death rate over double National rate 2016-22 and consistently among the highest in Renfrewshire.

2.0 Licensing Hours

Evidence clearly shows that reducing the availability of alcohol can reduce alcohol related harm. Renfrewshire experiences amongst the highest levels of alcohol related harm in Scotland. The 2022 MESAS report compiled by NHS Health Scotland (2021) showed that the majority of alcohol is purchased in off sales premises. In 2021, 85% of all alcohol sold in Scotland was sold through the off-trade (supermarkets and other off-licences) an increase from 72% in 2019. This change in purchasing patterns can be linked to the COVID-19 pandemic however the current cost of living crisis may mean this trend continues. Reducing off sales opening hours by at least one hour or more would contribute to an overall reduction in alcohol availability, ultimately reducing alcohol related harm.

Recommendations:

1. The commencement of off sales on a Sunday should be restricted to 11am for future licensing applications.

2. Renfrewshire HSCP would also welcome the restriction of the licensed hours for new off sales licensing applications earlier than the current terminal hour of 10pm would have the same impact as restricting opening times.
3. Additionally Renfrewshire HSCP suggest any broadening of total licensing hours available in a day within the on trade above 14 don't align with the findings of Renfrewshire Alcohol and Commission and the work partners are undertaking to tackle alcohol harms locally.

3.0 Children and young persons' access to licensed premises

There is overwhelming evidence that children who see adults consuming alcohol to excess regard this behaviour as relatively normal. This has resulted in children and young people commencing alcohol consumption at an earlier age and consuming more alcohol than non exposed peers. Children and young people who have adopted heavy drinking at a young age are more likely to continue to drink heavily as adults and to develop significant alcohol related health problems and dependence in later life (Palmer et al 2010).

Recommendation:

1. Renfrewshire HSCP would welcome clear and explicit guidance within the policy excluding the sale of alcohol within premises that young people may regularly use such as Libraries, Hairdressers & Sports Facilities.

4.0 Occasional licences

Occasional licenses increase availability of alcohol and can impact on the licensing objectives. The nature of Occasional licenses makes the monitoring of alcohol outlets difficult with new premises currently able to use Occasional licenses to provide alcohol for an indefinite period. Additionally Occasional licenses are often used to enable alcohol to be available at events often attended by children such as sports events, fundraisers and market places.

Recommendations:

1. Renfrewshire HSCP support the approach that if any applicant repeatedly applies for an occasional licence, then they should submit an application for a premises licence after a 13 week period.
2. In addition to this, the applicant should be asked to justify their reason for applying for a liquor licence (occasional), in particular, for occasions where children and young people are in attendance. This area should be reviewed to incorporate the Board's position on granting access to these events for children and young people and how this will be monitored.
3. Governance around events should also be strengthened to encourage "no alcohol events" where the event involves children and young people such as football award ceremonies, school fetes and sporting events.

5.0 Licensing Conditions for Alcohol Delivery

Alcohol deliveries and internet sales are not a new issue and took place before the previous Policy Statement review in 2017/18 however the COVID-19 pandemic and related restrictions have accelerated the general trend to online shopping. Despite the reopening of physical stores, it is predicted that online sales will remain high as people have become more accustomed to online shopping. Research by Alcohol Change UK found major weaknesses in online age verification and failures in checking age when delivering alcohol to people's homes. Test purchases undertaken with this Research found that in nearly three-quarters (72%) of cases where alcohol was ordered for delivery within two hours, it was subsequently handed over to the 18- and 19-year-old participants without seeking proof of age, in direct contravention of retailer's own published policies.

The types of businesses that sell alcohol online now range from small independent traders, specialist drinks retailers/clubs, local convenience stores, and supermarkets through to multinational e-commerce companies (e.g., Amazon). There is also a growing variety of app-based retailers who have arrangements with restaurants, takeaways and off-licences to deliver alcohol directly to people's homes and the HSCP would like the Licensing Board to consider the following conditions for alcohol delivery to be included in the new Licensing Policy:

Recommendations:

1. If licensed premises employ their own delivery staff these staff members should be trained in Challenge 25 age verification process to same level as rest of the staff and ensure they undertake this process when delivering alcohol.
2. If a third party is employed for deliveries it is the responsibility of the premises licence holder to ensure that the delivery partner follows the Challenge 25 age verification process when delivering items including alcohol.
3. Any deliveries including alcohol must not be left with anyone under 18 years old, anyone who is visibly intoxicated/"drunk" or in a 'safe space' outside the home.
4. Deliveries containing alcohol should only be permitted when delivering with food unless the licenced premises is a dedicated off sales premises.

To note there was no reported young people from Renfrewshire who took part in the survey.

The HSCP would like to ensure that young people are consulted with regarding the new Licensing Policy particularly to gather their views on online sales and deliveries of alcohol and what they would recommend locally.



Appendix 4 Analysis of Outlet Availability in Renfrewshire

Renfrewshire HSCP measured Alcohol availability locally using the Outlet Density measure with every Alcohol Licence (On, Off & Private Members clubs) plotted on a map to provide appropriate data (Appendix 3) for analysis.

The CRESH research around over-provision that defined 800m as a 'typical neighbourhood experienced by the population of a datazone, and was unaffected by artificially-imposed datazone boundaries or differing datazone sizes.' Their findings suggests the existence of an outlet availability threshold of 6 offsales, 9 onsales or 14 total outlets within 800m – below which hospital admission rates do not differ but above which rates increased significantly. As such it was agreed to use an 800m radii when considering outlet density locally.

The HSCP used the 'centroid' of Renfrewshire's 225 datazones as a reference for Outlet Density. These centroids are used to link data zones to other (higher level) geographies and produce a 'best-fit' match.

Given that some data zones are small (in some cases taking minutes to cross) it is difficult to be confident that the impact of very dense areas of outlets will be effectively described by the boundaries of the datazone itself. There is a risk that if we examine only the datazones with the greatest harm and outlet density, and declare only those small areas overprovided, that the existing nearby provision may be driving harm could be ignored. This could lead too new outlets simply being dispersed to the periphery of the datazone's boundaries, spreading the over-provision rather than addressing it. As such, the HSCP believe it would be reasonable to identify areas at Intermediate datazone level

From the data the following Intermediate datazone areas contain areas datazone areas which are at or above the CRESH Threshold for total On and Offsales (excluding Private members clubs):

Clerk's Comments on Response from Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership

Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership ("the Partnership") focus the terms of their response on overprovision, licensing hours, children's and young person's access to licensed premises, occasional licences and licensing conditions for alcohol deliveries.

Overprovision-

The Partnership provide a general overview of their concerns regarding alcohol harms before providing details of a number of intermediate geographies within Renfrewshire which cause them concern and which they ask the Board to consider as localities which are in their view overprovided.

The Partnership identify some 28 such areas, although, by use of colour coding (based on whether certain averages/ thresholds are met), they identify some of these areas as being of higher concern than others. They then also comment on some of the proposed areas other than the first twelve listed by them with regard to specific alcohol harms. The Partnership set out supporting data on alcohol-related harms within the Appendices to their response.

The identification of localities, as stated in the main report, is a matter for the Board. The localities proposed by the Partnership are shown in plans C to DD at Appendix 4 to the report, with accompanying information.

The Board may wish to note the following matters arising from the Partnership's response as regards overprovision:-

- (a) The Partnership indicate that they will wish any new overprovision areas to cover on sales, off sales and clubs- not just liquor or pub type premises as covered by the Board's existing overprovision policy. In this regard, the Board should note that qualifying members' clubs are explicitly excluded from assessments of overprovision and from the overprovision ground of refusal. This is provided by section 125 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005.
- (b) Further, the Board will, when ultimately deciding the terms of a new overprovision policy, require to consider whether it wishes all on sales premises, including hotels and restaurants, for example, to be covered. It is open to the Board, also, in determining the terms of its policy, when an exception to the terms of the policy might be allowed.
- (c) As stated in the comments to Police Scotland's response, the Paisley Central intermediate geography includes within its geographical extent both the existing declared overprovision area and the proposed extended area now requested by Police Scotland. Similarly, the Paisley North West (and possibly Paisley West) intermediate geographies include what would likely be regarded as Millarston, which is referred to by the Licensing Forum in its response. For the reasons stated in those earlier comments, the Board will require to ensure that no localities are selected which would result in premises being located in more than one declared locality.
- (d) The Partnership provide an explanation of the outlet density information upon which they rely at Appendix 4. The Board will note that the CRESH outlet density information is based on a radius of 800 metres. It may therefore be, as a result, that the level of outlet density referred to does not apply throughout the whole of a given intermediate geography

proposed by the Partnership as a locality. The plans shown at Appendix 4 show the location of licensed premises within the current declared locality and each of the proposed localities. Further information in relation to the CRESH data is available at

- (e) The Board will be aware that it requires to ensure that its policy statement seeks to promote the licensing objectives. In relation to these localities, the Board may note the comments provided in the Partnership's response. Should the Board select any of the localities detailed by the Partnership, or any other localities, for further consultation and study, the Board will ultimately require to determine whether these localities are overprovided in respect of all licensed premises or premises of a particular type (for example, off-sales only premises).

The Board should note developments in case law regarding assessment of overprovision.

Firstly, in *Martin McColl Limited v West Dunbartonshire Licensing Board*, which was decided prior to the Board's current policy being agreed in 2018, the court supported an argument by the Board, in relation to an exception contained within the Board's overprovision policy, that it was entitled to have regard to the health benefits to prospective employees, in rebutting the presumption against the grant of a licence in a declared locality. The court accepted that the potential health benefits to the employees for whom jobs were to be created by the licensed premises could accord with the licensing object of protecting and improving public health.

In a 2022 case, *Aldi Stores Limited v Dundee City Licensing Board*, where the Board refused an application for a provisional premises licence on the basis of overprovision, Aldi argued that the Board should have had regard to the effects of minimum unit pricing of alcohol. The impending introduction of minimum pricing was raised during the consultation upon the Board's Statement of Licensing Policy. It was argued that overprovision policy was concerned with availability of alcohol and the pricing of alcohol and that, accordingly, the question of overprovision required to take account of the effects of the minimum unit pricing legislation. Matters of affordability and availability had been raised by the local Health Partnership during the consultation, with price and reducing availability being argued to be the most effective measures in reducing consumption and, therefore, harm.

The court accepted the introduction of minimum pricing and the role of price ought to have been taken into account as significant factors when adopting the overprovision policy. The court did accept that other factors, such as density, might be of greater significance, but, if the Board decided to discount or ignore price, they had to provide some explanation.

The Board may wish to note that a recent report was published on 21 March 2023 highlighting the impact of Minimum Unit Pricing (MUP) on deaths and hospital admissions. The study evaluated the impact of MUP on alcohol health harms, over the first two-and-half years of the minimum unit pricing policy (which came into effect in May 2018). It estimated a 13.4% reduction in deaths and a 4.1% reduction in hospital admissions, wholly attributable to alcohol consumption following the implementation of MUP. The study also found that MUP reduced deaths and hospital admissions where alcohol consumption may be one of a range of causative factors. The findings cover the period from MUP implementation up to the end of 2020.

A series of evaluations relating to MUP have now been carried out. Further details are available on the Public Health Scotland website:

The provisions of the Alcohol (Minimum Pricing) (Scotland) Act 2012, which introduced MUP in 2018, are due to expire at the end of April 2024 unless the Scottish Parliament votes for it to continue.

Licensing Hours-

The Partnership suggest that the licensing hours for off-sales should be reduced, by means of altering the commencement or terminal hour of premises. While a consultation question has been included in the proposed Issues Paper regarding off-sales hours, the Board will be aware that any reduction to the licensed hours in the Statement of Licensing Policy will not reduce the hours during which existing licensed premises can trade, as the policy would only apply to future applications.

The Board's existing Statement of Licensing Policy reflects the terms of the original, and now updated, statutory guidance regarding the total licensing hours within a day. The new statutory guidance does not amend the previous version regarding the reference to 14 hours. Some licensed premises within Renfrewshire have been granted hours in excess of 14. Irrespective of the terms of the Board's policy on licensing hours, it is always open to an applicant to request an exception to the terms of a policy, which request the Board then requires to consider on its individual merits.

Children and young persons' access to licensed premises

The suggestion by the Partnership is reflected within the Issues Paper. The Board will appreciate that any changes to the policy regarding the basis upon which children and young persons are admitted to licensed premises will not change the terms of existing licences.

Occasional Licences

In considering the Partnership's comments on this matter, the Board may wish to note a decision of the courts following the refusal of an occasional licence by Glasgow Licensing Board.

In *Keasim Ltd v City of Glasgow Licensing Board*, a decision from 2021, the court considered the issue of repeated applications for occasional licences. While the judgment is not strictly binding on Paisley Sheriff Court, the court took the view that "circumvention of procedure", or perceived abuse of process, is not one of the grounds for refusal of an occasional licence application permitted by the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005. The court considered that the Glasgow Licensing Board's decision-making process had been skewed by an error in this regard and stated that a Licensing Board has no legislative authority to unilaterally impose an occasional licence limit.

The court also said that, where an application is validly made for an occasional licence, then it can only be refused if one or more of the statutory grounds for refusal applies. While the Glasgow Licensing Board had sought to rely on two of the licensing objectives to support their decision to refuse, the court were not satisfied that there was a proper factual basis for this and that the Board were therefore bound to grant the application. The court stated that there was no onus on the part

of the applicant for the licence to show that a threat of public nuisance or to public safety (which were the basis of the licensing objectives relied upon) would not arise.

The court were, further, not persuaded by an argument relating to the absence of Planning and other certificates which would normally require to accompany a full application for a premises licence, as the legislation does not require these to be obtained for an occasional licence.

It may be that the Scottish Government will legislate to introduce restrictions on the number or duration of these licences. A national consultation on this issue was carried out prior to the pandemic.

Regarding the specific comments relating to occasional licences by the Partnership, and against the above background, officers would offer the following comments:

It would be open to the Board to require that, after a certain number of occasional licence applications for the same premises, subsequent applications would require to be referred to the full Licensing Board. Should the Board wish to introduce that practice, it may wish to carefully consider the potential implications for premises who have already been operating on occasional licences and who may already have operated under the number of occasional licences determined as above. Equally, there is a possibility that certain premises may not be immediately able to obtain the certificates required to support their application due to factors beyond their control. Currently, officers already encourage the early submission of a premises licence application in these circumstances.

The above matter was subject of consultation during the previous policy review in 2018. This was prior to the above decision of the courts in Keasim Limited.

Regarding applicants justifying the reason for an application, the legislation requires applications to be granted in the absence of a representation, objection or report. Where such responses are received, applications require to be decided on the basis of the grounds set out in the legislation.

Regarding “no alcohol events”, the Board only has power to regulate the sale of alcohol. It would appear that the Partnership wish to create a policy presumption that an occasional licence for the sale of alcohol at certain events would be refused. Were such a policy to be introduced, it would still require to be supported by a representation, objection or report, otherwise the application would require to be granted. It is open to Police Scotland, the Licensing Standards Officers and any other persons to make comments in response to an application under the terms of the legislation at present. It is also open to those parties to make comments in relation to what they consider to be the appropriate level of children’s access where alcohol is to be sold under a proposed occasional licence.

Licensing Conditions for Alcohol Delivery

The Partnership provide general information regarding this matter before suggesting changes to conditions. The Board were one of the first, in 2018, to introduce local policy conditions regarding alcohol deliveries.

Any further conditions which may be introduced regarding alcohol deliveries will continue only to apply to alcohol dispatched from premises within Renfrewshire (which have had the policy

conditions attached to their licence). Alcohol which is dispatched from outwith Renfrewshire will not be subject to Renfrewshire Licensing Board's conditions.

The Issues Paper, as drafted, seeks comments from consultees regarding possible changes to the existing local conditions in Renfrewshire. These relate to the Challenge 25 type checks currently provided for and the possible inclusion of a prohibition against leaving alcohol with an intoxicated person.

Officers do not recommend consultation on a question regarding alcohol requiring to be delivered with food from particular premises.

RENFREWSHIRE LICENSING FORUM

RESPONSE TO RENFREWSHIRE LICENSING BOARD CONSULTATION ON STATEMENT OF LICENSING POLICY 2023

In response to the Renfrewshire Licensing Board consultation on the Statement of Licensing Policy 2023, Renfrewshire Licensing Forum submit the following: -

1) Overprovision

1.1 The Licensing Forum are aware of the impact Covid 19 has had on onsales premises with many on premises now operating shorter hours and dealing with rising costs. This coupled with the rising cost of living is encouraging many people to consume more alcohol at home and the forum are of the opinion that overprovision should be measured using all premises and not just onsales as per current policy.

1.2 The Licensing Forum are also aware of an increase in capacity around the Millerston area (PA1 2UZ). It has noted there are now 4 premises within a 50m radius providing alcohol and still retail space for more. The Licensing forum believe this area should be considered as an area of overprovision in the updated policy

2) Alcohol Deliveries

2.1 The licensing forum are aware that the COVID 19 pandemic accelerated the number of premises delivering alcohol locally. As such the Licensing forum would welcome the following to be considered within the new policy:

1. All drivers who deliver alcohol, whether from a premise or 3rd party, either have a personal licence or have at least undertaken the 2 hour mandatory training
2. The board considers restricting alcohol delivery purchases to be completed by 930pm to limit the potential for impulse buying online or via apps close to offsales closing times.
3. The board considers setting a spend ratio on alcohol to food/other provisions to stop the ability for people to buy one non alcohol item and then a large amount of alcohol.
4. Currently once a premise receives a licence that includes the ability to deliver alcohol then this premise can deliver to any locality that it wishes. This makes it difficult to then consider whether and in what areas this application may impact on alcohol consumption and as such difficult to build a comprehensive view around issues such as overprovision. The forum asks the board to restrict the geographical areas that licence holders can deliver alcohol to. The forum suggests that this can be done by asking new applicants to identify localities they wish to include within their delivery service.

4. The forum would welcome the board asking premises who deliver alcohol to make information known on alcohol deliveries including:

- Time and date orders are made
- Time and date orders are received
- Ratio of alcohol to other products ordered
- Postcode/Locality order was delivered.

5. The forum is aware that alcohol deliveries are received by Renfrewshire residents from businesses outwith Renfrewshire and welcome Renfrewshire Licensing Board approaching other areas to put into place a system to allow the above data to be collated for Renfrewshire (eg Supermarkets outwith Renfrewshire regularly deliver groceries, including alcohol, to Renfrewshire).

2.2 Should any of the above suggestions be unable to be included within the updated Licensing Policy then the forum would encourage Renfrewshire Licensing Board to use all of its available powers and lobby the Scottish Government/any other relevant parties to make changes to allow these in the future. This would further strengthen Renfrewshire Licensing Board in terms of improving health and wellbeing, a recommendation that came from Renfrewshires Alcohol and Drug Commission report 2020.

Clerk's Comments on Response from Renfrewshire Licensing Forum

Overprovision

The Licensing Forum in their response express their opinion that overprovision should be measured using all premises and not just on sales as per current policy. Any policy applying to all premises, without exception, would cover premises such as hotels and restaurants which are excluded from the current policy. The Board will have to consider which types of premises ought to be included within its overprovision policy, following upon the formal consultation.

It is not entirely clear whether the Forum are of the view that the current policy, whereby an area in Paisley Town Centre is designated for certain on-sales premises, should be altered to include all licensed premises and whether, in addition to off-sales only premises, the Forum would also wish the area to be designated as overprovided in respect of restaurants, hotels and nightclubs, to which the existing policy does not apply.

The Forum do suggest that the Board should consider an area in "Millarston" for the purposes of overprovision in the new overprovision assessment. However, they have not specified the boundaries of any new locality for consideration.

The Board will note from earlier comments that Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership have suggested a number of localities for the purposes of the overprovision assessment. Included in these is the Paisley North West (and possibly Paisley West) datazones which may contain the area of Millarston to which the Forum refer.

Alcohol Deliveries

The Board, when it agreed the terms of its current Statement of Licensing Policy ("the Statement") in 2018, introduced a new set of conditions in relation to alcohol deliveries. These conditions were introduced for the purposes of protecting children and young persons from harm and are set out at Appendix III to the Statement.

The existing conditions already cover issues such as age verification checks and record keeping (including a register being kept by a delivery driver) and prevent alcohol being left unattended or with children and young persons when there is no adult to accept delivery. These conditions have been attached by the Board where a premises licence is being granted or varied to include off-sales, and in relation to occasional licences where requested by the Licensing Standards Officers or Police Scotland.

The Forum have proposed various additional conditions in relation to alcohol deliveries. Some of these proposed conditions appear to extend further than the licensing objective of protecting children and young persons from harm but may be more relevant to other licensing objectives.

The Board may wish to consider whether all or any of these proposed further conditions are "necessary or expedient" for the purposes of any of the licensing objectives.

The Board may wish to consider whether delivery drivers, who may not work in licensed premises, should be subject to the same training requirements as personal licence holders or other persons who are involved in the sale of alcohol on licensed premises.

Should the Board wish to introduce any of the proposed additional conditions suggested by the Forum in relation to alcohol deliveries, the Board will wish to consider whether it is within their licensing powers to do so.

The Board may also wish to note that, while the hours during which alcohol may be sold in off-sales premises in Scotland are limited by the terms of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 (“the Act”), the Act also provides for offences preventing alcohol deliveries between 12 midnight and 6am. The Board may wish to note that premises require to be licensed according to the place from which alcohol is dispatched: the Act does not prohibit alcohol being delivered to residents within Renfrewshire by premises within another Board area, or from outwith Scotland.

It would be open to the Board to make suggestions to the Scottish Government for changes to national legislation, as they see fit. This would be a matter for the Board, distinct from consulting upon and publishing its new Statement of Licensing Policy.



RESPONSE TO CONSULTATION ON STATEMENT OF LICENSING POLICY

Alcohol Focus Scotland (AFS) welcomes the opportunity to provide comment on the development of local licensing policy statements. Their production provides licensing boards with an opportunity to stand back from routine administrative practice and consider the bigger picture in relation to licensing in their area. Once published, if effectively implemented, policy statements can help make licensing decisions more strategic, support consistent and well-reasoned decision-making, and make the licensing process more transparent.

1. About us

AFS is the national charity working to prevent and reduce alcohol harm. Our strategic priorities include ensuring the effective implementation of licensing legislation by supporting licensing boards and forums to promote the licensing objectives. We regularly engage and work with a wide range of licensing stakeholders, including licensing board members, licensing clerks, Licensing Standards Officers, NHS, police, Alcohol and Drug Partnerships, communities, and local licensing forums.

AFS also provides training courses for those involved in the regulation of licensing to meet the requirements of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005; this includes the Licensing Board Members Training and Licensing Standards Officers Training in Scotland.

2. About our response

As a national charity, AFS is not in a position to provide an individually tailored response to each of the 40 licensing boards in Scotland. However, we can offer our views on the general policy direction and emerging issues relevant to alcohol licensing, and suggestions about aspects of licensing policy that may warrant particular scrutiny during this round of policy development.

Our response has been informed by recent work AFS has undertaken to identify areas of progress and ongoing challenge within the licensing system, including a [review of the Statements of Licensing Policy for 2018-2023](#). We believe that this work and our ongoing engagement with a breadth of licensing stakeholders affords us a unique, national perspective on the licensing system. We hope that this insight and the suggestions we have provided below will be helpful to inform the Board's licensing policy review.

3. The national context

The development of licensing policies provides boards with a timely opportunity to consider emerging issues and legislative developments, and to adapt their approaches accordingly. As such, this section sets out key national developments which may be of particular relevance to licensing boards.

3.1. Post-COVID Recovery

AFS expects that, during this round of policy development, boards will be particularly keen to consider the actual and projected impact of COVID-19 on the licensing objectives and the licensed sector. While we do not yet know the full impact of the pandemic, there is evidence of its effects in a number of areas. The following topics are highly relevant to licensing and AFS would therefore recommend that they are taken into consideration as part of the licensing policy review process:

Changing drinking patterns: Evidence indicates that drinking habits have polarised as a result of the pandemic, with an overall decrease in consumption for lighter drinkers and an increase for heavier drinkers.^{1 2 3} Of major concern is the increase in high-risk drinking observed in England,^{4 5} which has sustained over the entirety of the pandemic.⁶ While equivalent research is not yet available for Scotland, it is likely that we will be experiencing similar increases, especially considering our historically higher levels of alcohol consumption and harm compared to the rest of the UK.⁷ Combined with reduced access to services, these changing drinking patterns have tragically translated into increased harm; alcohol-specific deaths in Scotland increased by 17% in 2020 and a further 5% in 2021.⁸ However, it can take 20 years to see the full effects of changes in alcohol consumption on harms, such as for cancers.⁹ The pandemic and economic crisis is also being experienced differently by different parts of our population, widening existing inequalities and creating new ones.

Home drinking: Linked to the above, the pandemic has further shifted alcohol sales and drinking from the on-trade to the off-trade, exacerbating existing trends. In Scotland, 73% of alcohol was sold in off sales prior to the pandemic, with this proportion increasing to 90% in 2020 before decreasing slightly to 85% in 2021.¹⁰ The home is an unregulated environment and the continued shift to home drinking may lead to long-term public health consequences and an upwards trend in alcohol-related injuries and accidents occurring at home. In addition, while alcohol itself does not directly cause domestic violence, there are strong associations between alcohol use and domestic violence and abuse.¹¹ Home drinking also poses potential risks for children and young people, such as neglect or modelling of parental drinking.¹² As such, it will be vital that boards consider the factors that can impact on the licensing objectives outwith a licensed setting, and that local licensing policies take account of alcohol-related harms occurring in private spheres as well as public.

The hospitality sector: Although the licensing regime does not have responsibility for promoting business growth, a recurrent theme within existing licensing policies is the need for boards to strike an appropriate balance between supporting the local licensed economy, while also upholding the five licensing objectives. During the pandemic, the hospitality sector was severely affected, with sales of alcohol in bars and restaurants plummeting by 49% overall from 2019 to 2021, while off-premises sales, such as e-commerce and supermarkets, grew significantly (by 11% between 2019 and 2021).¹³ In 2020, the Scottish Government issued guidance to advise that it “*considers flexibility and pragmatism in decision-making and sensitivity to the wider economic situation should be at the forefront of how a board decides to operate*”.¹⁴ Boards will likely be very reluctant to be seen to hurt already suffering hospitality sectors but will also want to ensure that the licensing objectives continue to be promoted. As such, decision makers, advocates, and local stakeholders alike will need to identify policies that can do both. It has been suggested that policies which may protect on-trade businesses, while reshaping the night-time economy away from alcohol-related harms, could offer a ‘win-win’ for policymakers and health advocates.¹⁵ However, this raises questions regarding how boards should seek to manage competing priorities within their policies and decision-making.

Use of outdoor areas: A growing trend for outside seating areas had been identified in many areas prior to the pandemic, with a number of boards setting out their expectations and requirements in this regard. However, COVID-19 related restrictions on sales of alcohol indoors led to an increase in applications from bars/pubs to serve alcohol in spaces outdoors e.g., car parks, pavements. If outdoor spaces are licensed on a permanent basis it could result in a significant increase in the overall capacity of venues and the visibility of alcohol, including to children and people in recovery who may be passing by. However, it is unclear how and whether boards will now seek to reverse outdoor licences granted during the pandemic, or whether the trend for outdoor seating areas will continue to grow.

Online sales/deliveries: The COVID-19 related restrictions have accelerated the general trend to online shopping and led to an increase in premises offering home deliveries of alcohol. The types of businesses that sell alcohol online now range from small independent traders, specialist drinks retailers/clubs, local convenience stores, and supermarkets through to multinational e-commerce companies (e.g., Amazon). There is also a growing variety of app-based retailers who have arrangements with restaurants, takeaways and off-licences to deliver alcohol directly to people's homes. Despite the reopening of physical stores, it is predicted that online sales will remain high as people have become more accustomed to online shopping. However, there is currently a distinct lack of information available about the business operations of online retailers in Scotland. In addition, it is unclear how age verification and other requirements can be effectively implemented when alcohol is being purchased on-line or delivered to people's homes. The majority of boards have responded to this issue at a local level by setting out their approach to alcohol deliveries within their policies, for example by making clear that delivery staff must be trained to the same level as those on licensed premises, that challenge 25 checks must be conducted, and that licensees using courier services must ensure that they are compliant with the Board's requirements.

3.2. Policy and legislative developments

Alcohol Framework: Scotland's current alcohol harm prevention framework was published in 2018 and takes a whole population approach to reducing alcohol harm. Whole population measures work to reduce and prevent alcohol harm across the entire population, reducing the likelihood of 'normal' drinkers becoming high risk. This is because targeting only harmful drinkers would not reach the majority of people who consume alcohol and who are therefore at risk of developing problems related to their alcohol consumption. Licensing is a whole population intervention. It works to safeguard individuals and communities from experiencing alcohol problems by controlling the overall availability of alcohol (through the number, type and opening hours of licensed premises), and by regulating the way individual on- and off-licences do business. The Framework therefore identifies the licensing system - alongside action on price and marketing - as being one of the key mechanisms through which the ambitions of the Alcohol Framework can be realised.

Minimum Unit Pricing (MUP): MUP came into force on 1st May 2018 and, along with restrictions on irresponsible promotions, there are now greater controls on the sale of alcohol from off-sales. Boards appear to be approaching these developments differently; for example, some state in their policies that these safeguards alone cannot adequately mitigate the link between the availability of responsibly sold alcohol and its unregulated consumption, while others state that the introduction of MUP of alcohol has the potential to be a more effective tool in reducing alcohol harm than overprovision. Many boards will be re-evaluating the relevance of MUP to their policies now that more information on the evaluation of the impact of MUP is available. In addition, in a recent legal case,¹⁶ an overprovision policy was struck down as unlawful because the sheriff upheld the argument that it didn't take into account that MUP had come into force. The price, availability and marketing

of alcohol can all impact consumption levels, which can in turn impact on harm, and it will be important that boards consider how different measures to tackle alcohol harm can be mutually reinforcing. In any local area it is impossible to say with any certainty what percentage of changes in alcohol consumption and alcohol related harms are due to changes in price/income as compared to availability or marketing. Accordingly, it is important to focus on the local evidence of alcohol related harm, to determine whether there is sufficient evidence of harm to support a case for controlling availability using an overprovision policy. It may also be useful for boards to consider the differential in price between on- and off-sale, as although the introduction of MUP created a floor price, it did not elevate the price of off-trade alcohol enough to reduce the gap between on- and off-trade prices.

Licensing Guidance update: In January 2023 [new guidance](#) to Scottish licensing boards on carrying out their functions was issued by Scottish ministers. The revised 'section 142' guidance replaces the original version which was first issued in 2009 and had become outdated due to subsequent changes. The purpose of the guidance is to assist boards in carrying out their functions under the 2005 Act, including the preparation of statements of licensing policy. We have therefore highlighted relevant sections of the guidance within this response to assist boards to have regard to it when undertaking their policy reviews.

Consultation on occasional licences: In 2019 the Scottish Government consulted¹⁷ on whether to raise the fee for an occasional licence from the current price of £10, and to seek views on considering a limit on the number and duration of occasional licences for premises licence holders and personal licence holders. The Scottish Government advised it would analyse the responses and, if considered appropriate, draft and lay secondary legislation embedding any new fee level or limit on the number and duration of occasional licences into Scottish law. At the time of writing there has been no secondary legislation proposed and AFS is not aware of any decisions as yet having been taken as a result of the consultation.

4. Issues to consider when reviewing the policy

4.1. Promoting the licensing objectives

It is a legal requirement that the policy must seek to promote the licensing objectives. For all objectives, AFS would suggest using the following format within the policy:

1. State the licensing objective.
2. Give a statement as to what the licensing board is trying to achieve with this objective.
3. Detail any concerns and/or trends in the area relating to this objective – identify what evidence was used to identify these.
4. List what the licensing board intends to do to promote the objective. Note that this could include actions like declaring overprovision, controlling licensed hours, or applying certain conditions (referring to the relevant section/s in the policy). However, other measures could include ensuring all policies are fit-for-purpose, working to ensure information is kept up-to-date and accessible, liaising with local partners, endorsing local initiatives relevant to the objectives, carrying out spot checks of premises, highlighting good practice, and conducting reviews of licences. A full list of board measures to promote the objectives is provided in our online resource: [Measures to promote the licensing objectives](#).
5. List any suggested actions the licensing board would like to see the licensed trade in the area undertake to meet this objective. The types of actions licensees can take often relate to specific control measures that can be put in place, the training and supervision of staff,

maintenance of premises, and co-operation with local stakeholders (e.g., LSO, police). A full list of example licensee measures to promote the objectives is provided in our online resource: [Measures to promote the licensing objectives](#).

Many boards have adopted new approaches to the promotion of objectives as knowledge and understanding of how to best promote them has evolved since the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 was first introduced. Examples of different policy approaches are now included within the section 142 guidance, including in relation to:

Preventing crime and disorder: “Alcohol related crime and disorder does not only occur within or immediately outside licensed premises. A significant proportion of alcohol is bought to be consumed at home or in other private dwellings. Whilst alcohol licensing alone cannot directly address issues such as domestic violence, licensing boards may wish to consider supporting work in this regard through partnership working. One example of a licensing board demonstrating a wider understanding of alcohol related crime can be found within West Lothian Licensing Board’s statement of licensing policy 2018.”

Protecting children and young persons from harm: “Licensing Boards will wish to be mindful that children and young people can be impacted by exposure to marketing and promotion of alcohol within licensed premises. For example, Falkirk Licensing Board comments in its statement of licensing policy 2018 that: “Where licensed premises intend to hold events where alcohol is not provided and those events are specifically targeted at children or young persons (for, example, underage discos or parent and toddler groups), consideration should be given to taking steps to avoid any obvious promotion of alcohol”.”

Protecting and improving public health: “This licensing objective encourages licensing boards to consider the cumulative effect of licensed premises on alcohol-related harm, within their licensing area, rather than the actions of any individual premises. Collecting harm data for localities will build a picture of the health and wellbeing of the people in the locality, and doing so on a consistent basis over time means the long-term health and wellbeing of a locality can be monitored and improvements made. City of Glasgow Licensing Board is an example of one of a number of licensing boards which have adopted an approach of looking at alcohol and health issues at their local authority area level, and then made a policy that seeks to promote the public health objective”.

In relation to the above, the Glasgow policy includes a section specifically pertaining to off-sales and the public health objective. This explains that the board is concerned by a number of areas suffering from high levels of alcohol-related harm but containing very few licensed premises. The board does not consider it appropriate to declare these areas as being overprovided for, but the policy makes clear that it may nonetheless be inconsistent with the public health objective to grant a licence which would enable easier access to alcohol – thereby having the potential to exacerbate existing alcohol-related health problems in the area. This is set out in section 9.2 of the [Glasgow Licensing Policy](#).

In addition, many policies set out local conditions that may and/or will be applied by the board in pursuance of the objectives. Including local conditions within policies not only provides an important indication of the ways in which the board will promote the objectives, it also provides examples of what conditions applicants could be subject to or volunteer themselves, and provides people making representations/ objections with suggestions of the kinds of conditions they can suggest. A full list of example conditions is set out in our online resource: [Examples of conditions to promote the objectives](#).

4.2. Overprovision

Overprovision is undoubtedly one of the most complex and contentious areas of licensing. AFS's review of the current licensing policies identified that boards have adopted differing approaches to how overprovision should be assessed, and seem to have different understandings of what is required in order to meet the legal tests that apply.

The primary cause of this divergence appears to be the way in which boards have interpreted and understood the concept of 'causal link'. While decisions are to be made on a balance of probabilities, there is wide variation between boards' interpretations of what evidence is required in order to meet the legal test to evidence a causal link. Although some boards seem confident to declare overprovision applying a test that considers on a balance of probabilities whether there are links between numbers of premises and levels of harm, others appear to consider that a higher bar requires to be met for causal link to be established. However, the updated guidance provides clarity around approaches to overprovision assessments and interpreting the causal link, stating that:

- *"If a Licensing Board considers there is at least potential for, or a reasonable basis for, concluding that there will be a risk of adverse impact on the objectives (should more premises licences be granted), it is entitled to come to the view that there is a state of overprovision."*
- *"Consideration should be given as to whether aggregate information and evidence from a number of sources demonstrates a link between the availability of alcohol in an area and alcohol-related harm."*
- *"To demonstrate a "dependable causal link", the proof of the link must be on a balance of probabilities. What this means in practice is that based on the evidence of harm in a locality, it is more likely than not that alcohol availability is a cause, or that increasing the availability of alcohol in that area will increase that harm."*

Boards have the flexibility to decide the approach they take to addressing overprovision in their area and can choose to focus on only the factors that cause them concern in the light of the evidence. It is likely that many boards will be keen to identify how the pandemic has impacted on the licensed economy in their area and will be considering this as part of their overprovision assessment.

At a national level, the number of off-licences in Scotland has reached the highest level since 2010, when the relevant statistics first started to be collected.¹ The closure of pubs and restaurants during the pandemic caused people to buy alcohol from other outlets and more shops and supermarkets applied for licences to meet demand. The number of off licences increased by 133 between March 2020 - March 2022, reaching a total of 5,155. Conversely, the nature of Covid-19, and the measures needed to reduce transmission, invariably had a disproportionate impact on the hospitality sector. While it is likely that many bars, pubs and other licensed premises will have closed permanently as a result, the available statistics don't enable for an assessment of how many licences were surrendered or lost. As such, it may be that the overprovision assessments will have a particular focus on the disparities between on and off sales, and the continued shift to home drinking.

¹ While the number of off-sales only premises is at its highest level since records began, due to variations in how the available statistics have been published in different years, it is impossible to say for certain whether this is true for all off-sales i.e., off-sales only premises combined with those providing both on-sales and offsales.

The boards consideration of overprovision need not be confined to only considering numbers and capacity but can take account of other factors. For example, inequality is a particularly important consideration in relation to overprovision. There is a stark inequalities gradient to alcohol harm, and a growing awareness that the impact of harmful drinking and alcohol dependence is much greater for those experiencing the highest levels of deprivation. For example, in 2021 alcohol-specific deaths were 5.6 times as frequent in the most deprived areas of Scotland compared to the least deprived areas. This compares to a ratio of 1.9 times for all causes of death.¹⁸ By taking account of evidence of inequalities, boards are able to meaningfully consider how different communities are impacted differently by alcohol and formulate an appropriate policy response.

4.3. Licensed hours

Policy statements should provide information on a licensing board's policy on licensed hours, which are important not only to individual licensed premises but can have a wider impact for an area.

AFS has identified numerous studies into the links between temporal availability and alcohol harm, which found that policies regulating times of alcohol trading can contribute to reductions in injuries, alcohol-related hospitalisations/ emergency department visits, homicides and crime.¹⁹ The vast majority of boards permit off-sales between 10am and 10pm each day, which is the maximum allowed by law. However, boards can stipulate shorter hours if they consider it to be appropriate. AFS believes that the maximum permitted off-sales hours should be the exception and not the norm, particularly in areas of high-rates of alcohol harm. In addition, the hours permitted for onsales and the night-time economy can have implications for matters such as crime and public order.

Boards can also grant a general extension of licensed hours for particular specified occasions. As such, AFS would recommend that the policy outlines the principles that the board will apply when considering applications for extended hours. For example, some policies make clear that if regular applications are made for the same premises, then applicants will be expected to consider whether they should apply to vary the premises licence. Others outline what might constitute an event of national or local significance. AFS believes that, in many cases, events and festivals can be appropriately accommodated within normal licensing hours and should not serve as automatic justification for extended licensed hours.

4.4. Children and young persons' access

It is largely for licensing boards to set out their expectations regarding factors like when children and young people should normally be allowed entry to licensed premises, including the ages at which they should be allowed entry, and the types, times and parts of premises to which they should have access. It is also for boards to determine the measures that may be necessary to protect children and young people from harm.

As such, AFS would recommend that the policy provides a clear indication of what the board might deem to be acceptable in terms of children and young peoples' access. Overall, it is the extent to which premises are likely to provide a family-friendly environment that tends to be the determining factor in boards' approaches to children's access. Conversely, premises where the supply of alcohol is the primary purpose of the service provided are frequently cited by boards as being unsuitable for children and young people.

The updated guidance provides examples of how different boards have approached this issue. Some restrict children's access to licensed premises for the primary purpose of consuming a meal or attending an event, while others set out expectations with regards to young peoples' access to

specific parts of premises, or specify the hours when young people should normally be allowed entry.

It is apparent that the majority of boards are seeking to encourage licensed premises to become more child and family friendly within their policies. However, it can also be seen that they are giving consideration to the potential impacts of alcohol on children and young people, and the objective to protect children and young people from harm. In particular, there is increased recognition that the scope of this objective is not restricted to preventing people under the legal purchase age from being sold/supplied with alcohol. Boards are also seeking to address impacts on children and young people resulting from the drinking behaviours they observe, adults drinking, and their general exposure to alcohol. Some boards are also being more directive in their approach than others, by setting out their expectations regarding children's access and applying relevant conditions as standard practice.

4.5. Supporting public participation

The updated guidance states that *"licensing boards should have effective engagement strategies in place to enable them to engage with and seek the views of their local community."* Given the public interest purpose that underpins alcohol licensing, AFS believes it essential that communities are empowered to participate in licensing processes and can feel confident that their contributions will be given due regard. The publication of policy statements provides an opportunity to set out the mechanisms available to enable community engagement and participation.

There are numerous ways in which the general public can choose to engage with the licensing system, ranging from commenting on applications and observing/participating at board meetings, to joining their local licensing forum. However, communities may not currently be aware of the various ways in which they can get involved or the types of information/supports available to enable them to participate. For example, some boards have developed pro formas to assist anyone wishing to make an objection or representation, while others highlight that LSOs are available to offer appropriate support. Many boards include a commitment in their policies that they will conduct business in a way that is not off-putting to members of the public. For example, by creating a less formal and more relaxed atmosphere so as not to intimidate parties.

4.6. Identifying strategic links

Although boards are quasi-judicial and need to undertake their decision-making independently, this does not prevent them from considering their policies in the broader context of identified local and national priorities etc. The pandemic has also highlighted the importance of partnership working across sectors. As such, the policy should indicate how the board will take into account other matters relating to alcohol, for example local crime prevention, community safety strategies, and health.

Boards in many areas have adopted a collaborative approach and committed to work with local partners where they share common objectives. As such, AFS would recommend the policy includes reference to Local Outcome Improvement Plans (LOIPs), Alcohol and Drug Partnership strategic plans, and the strategic plans of the Health and Social Care Partnerships (HSCP). Scotland's alcohol strategy 'Changing Scotland's relationship with Alcohol a Framework for Action' is of key relevance to the policy and should also be referenced. The Board should also take into account the views of local partners, the Forum, communities, when developing and implementing their new policy. The Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 and accompanying guidance should inform the Board's approach to how this can best be achieved, for example the updated guidance states:

“The alcohol licensing regime in Scotland does not exist in a vacuum and Licensing Boards should clearly explain how they will take into account other pertinent strategies and regimes when developing their statement of licensing policy. For example, the Western Isles Licensing Board statement of licensing policy comments that “The Board will work and appoint a Board Member to work with the Outer Hebrides Alcohol and Drug Partnership and the Outer Hebrides Community Safety Partnership in the Western Isles; the importance of such co-operation is recognised as part of the wider alcohol agenda”.”

4.7. Occasional licences

During 2021-2022, 23,269 occasional licences were granted in Scotland.²⁰ Occasional licence applications can be granted under delegated powers, a limited number of people are required to be notified of occasional licence applications, and the consultation period is much shorter than that for new premises applications – reducing the scope for objections or representations.

This has led to concern that some applicants have sought to use the occasional licence process as an alternative to applying for a full premises licence. As such, AFS would recommend that boards set out measures to ensure that this type of application is subject to appropriate scrutiny. For example, by including a provision to ensure that repeated occasional applications from the same applicant will be automatically referred to the board for a decision.

In addition, AFS would recommend that boards set out conditions that will specifically apply to occasional licences, either as standard practice or on a case-by-case basis. These could relate to issues such as management, supervision, security, signage and training.

4.8. Presentation and readability

Legislation does not specify how a policy statement should be organised and presented and consequently the 2018 published policy statements vary considerably in structure and length. AFS’s review of the documents identified that shortest was 25 pages while the longest policy statement was 166 pages (including appendices). Some policy statements, but not all, were written in legalistic language and provided excessive detail of administrative processes and procedures, making them somewhat laborious and difficult to read.

The updated guidance states that licensing policies:

“Must also not simply be a repeat of what is set out in legislation or statutory guidance. It should provide a clear indication to the local community as to the Licensing Board’s evidenced based policy and should seek to promote the licensing objectives (see Chapter 2 for more about the licensing objectives) set out in the 2005 Act. It is important that statement of licensing policies should be written in terms that can be easily understood by the local community as consultation with the local community (including Local Licensing Forums), is a key part of providing feedback to Licensing Boards.”

Lengthy policy statements written in legalistic and bureaucratic language can be off-putting for some stakeholders and potentially act as a barrier to community engagement in the licensing process. As such, AFS recommends that boards make conscientious efforts to create policies that are accessible to all. For example, by providing definitions of terms used throughout the policy within an appendix, and providing links to statutory provisions, guidance etc. wherever possible. Web-links and signposting can similarly be used to direct interested parties to more detailed information where required.

Clerk's Comments on Response from Alcohol Focus Scotland

Alcohol Focus Scotland (AFS) do not provide an individually tailored response for Renfrewshire and comment in more general terms on policy direction and emerging issues. As such, the statistical information regarding licensed premises and alcohol harms they give is not specific to any localities in Renfrewshire.

The guidance issued by the Scottish Government in 2020 which AFS quote in relation to the hospitality sector was statutory guidance issued by way of an update on occasional licence use for licensed premises affected by closure due to the coronavirus pandemic. At that time, many premises sought to operate outdoor areas where legal restrictions were sufficiently relaxed to allow them to do so. Regarding the licensing of outdoor areas, in Renfrewshire these have in general operated through the use of occasional licences on a rolling basis, each of which cover a maximum period of 14 days. An individual occasional licence, once issued, cannot be reversed. A change to a premises licence to allow the use of an outdoor area may be able to be reversed at a review hearing if relevant grounds for review exist.

A consultation question regarding suggested occasional licence conditions for external areas is included in the Issues Paper.

Regarding online sales, it should be noted that Scottish Licensing Boards can only license premises from which alcohol is dispatched within their own area: they cannot license premises in another part of the United Kingdom (or beyond) which are not regulated under the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005. Where premises do not require to be licensed, the Board is unable to attach conditions or implement other requirements. In Renfrewshire, various local conditions were introduced in relation to alcohol deliveries at the time of the Board's previous Statement of Licensing Policy review in 2018. It is open to the Board to consider reasonable changes to the current local conditions which, if agreed by the Board following the formal consultation, would then be considered in relation to future applications. A question in relation to the alcohol delivery conditions is included in the Issues Paper.

AFS refer to the Minimum Unit Pricing (MUP) decision from the courts in relation to Dundee City Licensing Board. A summary in relation to that matter is included in the comments to Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership's response.

It should be noted that, while the Board requires to carry out an overprovision assessment, it does not regulate the marketing of alcohol. A recent Scottish Government consultation was undertaken in relation to possible restrictions on alcohol advertising.

AFS note the introduction of the new statutory guidance in January 2023. A link to this new guidance is contained in the main report. The original guidance was published in 2007, not in 2009 as stated by AFS.

Regarding AFS's comments at Paragraph 4.1 of their response in relation to the licensing objectives, it would be open to the Board to seek comments during the formal consultation on any possible

conditions of licence which may be appropriate and other relevant matters. The Board will note however that matters such as assessing overprovision and conducting review hearings are governed by the relevant provisions of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005, while the principles the Board expects to be followed in relation to enforcement are set out in the existing policy. The examples of conditions referred to by AFS can be accessed at <https://www.alcohol-focus-scotland.org.uk/media/440020/resource-3-%E2%80%93-examples-of-conditions-to-promote-the-objectives.pdf> While the Board may wish to consult on whether any further local conditions should be agreed, it should be noted that the Board will wish to ensure that any conditions agreed for general application require to be reasonable for any given licence application, are not unduly onerous, do not replicate the provisions of other regulatory regimes and are not inconsistent with the mandatory conditions set out in the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005.

Regarding overprovision, AFS have quoted passages from the new statutory guidance. Members of the Board will be able to access the full terms of the statutory guidance from the link provided at Paragraph 3.14 of the main report. Chapter 5 of the new guidance contains information regarding the overprovision assessment.

The Board will note that general information is set out at Appendix 5 in relation to the numbers of licensed premises in Renfrewshire in recent years.

In relation to off-licensed hours, the Board is only able, under the 2005 Act, to license the sale of alcohol between the hours of 10am to 10pm. AFS propose that these statutory hours be restricted by the Board as a matter of policy. It is not wholly clear whether AFS suggest that hours be restricted in certain localities, as they state that they believe "... that the maximum permitted off-sales hours should be the exception and not the norm, particularly in areas of high-rates of alcohol harm."

AFS comment on both off-sales and on-sales in relation to licensed hours, although, in line with the rest of their response, they do not provide comments specific to Renfrewshire or localities within Renfrewshire.

It should be noted that any change to licensed hours under the policy will not alter the hours of premises which have already been licensed by the Board.

Turning to extended hours, AFS make reference to the power of Boards to grant a general extension of hours under section 67 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005, but some of the following comments refer to applications for extended hours under section 68. Renfrewshire Licensing Board's existing policy already states that in the event of repeated applications for extended hours, it will expect the applicant to consider whether an application should be made to vary the licence by adjustment of the operating plan. Renfrewshire Licensing Board's current policy does not set out what might constitute a special event of national or local significance. While it would be open to the Board to consult on a possible update to the policy during the formal consultation, it should be noted that extended hours applications can also be made on the basis of "a special event or occasion to be catered for on the premises". Should the Board outline what might constitute "an event of national or local significance", it may not be possible to anticipate all situations and there will be a need to interpret the legislation as required. As with guidance, the terms of the Board's policy, while important, cannot override the terms of the legislation.

Regarding Children and Young Persons' Access, the Board's previous policy has been not to stipulate the types of premises, times and parts of premises within which children and young persons may normally access licensed premises. In a number of individual cases over the years, the Board has restricted the children and young persons' access applied for, e.g., on consideration of comments received from Police Scotland. AFS recommend, again in general terms, that policies provide a clear indication of what the Board might deem acceptable in relation to children and young persons' access. They refer to examples of different approaches by Boards within the latest statutory guidance.

It would be open to the Board to consult on this issue. It should, however, as with licensed hours above, be noted that any ultimate change of policy would affect new applications for grant or variation: it would not result in a change to the terms of existing premises licences.

The Board may wish to seek views as to whether any further control measures, or alternatively licence conditions, ought to be introduced in relation to children's access, and in what terms.

Regarding ADFS' comments on identifying strategic links, while the Board has sought views from a number of key stakeholders during the initial, informal consultation, it would be possible to update the Statement of Licensing Policy with information about existing strategies, as the Board sees fit. The draft revised Statement for the purposes of formal consultation at Appendix 6 now references Scotland' Alcohol Strategy 'Changing Scotland's relationship with Alcohol A Framework for Action' and the work of Renfrewshire's Alcohol and Drug Commission. It may be that consultees will identify other strategies during consultation on the draft Statement.

Regarding the possibility of appointing a Board Member to work with the Alcohol and Drug Partnership, the Board may consider that it is more appropriate for them to contribute through Renfrewshire Licensing Forum and through the health board as a statutory consultee.

Regarding occasional licences, officers would draw Board Members' attention to the comments on Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership's response.

Clerk's Comments on Response from Khalid Javed

Mr. Javed expresses the view that overprovision is not a problem for the Board to consider and refers to the effect of market forces on licensed premises. He also expresses the view that nuisance and other trouble around a particular premises is attributable to failure on the part of Police Scotland.

As Board Members are aware, there is a requirement to carry out an assessment of overprovision under the terms of section 7 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005. The Board will also note that the wider Statement of Licensing Policy, of which the assessment of overprovision under section 7 is part, requires to seek to promote the licensing objectives set out in section 4 of the Act. General information at this stage regarding the numbers of licensed premises, split into categories of on-sales only, off-sales only and on and off-sales, over the last six years, is attached at Appendix 5.

The Scottish Grocer's Federation – response

The Scottish Grocers' Federation (SGF) is the trade association for the Scottish Convenience Store Sector. There are 5,098 convenience stores in Scotland, which includes all the major symbol groups, co-op and convenience multiples in Scotland. SGF promotes responsible community retailing and works with key stakeholders to encourage a greater understanding of the contribution convenience retailers make to Scotland's communities. In total, convenience stores provide over 49,000 jobs in Scotland.

Modern local convenience stores are community assets, from offering busy families a top-up shop facility on the one hand, to helping patrons (particularly vulnerable people) manage their weekly household budgets during the cost-of-living crisis and providing an essential alternative to larger or out of town supermarkets. Many people rely on their local convenience store with the average shopper visiting their local store 2.7 times per week and with 57% of customers choosing to walk as a mode of travel to stores. During the Covid pandemic in particular, local shops were on the front line, providing essential services for many vulnerable people and communities.

Local shopping has, over the years, often been replaced by large destination retail parks, gone from many areas are the local butcher, baker and grocers. The personal interaction with your local retailer is now almost uniquely reserved for your local convenience store.

Many convenience retail businesses are operating in an extremely challenging trading environment, however, and the Scottish Government has acknowledged that continuing to add to the legislative burden could put businesses at risk. In addition to meeting the requirements of new regulations, such as Minimum Unit Pricing; potential restrictions to the promotion of alcohol products and foods high in fat, sugar & salt; and Scotland's Deposit Return Scheme, the sector as a whole is among the hardest hit by issues such as food inflation, cost-of-living and rising energy costs. The cumulative cost burden of legislation on top of the pressure of these other factors are significantly adding to vulnerability of many businesses.

Being able to offer a diverse range is of paramount importance. Modern convenience stores now offer a wide range of products and services, from deli counters and coffee to collection lockers. A more restrictive range simply provides the potential customer with a reason to shop at a competitor. Whilst it is ancillary to wider ranges of grocery and retail, alcohol is an important sales category for our member's stores. A typical convenience store offers a range

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of at least 17 kinds of different product categories. Alcohol accounts for 18.1 % of total sales turnover. 76% of convenience stores have an alcohol licence.

Introduction

SGF welcomes the opportunity to contribute to the consultation exercise. We trust that you will find our comments helpful. Our comments relate primarily to Management of Premises, Licensed Hours and Overprovision.

Management of Premises

Proof of Age

SGF promote responsible community retailing and recognise the importance of selling alcohol in a responsible way.

This happens through the following key areas:

- Full compliance with the Challenge 25 regulations (an initiative developed in partnership with SGF)
- Staff training
- Appropriate signage
- In-house test purchasing
- Refusal books
- Use of CCTV
- Full compliance with the stores operating plan
- Age restricted till prompts, upon customer checkout

CCTV

SGF do not believe that it should be a requirement for all staff to be trained in the use of CCTV (or for a CCTV trained member of staff to always be present during licensed trading hours). SGF would see such a condition as an additional burden on convenience sector retailers who often have to operate with the minimum amount of staff due to cumulated cost pressures. On top of this, retailers are having to do more hours themselves with 11% of shop owners in Scotland working more than 70 hours a week. It is already the case that all off-sales premises must have a compliant CCTV system in place.

Delivery of Alcohol and consumption by persons under 18 or drunk persons

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The increased use of apps and the use of third-party delivery agents allows convenience stores to offer another important and valued facility for customers. The SGF Local Shop Report highlights that 26% of convenience stores offer some form of grocery delivery, providing an important service to their communities.

SGF members use these facilities responsibly and have strict measures, such as record keeping and age verification in place, to ensure the rules around delivery are observed.

Drivers are trained to -

1. Always hand over alcohol to an adult.
2. If no adult able to accept deliver then return all goods back to shop.
3. Never leave items on the door step.

SGF members have reported that they ban any household where they suspect underage sales maybe taking place, and go out of the way to ensure they abide by the regulation.

SGF promotes responsible retailing, including the sale of alcohol and any of the other 222 products restricted under legislation.

Licensed Hours

Off-Sales

The Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 sets out the maximum permitted hours for off sales type premises are 10am to 10pm, each day of the week. SGF supports this policy on licensed hours.

Retailers are used to the current licensed hours and so SGF would not want to see them changed. Also, SGF would not support any reduction to the available licensed hours as we believe there would be no evidential basis for such a decision and would also leave applicants for new stores at a disadvantage. There is not, in the SGF's view, any evidence to suggest that alcohol purchased later in the day is more harmful than purchased earlier or vice versa.

SGF would not support any reduction to the available licensed hours. Convenience stores are community assets which offer key services to local communities. Our members are responsible retailers and they put considerable effort into ensuring that alcohol is sold in a responsible way.

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Overprovision

We recognise the Board's duty to assess overprovision under Section 7 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 in respect of licensed premises or licensed premises of a particular description in any locality within the Board's area.

We also recognise that, in determining if there is overprovision, the Board must have regard to the number and capacity of licensed premises in the locality together with any other matter the Board sees fit.

We respectfully suggest that overprovision is a blunt instrument and does little to reduce alcohol related harm. If the licensing board decided to develop an overprovision policy, SGF would strongly urge that this is based on a locality as opposed to whole area approach.

There is no simple cause-and-effect relationship between the number of premises and alcohol-related problems and overall, it is becoming increasingly difficult to make a link between individual premises and problems in a specific locality. Inequality continues to be the main determining factor: alcohol-related harm in Scotland is still disproportionately experienced by those from more deprived areas.

Rather than taking a 'blanket' approach to overprovision regarding off-sales and public house type premises, the Board should continue to take into account the specific activities and mode of operation of the applicant. It is important to note that arguably the number or capacity of premises in a locality is unlikely to be the key factor in deciding whether there is overprovision. Instead, the determining factor is the extent to which there are alcohol-related, health, and crime problems in the area. In addition, the case law has shown that a licensing board must base any decision around overprovision in a targeted, evidence-led basis. Decisions from Aberdeen and Dundee have shown that selecting an arbitrary location which is not based on probative evidence would be unlawful. In addition, boards must consider the positive benefits that a thriving local convenience sector can bring to communities, and that evidence should be weighed up as part of the exercise. Our members are responsible retailers and they put considerable effort into ensuring that alcohol is sold in a responsible way.

SGF recognise the associated benefits that come from a convenience store opening in a local area. A store opening will create jobs and offer access to fruit and vegetables to the local community. The SGF Healthy Living Programme (HLP) has been successful in enabling customers to make healthy eating purchases in-store and now has over 2,400 stores participating. With 5,098 convenience stores in Scotland and with 75% of independent retailers engaged in some form of community activity in the last year convenience stores have an

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increasingly important role in their local communities. In addition, the SGF Go Local Programme, backed by the Scottish Government, supports convenience stores provide dedicated, long-term display space for locally sourced Scottish products. On average, participating stores generated an annual local multiplier figure of £723k, based on retail scanning data provided for all Scottish products. These initiatives may be relevant to the licensing objective of Improving and Protecting Public Health and supporting local businesses, and therefore, may be taken into account when the Board is determining whether to introduce an overprovision policy.

Convenience stores provide a range of key services for their customers, and this includes that ability to be able to offer their customers a full range of products, i.e. giving the customer the chance purchase an alcoholic beverage as an accompaniment with home dining. Therefore, a consequence of overprovision is that new entrants to the market are unable to obtain premises licences to authorise the sale of alcohol and are therefore, disadvantaged. The availability of alcohol in a pre-existing competitor store gives the prospective customer a reason to choose to shop there. The convenience element of being able to get their "full basket" from the competitor provides an unfair commercial advantage.

Capacity is an important issue in determining overprovision. If the entire Board area was regarded as being overprovided for it would prevent retailers from ever increasing the capacity of their alcohol sales area. However, in practice such increases would not dramatically increase the amount of alcohol being sold. It would be a paradox if a 20m² increase in selling area of a convenience store was counted as just as big a threat to an overprovision assessment as a new out-of-town hypermarket. Retailers frequently remerchandise and refit stores to best meet consumer needs. Most of the time these will just involve 'micro-space': keeping the existing shelving and general space splits but moving products around on the shelves. Sometimes, however, to meet consumer demand, to fit in with new brand ideas or to roll out improved formats 'macro-space' revisions are necessary. These may involve changing old shelves for new, increasing or decreasing the splits in store space between different categories, or gutting and refitting the store entirely. Extensions to the selling area might be necessary under macro-space refits. It should be noted that, of course, retailers are charged a fee for any major or minor variation to their licences.

Creating a general presumption that no increase in alcohol capacity would be approved in the entire Board area would almost certainly mean that existing retailers would not invest in modernising and refitting stores.

SGF believe that the entire concept of overprovision should be reviewed to consider whether it is remains fit for purpose. We live in an age where customers can order alcohol online as part of their shop from a supermarket and have it delivered to their home. This order can be made

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from anywhere given the prevalence of smartphones. Given this, what does declaring a geographical area as being overprovided for achieve? It would seem, arguable, that overprovision has not kept up the development of modern technology and consumer shopping habits. For example, a resident may order an online grocery shop, and this could quite legitimately be dispatched from many miles away.

Irresponsible Promotions & Price Variation of Alcohol

SGF works with its membership and the convenience sector as a whole to ensure that they are fully compliant with licensing legislation and are selling alcohol responsibly both in terms of pricing and promotions.

While we welcome this consultation exercise the SGF believe the licensing system should not be onerous on retailers. We hope that you find these comments helpful.

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Clerk's Comments on Response from Scottish Grocers' Federation (SGF)

The SGF's response provides background information in relation to the convenience retail sector in Scotland and their general views on several aspects of the Statement of Licensing Policy.

The SGF set out various suggestions of good practice. It would be open to the Board to consider whether any of the suggested measures should be added to the Board's current control measures set out at Appendix B of the existing Statement of Licensing Policy. Board Members may note that these control measures already set out a number of good practice measures including, for example, the provision of effective CCTV systems.

The SGF are opposed to any reduction from the 10am to 10pm hours for off-sales, being the statutory hours set out in the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005. The Board should note that, in the event of a policy being introduced to restrict these hours, it would only apply to new applications to be considered: it would not remove the hours of existing premises. Any change to the operating hours for existing licensed premises could only be made either at a review hearing or on consideration by the Board of an application made by the licence holder to vary their hours.

Regarding overprovision, while the SGF argue that the "entire concept" of overprovision should be reviewed regarding its fitness for purpose, the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 places a duty on Licensing Boards to include, in each licensing policy statement, a statement as to the extent to which the Board considers there to be overprovision of (a) licensed premises, or (b) licensed premises of a particular description, in any locality within the Board's area.

The SGF refer to various overprovision cases, including case law regarding the selection of localities. They also refer to potential health benefits resulting from licensed premises. Board Members will note the comments by the Clerk relative to the response from Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership in this regard.

The SGF highlight that alcohol can be ordered remotely and delivered to customers from premises some distance away. This means that customers within Renfrewshire may order alcohol from premises licensed elsewhere in Scotland (premises require to be licensed according to the place of dispatch) or, potentially, from premises outwith Scotland (which in that case would not be licensed under the terms of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005).

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

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SECTION A - STATEMENT OF LICENSING POLICY

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 This Statement of Licensing Policy has been prepared by Renfrewshire Licensing Board in terms of Section 6 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 (“the Act”) to assist in the implementation and administration of the licensing of premises for the sale of alcohol within Renfrewshire and to outline the way in which it intends exercising its functions under the 2005 Act. The Board is required to ensure that its policy promotes the licensing objectives.

These are set out in Section 4 of the Act and are:-

- Preventing crime and disorder
- Securing public safety
- Preventing public nuisance
- Protecting and improving public health; and
- Protecting children and young persons from harm.

Subject to the promotion of the licensing objectives the Board recognises and supports the contribution which licensed premises make to the economy of the area, to employment, tourism and the vitality of the area.

- 1.2 The Board will have regard to this policy when undertaking any of its functions. This includes officers of the Board when determining applications of a type delegated to them.
- 1.3 A Statement of Policy (hereinafter referred to as “the Statement) came into effect on 30 November 2007 and was reviewed in 2010, 2013 and 2018. This

Statement will have effect from [Date TBC], subject to review, until 18 months after the next ordinary local government elections. It will be subject to regular review and monitoring and further consultation during this period. If necessary, the Board will prepare and publish supplementary Statements of Licensing Policy. If you wish to make comment on the statement or wish the contents to be reviewed, please contact the Licensing Section at the contact point stated on the front page.

- 1.4 The review of liquor licensing law in Scotland commenced with the appointment of the Nicholson Committee in June, 2001 and was fully implemented on 1st September, 2009 when all the provisions of the Act came into force.
- 1.5 The Act introduced a modernised statutory framework for liquor licensing to allow more flexibility for the licensed trade balanced by extensive and, in appropriate cases, immediate enforcement powers for the Board. A number of changes have been made to the Act since it came fully into force in 2009.
- 1.6 For a wider national context in relation to alcohol, regard can be had to Scotland's Alcohol Strategy, "Changing Scotland's Relationship with Alcohol: A Framework for Action", which can be accessed at <https://www.ias.org.uk/uploads/pdf/News%20stories/scotland-alcohol-report0209.pdf>

2. CONTEXT – RENFREWSHIRE

- 2.1 Renfrewshire is situated to the West of Glasgow on the south bank of the River Clyde and covers 270 square kilometres. Renfrewshire's population is

estimated at approximately 180,000 making it the tenth largest Council area in Scotland in terms of population.

2.2 Paisley with an estimated population of 78,000 forms the commercial and transport hub for Renfrewshire. Significant capital investment is transforming flagship cultural facilities as well as developing festivals and events, leisure facilities and high quality public realm.

2.3 Renfrewshire has a rich and diverse environment. Paisley, Scotland's largest town, has a rich architectural heritage and is complemented by the Royal Burgh of Renfrew, Erskine New Town, the 18th Century planned town of Johnstone and several villages amidst countryside. There are, as at, 16th March 2023, 432 licensed premises in Renfrewshire, which includes 62 registered clubs.

3. PREPARATION OF STATEMENT

3.1 The Statement of Licensing Policy has been prepared having regard to:-

- the Licensing Objectives;
- the new statutory Guidance for Licensing Boards issued by the Scottish Government;
- the terms of the Act with particular reference to Section 6 (and Section 7 in relation to the overprovision assessment), and

- the terms of the Alcohol Etc., (Scotland) Act 2010, the Criminal Justice and Licensing (Scotland) Act 2010 and the Air Weapons and Licensing (Scotland) Act 2015.

3.2 In preparing the Statement, the Board consulted widely and took account of the views submitted in its adoption.

4. GENERAL PRINCIPLES

4.1 This Statement of Licensing Policy seeks:-

- to promote the five licensing objectives; and
- to comply with the terms of the 2005 Act and ancillary licensing legislation.

4.2 The Statement sets out a general approach to the way the Board will make licensing decisions but nothing in this Statement will:-

- undermine the rights of any person to apply under the Act and to have that application considered on its individual merits; or
- override the right of any person to make representations on any applications or seek a review of a licence where permitted to do so under the Act.

4.3 It relates to how the Board will exercise its licensing functions under the Act, specifically as regards the regulation of the sale of alcohol and premises in which alcohol is sold all within the terms of the Act. Only material relevant to

the Act and the Licensing Objectives will be taken into account by the Board when determining applications or considering reviews.

4.4 It should be recognised also that licensing law is not the primary mechanism for the general control of nuisance and anti-social behaviour by individuals once they are no longer in the licensed premises and beyond the direct control of the individual, club or business holding the premises' licence. If, however, the nuisance or anti-social behaviour is caused by misuse of alcohol, then supply of alcohol could be a relevant factor in that misuse and the Board, when provided with appropriate information about the misuse, may consider using its powers appropriately in the circumstances. For example, if the anti-social behaviour is linked with unlawful or inappropriate sales of alcohol, relating to particular premises whether to someone under 18 years of age, to a drunken person or as part of an irresponsible drink promotion the Board would be entitled to consider a premises licence review proposal under Section 37 of the Act.

5. TYPES OF APPLICATIONS AND SCHEME OF DELEGATION

5.1 The Board is responsible for the consideration of applications for:-

- premises licences;
- occasional licences;
- temporary licences;
- provisional licences;
- personal licences;

- variations of licences;
- review of licences;
- transfer of licences;
- extensions of licensing hours;
- the sale of alcohol by retail; and
- the supply of alcohol in members' clubs.

5.2 The Board will provide an efficient and cost effective service to all those who are involved in the licensing process. The Board recognises that any application should only be submitted to the Board when necessary and, where straightforward, should be decided by officers to create as little inconvenience to applicants as possible.

5.3 The Board has therefore agreed, as a general rule, that only those applications and matters which by statute are required to be considered by the Board will be submitted to it and the other applications will be determined by the Clerk and Depute Clerks to the Board, except as otherwise provided below.

5.4 Those applications and matters which require to and will be submitted to the Board are:-

- a premises licence application;
- a premises licence variation where the variation applied for is not a minor variation;

- an application for transfer of a premises licence where (i) the applicant has been convicted of a relevant offence or a foreign offence, (ii) the Chief Constable has provided a notice stating that the Chief Constable considers it necessary that the application for transfer be refused, or (iii) information is provided by the Chief Constable in relation to the proposed licence holder (and other persons as set out in the Act);
- determining a personal licence application or a personal licence renewal application where a notice has been received from the Chief Constable recommending refusal;
- conducting any hearing including issuing a written warning, revoking or suspending the licence, making a variation of a licence or, in respect of a personal licence, making an order revoking, suspending or endorsing a personal licence;
- making a closure order; and
- refusing an application for confirmation of a provisional premises licence.

5.5 All other matters with the exception of the specific delegations to Board Members narrated at paragraph 5.6 hereof are delegated to the Clerk and Depute Clerks to deal with, including:-

- granting an application for confirmation of provisional premises licence;
- all applications for transfer of a premises licence where the transferee has not been convicted of a relevant offence or a foreign offence and

no notice recommending refusal or other information has been provided by the Chief Constable;

- all applications for variation of a premises licence where the variation is a minor variation as defined in the Act;
- all applications for personal licences or for the renewal of personal licences where the applicant has not been convicted of a relevant offence or a foreign offence, no notice recommending refusal has been given by the Chief Constable and no information has been received from the Chief Constable or a Licensing Standards Officer which they consider relevant to the application (provided no personal licence held by the applicant has expired or been surrendered within the last three years);
- all applications for occasional licences where there is no objection or representation received or no notice from the Chief Constable recommending refusal or where conditions proposed by the Chief Constable or other consultees have been accepted by the applicant;
- grant of occasional extensions of licensed hours for a special event of local or national significance (following consultation with the Convener);
- grant of extended hours applications within the Board's normal licensing hours policy and when there is no notice of objection or representation or where conditions have been proposed by the Chief Constable or other consultees and have been accepted by the applicant;

- to decide, where an application for an occasional licence or for extended hours is lodged late, whether the reason given for lateness is sufficient for the application to be processed;
- where satisfied that an application for an occasional licence or for extended hours requires to be dealt with quickly, to determine a shortened period for notification being not less than 24 hours.
- revocation of a personal licence where the personal licence holder has failed to complete, and provide evidence of, refresher training to the Board within the periods set out in the Act.

5.6 Determination of the following are delegated to the Convener and one other Board Member, or in the absence of the Convener, two other Board Members:-

- grant of extended hours or occasional licences for hours which are outwith the Board's Licensing Policy Hours or where objections/representations have been received or conditions proposed and not accepted and which in the opinion of the Convener and one other member (or in the Convener's absence, two Board Members) may be determined without a hearing;
- authority to decide whether any application for a premises licence review is vexatious or frivolous and if so to reject it on behalf of the Board;
- grant of a personal licence where no recommendation has been received from the Chief Constable recommending refusal but either: a) information has been received from the Chief Constable (other than confirming the existence of a relevant or foreign offence) or a Licensing Standards

Officer providing information relevant to the application; or (b) the applicant has previously held a personal licence which expired or was surrendered within the last three years;

- authority to decide whether to extend the 28 day period following upon a decision to revoke a premises licence at a review hearing (on the ground that a person is not fit and proper), pending determination of an application for transfer or variation made within that period;
- authority to decide whether to hold a hearing or to take no action in relation to a premises licence or personal licence, where no recommendation has been received from the Chief Constable after notification of a relevant conviction.

5.7 Determination of the following are delegated to the Clerk and Depute Clerks following consultation with the Convener:

- authority to determine whether a hearing is to be held: in person; wholly through the use of remote facilities; or partly in person and partly through the use of remote facilities, all in accordance with section 133A of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005; and
- authority to determine whether a meeting is to be held: in person; wholly through the use of remote facilities; or partly in person and partly through the use of remote facilities, all in accordance with Paragraph 12(A1) of Schedule 1 to the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005.

5.8 The Board will receive regular reports regarding licences determined under delegated powers.

6. OPERATING PLANS

6.1 All applications for premises licences must be accompanied by an operating plan and a layout plan all complying with the Act and Regulations made under that Act, as well as a disabled access and facilities statement. The Board also asks applicants for premises licences to provide, with their applications, a note setting out how they propose to promote the licensing objectives. Operating Plans must make clear how the premises are to be run, what activities will be undertaken on the premises and at what time.

6.2 More specifically, an “operating plan” in relation to any premises is a document in the prescribed form containing:-

- (a) a description of the activities to be carried on in the premises;
- (b) a statement of the times during which it is proposed that alcohol be sold in the premises;
- (c) a statement as to whether the alcohol is to be sold for consumption in the premises, off the premises, or both;
- (d) a statement of the times at which other activities, in addition to the sale of alcohol, are to be carried on in the premises;
- (e) where alcohol is to be sold for consumption in the premises, a statement as to whether children or young persons are to be allowed entry to the premises and, if they are allowed entry, a statement of the terms on which they are allowed entry including, in particular:-
 - (i) the ages of children or young persons to be allowed entry;
 - (ii) the time at which they are to be allowed entry; and
 - (iii) the parts of the premises to which they are to be allowed entry;
- (f) information as to the proposed capacity of the premises;

- (g) prescribed information about the individual who is to be the premises manager; and
- (h) such other information in relation to the premises and the activities to be carried on as may be prescribed.

6.3 Where alcohol is to be sold both for consumption on and for consumption off any premises, the operating plan for the premises may state different times for:-

- (a) the sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises; and
- (b) the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises.

6.4 In preparing and presenting the operating plan, applicants should be aware that the Board expects premises to be run in a way compliant with, and promoting, the five licensing objectives:-

- preventing crime and order;
- securing public safety;
- preventing public nuisance;
- protecting and improving public health; and
- protecting children and young persons from harm.

6.5 Although basic guidance may be sought from the Clerk and Licensing Standards Officers, it is for the applicant to make sure that the operating plan is in the correct form and covers all aspects of the operation of the premises. It is strongly recommended that any person seeks independent legal advice.

7. BOARD MEETINGS

- 7.1 The proceedings of the Board shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 12 of Schedule 1 to the Act. Unless there are justifiable reasons for or as provided in regulations made under the Act, the Board will meet in public. In accordance with legislation introduced following the coronavirus pandemic, the Board will contact parties who intend to come to a hearing before the Board to ascertain their views as to whether a meeting and/ or hearing at a meeting should be held in person, remotely or by hybrid means. However, the ultimate decision as to the format of any meeting and/ or hearing at a meeting of the Board will be taken by the Clerk or Depute Clerks following consultation with the Convener, as set out at Paragraph 5.7, above.

8 HEARINGS

- 8.1 Where a hearing is to take place, the Board will attempt to make the experience as informal as possible consistent with the carrying out of the Board's quasi-judicial function.
- 8.2 The normal procedure will be to hear the submission of the objector or representor in relation to an application or person seeking review of the premises licence. The applicant or agent will then have an opportunity to address the hearing and Board members may ask questions of any of the parties. There will then be an opportunity for final submissions by all parties before the Board makes a decision.

8.3 The Board is entitled to adjourn to consider the application in private. If they do so, the Board will thereafter reconvene in public to resume consideration of, or make a decision on, the application, as appropriate.

8.4 Normally formal evidence will not be called for. It is noted, however, that under Section 133 of the Act, Scottish Ministers may make Regulations providing procedures to be followed at any hearing.

9 NOTIFICATIONS OF APPLICATIONS, OBJECTIONS AND REPRESENTATIONS

The Board will give notice of each premises licence application it receives to those persons referred to in Section 21 of the Act, namely:-

- each person having a notifiable interest in neighbouring land;
- any community council within whose area the premises are situated;
- Renfrewshire Council;
- Chief Constable of Police Scotland;
- NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde, and
- Scottish Fire and Rescue Service

Additionally, the Board will list all applications received on Renfrewshire Council's website, www.renfrewshire.gov.uk.

10. CONSIDERATION OF PREMISES LICENCE APPLICATIONS

10.1 The grounds for refusal of a premises licence are set out in full at Section 23 of the Act. If the Board consider that none of these grounds apply it must

grant the application and if it considers that one or more apply it must refuse the application.

10.2 When considering whether or not any application should be granted, the Board will take into account relevant matters including:-

- the nature of the premises, the style and type of use, the potential number and profile of the customers likely to attend the premises;
- the proposed hours of operation;
- the means of access to the premises including the location and adequacy of customer entrances and exits;
- the location, character and condition of the premises;
- whether the applicant is a fit and proper person to hold the licence, having regard to the licensing objectives.

10.3 Where it is possible to take steps to mitigate or prevent any potential impact, the Board may still be able to grant a licence subject to conditions; each case will be considered on its own merits and appropriate advice will be sought by the Board.

10.4 When considering any application for premises which have been previously licensed or in any review of an existing licence, the Board will take into account any historical evidence, especially of the impact on local residents and will also look at the measures put into effect by the applicant to mitigate the adverse impact.

- 10.5 The Board may also, at any time before determining a premises licence application, request from the Chief Constable a report in relation to antisocial behaviour on, or in the vicinity of, the premises, complaints or other representations within the year prior to the date of the Board's request.
- 10.6 Where proposed licensed premises are yet to be, or are in the course of being, constructed or converted for such use, an application for a provisional premises licence may be made. A provisional premises licence will not take effect until it is confirmed by the Board. Where confirmation of a provisional premises licence is sought, the Board may vary the conditions of the licence for the purposes of ensuring consistency with any licensing policy statement since the provisional premises licence was issued. This may be relevant if a supplementary licensing policy statement is issued after the issue of a provisional premises licence.

11 OCCASIONAL LICENCES

- 11.1 An occasional licence authorises the temporary sale or supply of alcohol which is not authorised by a premises licence.
- 11.2 It may be applied for by:-
- the holder of a premises licence;
 - the holder of a personal licence; or
 - a representative of any voluntary organisation;

to cover a period of a maximum of fourteen days.

- 11.3 The grant of an occasional licence is subject to the mandatory conditions laid out in Schedule 4 to the Act.
- 11.4 While premises and personal licence holders can make unlimited applications there are restrictions on the number of applications a voluntary organisation can make, in any period of twelve months. Voluntary organisations are required to submit a copy of their organisation's constitution with each application made. Guidance on applications and the number that can be applied for in any twelve month period can be obtained from the Licensing Standards Officer.
- 11.4.1 While the Licensing Board is aware that the Act does not refer to the holding of an "event" in the provisions dealing with occasional licences, given their short-term nature and that they are not subject to any requirements for certification, neighbourhood notification or public site notices then where an application is to allow premises to trade on a regular basis prior to a premises licence application having been determined, the application may be referred to the Licensing Board for consideration.
- 11.5 Event organisers are encouraged to provide as much notice of their event as possible to the Board and to the Chief Constable. Information relating to the event will require to be detailed on the application form and the applicant may

be asked to provide supporting documentation. The Board will consult with the Chief Constable and the Licensing Standards Officer on all applications. The Board will normally require at least 28 days notice and if applications are lodged later than this date then no assurances can be given that they will be processed in time. Accordingly applicants lodge them at their own risk. In exceptional cases having regard to the circumstances of the application, the Board, if satisfied that there is a reason to process the application more quickly, may reduce the period of notification to a period of not less than 24 hours.

- 11.6 The Board will consider on a case by case basis whether it is necessary to impose conditions to give effect to the licensing objectives.

12 EXTENDED HOURS APPLICATION

- 12.1 Extended hours applications allow for an occasional extension of licensed hours and operate only for a period of up to one month. If the Board receives a number of applications to extend licensed hours, it will expect the applicant to consider whether an application should be made to vary the premises licence by adjustment of the operating plan.
- 12.2 The Board may make a determination under Section 67 of the Act to extend licensed hours to enable premises to remain open longer for certain special occasions. In addition to consulting the Renfrewshire Licensing Forum, the Board will request observations from the Chief Constable and from other relevant parties on the issues of crime prevention, public safety and

preventing public nuisance. It will notify its determination to the Chief Constable, to holders of licences and other relevant parties and will take appropriate steps to publicise the determination as widely as possible.

12.3 Each year the Licensing Board will issue a Statement of its Policy on trading hours for on sale premises for the festive period as stated at paragraph 15.4. Such extended hours will apply automatically to all those premises which make reference to the Board's Policy on the festive period within Part 4 of the Operating Plan, without the need for an extended hours application.

12.4 The timeous lodging of an application set out at paragraph 11.5 above in respect of occasional licences applies equally in terms of the processing of extended hours applications and all applications should be lodged at least 21 days before the proposed date. Late lodged applications are lodged at applicants' own risk. The Board, if satisfied that there is a reason to process the application more quickly, may reduce the periods of notification to a period of not less than 24 hours.

13 EXCLUDED PREMISES

13.1 In terms of Section 123 of the Act, excluded premises includes:

- premises used as a garage; and
- premises used as a garage which form part of larger premises.

No premises licence or occasional licence can be obtained for excluded premises.

13.2 Premises are used as a garage if used for one or more of the following:-

- the sale by retail of petrol or fuel for diesel engined road vehicles (DERV);
- the sale of motor vehicles; or
- the maintenance of motor vehicles.

13.3 There is an exception to this exclusion but only if persons resident in the locality of the garage are or are likely to become reliant to a significant extent on the garage as the principal source of:

- petrol or DERV; or
- groceries.

If that is the case the garage is not excluded premises and may therefore be the subject of a premises or occasional licence.

13.4 The Board will expect an applicant making an application to provide evidence of local residents' reliance on the service together with an impact assessment in relation to the anticipated impact taking into account the licensing objectives.

13A MEMBERS CLUBS

13.A.1 Members' clubs have been included in the premises licensing system. The Scottish Government acknowledges that it would be reasonable to reflect their special characteristics.

13.A.2 In order to benefit from the exemptions available members' clubs will require to meet the criteria prescribed in the Licensing (Clubs) (Scotland) Regulations 2007.

13.A.3 When members' clubs apply to the licensing board they will be asked to certify whether or not they comply with the criteria referred to at paragraph 13.A.2 in order to benefit from the exemptions. If they do the members' clubs will have to submit to the Board a copy of their written constitution and rules. They will be subject to inspections by Licensing Standards Officers, who will check clubs for compliance.

13.A.4 Members' clubs will be subject to the same provisions regarding access by children and young persons as other licensed premises. They will require to specify in their operating plans whether or not it is proposed that children and young persons are to be allowed entry to the premises and, if so, to specify the terms, to include the times, the ages of such children and young persons and the parts of the premises to which they would be permitted access. Appropriate conditions relating to access by children and young persons may be attached by the Licensing Board.

13.A.5 Members Clubs are aware that they benefit from exemptions under the Act and as such functions held within the club premises should be for the benefit of the club and its members. Where a club wishes to use its facilities to allow non-members or non-club functions to take place they should consider applying for an occasional licence for that function. Clubs should note that the

number of occasional licences that can be obtained for such functions over a calendar year are limited by regulations. Members clubs requiring further information should contact the Licensing Standards Officer.

14 OBJECTIONS

- 14.1 The following information should in no way be seen as overriding the right of any person to make an objection to an application or to seek a review of a premises licence.
- 14.2 Any person may submit an objection or representation to the Board in relation to a premises licence. The objection must relate to one or more of the licensing objectives or other relevant ground of refusal under the Act. Information to assist people wishing to make an objection or representation is provided in resources developed by Alcohol Focus Scotland, “Alcohol Licensing in Your Community: How You Can Get Involved”. This is available at <https://www.alcohol-focus-scotland.org.uk/media/133477/Community-licensing-toolkit.pdf>
- A proforma to assist anyone wishing to make an objection or representation is available at <http://www.renfrewshire.gov.uk/media/2003/notice-of-objection-of-representation-proforma/pdf/cs-ae-ProformaObjectionorRepresentation.pdf>
- 14.3 Although anyone is entitled to object to an application for a premises licence or seek a review of a premises licence, the Board may reject an objection or an application for review where it is considered to be “frivolous” or “vexatious”. “Frivolous” and “vexatious” are the words used in the Act. In determining this,

the Board is entitled to recover any expenses incurred by the Board in considering the objection or application for review.

14.4 Objections will be considered on their merits and the ordinary meanings of “vexatious” and “frivolous” will be adopted.

15 LICENSING HOURS

15.1 While each application is assessed on its own merits, the following section sets out the Licensing Board’s policy on licensing hours and the reasons for adopting that approach. For applications for licensed premises at times outwith the Board’s policy, applicants will require to demonstrate to the Board that the additional requested hours are appropriate in the circumstances to those particular premises.

In forming this policy for licensing hours the Board has been mindful of the licensing objectives:-

- Preventing crime and disorder;
- Securing public safety
- Preventing public nuisance;
- Protecting and improving public health; and
- Protecting children and young persons from harm

15.2 **Off-Sale Premises - Reasons for Approach and Policy**

Where applications relate to premises licences and to occasional licences, the licensed hours for the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises (off-sale hours) are in terms of the Act 10am until 10pm every day of the week. The Licensing Board must refuse an application which proposes licensed hours outwith these times for off sales premises. It is open to the Board to further restrict off sales where it considers that the hours proposed would be inconsistent with one or more of the licensing objectives. In particular, in determining applications and licensed hours, the Board will, in considering the merits, have particular regard to the effect (if any) which the proposed off-sale hours would have on the occurrence of anti-social behaviour. Unless so restricted, the Board will generally permit off sales hours from 10am until 10pm.

15.3 **On-Sale Premises – Reasons for Approach**

The Board recognises that licensing hours are important not only to individual premises but also can have a wider impact on the area in which the premises are situated. Accordingly in determining their policy the Board has had regard to how the dispersal of customers late at night from licensed premises throughout Renfrewshire can be managed.

In particular, the Board considers that a policy setting staggered closing times for different types of premises taking into account the policing of the late night economy and the availability of late night transport within Renfrewshire promotes the licensing objectives of (i) preventing crime and disorder; (ii) securing public safety and (iii) preventing public nuisance.

In considering licensed hours the Board has also taken into account the presumption against 24 hour drinking set out at Section 64 of the Act and the Statutory Guidance for Licensing Boards which states “in considering applications for licensed hours Boards may wish to consider applications for up to 14 hours as being reasonable but local circumstances and views of Local Licensing Forums should always be considered. Any application for licensed hours for more than 14 hours should require further consideration to the effect of granting extra operating hours”.

The Board has also had regard to the views of Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde on licensing hours in relation to the link between availability of alcohol and alcohol related harm. The Board therefore considers that the licensing objective of Protecting and Improving Public Health is relevant to its policy on licensed hours, particularly in relation to the number of hours a day during which alcohol may be sold and thereafter consumed.

Although promotion of the licensing objectives is paramount the Board recognises that licensing hours contribute to the development of local economies which may be important for investment, employment and tourism within the area.

After consulting widely on the formulation of their updated policy and taking account of all responses received, the Board is of the view that their previous policy on opening hours for on sales premises should remain. This will continue to allow on sales premises the flexibility to commence trading at 11am every day of the week. The Board previously introduced this Policy to

reflect social changes within Renfrewshire and considers that it has not detracted from the promotion of the licensing objectives.

On Sale Premises - Policy

Whilst considering every application on its individual merits, the Board therefore considers the following policy to be appropriate:-

Commencement Hours: Monday - Saturday

9.30am: premises, for the purpose only of funeral purveys/receptions (or in the case of registered clubs where club activities are taking place).

and otherwise

11.00am: all premises

Sundays

11.00am: all premises

Terminal hours: Sunday – Thursday

12.00 midnight: all licensed premises (including registered clubs), except premises, the primary purpose of which is to offer entertainment in the form of dancing.

2.00am premises, the primary purpose of which is to offer entertainment in the form of dancing.

Friday & Saturday

1.00am all licensed premises (including registered clubs), except premises, the primary purpose of which is to offer entertainment in the form of dancing.

2.00am premises, the primary purpose of which is to offer entertainment in the form of dancing.

3.00am premises, the primary purpose of which is to offer entertainment in the form of dancing and where such premises are members of Paisley Town Centre Radio Link.

15.4 The Board has an existing practice of permitting longer licensed hours over the festive period and that will continue to be the case. The festive period for the purposes of this aspect of the policy will be determined by the Board on an annual basis.

16 OVERPROVISION OF LICENSED PREMISES

16.1 Overprovision of licensed premises in a particular locality impacts on the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Board is under a duty in terms of Section 7 of the Act to produce a statement as to the extent that the Board considers there to be overprovision of licensed premises or licensed premises of a particular description in any locality within the Board's area.

16.2 In determining any “locality”, the Statutory Guidance for Licensing Boards indicates that the process is largely a matter for the Board and will no doubt involve the use of its local knowledge. The Guidance also recommends that the information which the Chief Constable is capable of providing is a reasonable starting point. The Chief Constable would be able to:-

- Identify ‘hot spot’ areas within the Board’s area where it can be demonstrated that crime, disorder and nuisance are caused by customers of a concentrated number of licensed premises;
- Suggest other areas in which the number of licensed premises or premises of a particular description is moving closely towards overprovision; and
- Provide the Board with the geographical boundaries of these areas.

16.3 On the basis of the information provided by the Police and having regard to the Board’s own local knowledge the Board have continued to determine Paisley Town Centre, as shown on the plan below, as a locality for the purposes of Section 7 of the Act.

16.4 In considering whether there is overprovision for the purposes of Section 7(1) of the Act the Board must have regard to the number and capacity of licensed premises in a particular locality as determined by the Board and may have regard to other matters, including the licensed hours of those premises. In this connection the Board have had regard to the number, capacity and description of licensed premises for the above locality and have also taken into account the licensed hours of those premises.


Following consideration of (i) the responses received to consultation (and, in particular, representations from Police Scotland) (ii) the number, capacities and licensed hours of licensed premises in this locality and (iii) the Board's local knowledge of the area, the Board determined that this locality remains overprovided in respect of "Liquor or Pub Type Premises". The Board considers "Liquor or Pub Type Premises" includes Pub Type Premises used exclusively or predominantly for the sale of alcohol and, as such, does not include restaurant, hotel or nightclub premises. The Board considers that this policy, which had been agreed previously as a Supplementary Statement of Licensing Policy in 2015, remains relevant to the licensing objectives of preventing crime and disorder, securing public safety and preventing public nuisance.

The effect of this policy, in terms of the statutory guidance, is to create, in this locality, a "rebuttable presumption" against the grant of applications for any further licences (or to increase the capacity of existing licences) of the description stated. Those applications would normally be refused on the

ground provided by Section 23(5)(e) of the Act, that the Board considers that, if the application were to be granted, there would as a result be overprovision of licensed premises, or licensed premises of that description in the locality.

Each application will still be considered on its own merits and there may be exceptional cases in which an applicant is able to demonstrate that the grant of the application would not undermine the licensing objectives or that those objectives would not be undermined if the applicant's operating plan were to be modified or the grant of the licence were made subject to appropriate conditions.

The Board reached its decision to adopt this policy following lengthy consultation, during which it received submissions from a number of interested parties. 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17 PERSONAL LICENCES

17.1 The Board will consider applications for personal licences from individuals living in the area of Renfrewshire.

17.2 Any individual may seek a personal licence. The Board will grant a personal licence if it is satisfied that the applicant:-

- is over 18 years of age
- possesses a relevant licensing qualification
- has not had revoked in the previous five years, ending with the day on which the application was received, a personal licence (except where that revocation arose from a failure to complete refresher training)
- has not been convicted of any relevant or foreign offence and the application has not resulted in a notice recommending refusal from the Chief Constable or other information being provided by the Chief Constable or a Licensing Standards Officer which they consider relevant.

17.3 Otherwise, the Board will consider whether the application should be refused under the Act. In making a decision the Board will have regard to the seriousness and age of any conviction along with any other circumstances, recommendation or information provided which it considers to be relevant.

17.4 The holder of a personal licence issued by the Board must undertake further training prior to the 5th anniversary of the issue of the licence and each subsequent period of 5 years during which the licence has effect. The

licenceholder must produce evidence that the required training has been completed, to the Board no later than 3 months after the expiry of each 5 year period. Failure to undertake the training as required or to notify the Board will result in the licence being revoked.

17.5 To comply with paragraph 17.4 above all licenceholders are required to return their original personal licence to the Board along with a copy of any certificate issued as evidence of completion of the required training. The licence will be updated and returned.

17.6 All licenceholders are advised that they have a duty to notify the Board of any change in name or address within one month of that change taking place. Any changes should be notified in writing to the Board and be accompanied by the original licence.

18. LOCAL LICENSING FORUM

18.1 The formulation of this policy involved consultation with the Renfrewshire Licensing Forum which will keep under review the operation of the Act in Renfrewshire and will advise and make recommendations to the Board as appropriate. The Board will have regard to any advice given or recommendation made to it. If the Board does not follow the advice or guidance, this will be for good and substantial reasons, which reasons will be given in writing within fourteen days of the decision.

18.2 In order to ensure proper communication with the Renfrewshire Licensing Forum, the Board may from time to time provide reports to the Forum to enable it to have an appreciation of, and due regard to, the detail of such matters during their deliberations.

SECTION B - PROMOTION OF THE LICENSING OBJECTIVES

19 INTRODUCTION

19.1 The Board will continually promote the licensing objectives and calls on licence holders and other stakeholders to be mindful of these when providing their services. The Board recognises that there are some types of alcohol misuse issues which are not connected to consumption of alcohol in licensed premises.

19.2 The licensing objectives are:-

- preventing crime and disorder;
- securing public safety;
- preventing public nuisance;
- protecting and improving public health; and
- protecting children and young persons from harm.

19.3 The following paragraphs set out the Board's general policy in respect of the objectives. The Board may when necessary impose a range of conditions which will be appropriate to a particular licence. The purpose of such conditions will be to promote the licensing objectives.

19.4 In each section relating to the objectives, the Board has defined its intended outcome. Each section lists the influencing factors on the achievement of that objective but, because of the wide variety of premises and activities to which this policy applies, the lists provided are not exhaustive. Applicants will know their own premises best and will be expected to address all aspects relevant to the individual style and characteristics of their premises and the licensable activities for which they are seeking authorisation.

19.5 In each sub-section, a list of possible control measures is provided. This is intended to be of assistance to applicants, but again is not intended to be an exhaustive list. Many control measures achieve more than one objective but have not necessarily been listed under each objective.

20 THE PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

20.1 The Board, in carrying out its functions, will have regard to the likely impact of licensed activities and related crime and disorder when considering the location, operation and management of all licence applications, reviews and variations.

20.2 The Board supports a strategy aimed at making Renfrewshire a safe place to live and visit. The Board is committed to improving the quality of life for the people of Renfrewshire by ensuring that licensed premises are managed in such a way as not to contribute to crime and disorder. Applicants are expected to consider how they will promote the prevention of crime and

disorder. The applicants should also be able to demonstrate that all those factors which impact on crime and disorder have been considered. These include:-

- underage drinking;
- drunkenness on the premises;
- public drunkenness;
- illegal possession and/or use of drugs;
- violent behaviour;
- anti-social behaviour; and
- litter.

20.3 Applicants are encouraged to discuss crime prevention procedures in their premises with the Council and Police Scotland. Factors may include underage drinking, drunkenness on premises, public drunkenness, drugs, violent behaviour and antisocial behaviour.

20.4 The following examples of control measures are given to assist applicants who may need to take account of them in their operating plan having regard to their particular type of premises and/or licensable activities:-

- having a written crime prevention strategy;
- effective and responsible management of premises;
- training given to staff to include preventing crime and disorder and conflict management;
- training and effective supervision of staff;

- written policy on mandatory proof of age scheme;
- provision of effective CCTV in and around the premises which complies with current legislative requirements, is fully maintained and an employee trained in its operation always available on the premises, with the CCTV footage being retained for a minimum period of 28 days;
- security policies and regular toilet checks;
- employment, when necessary, of Security Industry Authority licensed door staff;
- door supervisors to be easily identifiable by wearing high-visibility clothing;
- door supervisors to be instructed to encourage persons leaving the premises to do so in an orderly fashion without causing disturbance;
- active membership of Pubwatch or Radiolink or similar schemes; participation in initiatives such as 'Best Bar None'.
- provision of litter bins and lighting outside premises;
- provision of plastic or toughened drinking vessels;
- justification for size of measures; and
- choice of size of wine glass.

20.5 Licenceholders are called upon to take positive action to discourage drinking and driving which is a serious offence and can have catastrophic effects on families of both victims and offenders. Licenceholders are, therefore, encouraged to play an active part in preventing drink driving by:-

- displaying anti-drink driving materials;

- supplying reasonably priced non-alcoholic drinks; and
- promoting awareness of campaigns such as designated drivers scheme.

21 SECURING PUBLIC SAFETY

21.1 The Board recognises that “licensed premises” will cover a wide range of premises and activities, each with its own safety risks or issues. The premises must be constructed or adapted and operated in such a manner as to safeguard occupants from those risks or issues. The Board is committed to ensuring that the safety of any person visiting or working in or in the vicinity of licensed premises is not compromised.

21.2 Issues may involve:-

- occupancy capacity of the premises;
- age, design and layout including means of escape;
- nature of activities such as music and dancing;
- hours of operation;
- customer profile (e.g. age, disability, sexual orientation, gender, race, ethnicity); and
- use of special effects such as lasers, pyrotechnics and, smoke machines.

21.3 The following examples of control measures are given to assist applicants who may need to take account of them in their operating plan having regard to their particular type of premises and/or licensable activities:-

- suitable and sufficient risk assessments;
- effective and responsible management of premises;
- sufficient number of staff;
- appropriate instruction, training and supervision of staff;
- training need not only relate to licensing, the sale or supply of alcohol and its misuse but wider issues especially those relating to equal opportunity and diversity;
- having an effective glass management policy either involving the removal of all glassware regularly or by providing toughened or plastic drinking vessels.
- having a written policy on how to deal with customers and any other person in the premises who may become incapacitated or vulnerable due to drink or drugs;
- having first aid facilities;
- informing Police Scotland of any special events taking place in the premises or issues relating to public safety;
- having a written accident recording system;
- displaying local transport information to facilitate safe journeys home for customers;
- adoption of best practice guidance;
- provision of effective CCTV which complies with current legislative requirements, is fully maintained and an employee trained in its operation always available on the premises, with the CCTV footage being retained for a minimum period of 28 days;

- coverage;
- door supervisors to be easily identifiable by wearing high-visibility clothing;
- door supervisors to be instructed to encourage persons leaving the premises to do so in an orderly fashion without causing disturbance;
- implementation of crowd management systems; and
- proof of regular testing and certification where appropriate of procedures, appliances and safety systems.

21.4 The Board may request sight of Electrical Safety Certificates, Ceiling or Structural Certificates, Fire Safety Certification, Risk Assessments and a Health and Safety Policy. As other Services may have enforcement powers in this connection with these forms of documentation, it is expected that such requests by the Board will be fairly rare and be taken in consultation with those other services.

22 THE PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

22.1 Licensed premises have a significant potential to impact adversely on communities, through public nuisances that arise from their operation. The Board wishes to maintain and protect the amenity of residents and local businesses from the potential consequences of the operation of licensed premises whilst recognising the valuable cultural, social and business importance that such premises provide.

- 22.2 Although interpretation is ultimately a matter for the Courts, the Board intends to interpret “public nuisance” widely and understands it to include such issues as noise, light, odour, litter and anti-social behaviour where these impact on those living, working or otherwise engaged in normal activity in an area or locality. Public nuisance may also include waste generated by licensed premises (including where necessary arrangements for dealing with discarded needles) and smoking litter associated with licensed premises.
- 22.3 “Anti-social behaviour” is defined in the Antisocial Behaviour, etc. (Scotland) Act 2004 as behaviour where a person acts in a manner that causes or is likely to cause alarm or distress or pursues a course of conduct that causes or is likely to cause alarm or distress to at least one person who is not from the same household as the person engaging in the behaviour; conduct includes speech.
- 22.4 The Board acknowledges that smoking is not a licensing matter but one for other legislation. The Board expects that licenceholders will be aware of their own statutory responsibilities concerning smoking in public places.
- 22.5 The Board expects that licenceholders will have regard to good practice. It is their responsibility to ensure that patrons do not create a nuisance or disturbance for residents living nearby. This includes noise arising as a result of patrons smoking outside the premises and any associated littering of the area. Licenceholders are reminded that they are responsible for sweeping up cigarette ends and other smoking related waste left by customers when taking

a smoking break immediately outside the premises and then re-entering the premises.

22.6 Every business has a duty to ensure that waste is disposed of securely and to keep their premises clear of all litter generated by staff and customers. The Board expects licenceholders to be aware of their responsibilities and of the possibility of statutory street litter control notices in the case of non-compliance.

22.7 When applicants propose to provide outside seating, tables or other facilities in any outdoor area, whether covered or not, regard should be had to the need to ensure that the use of such areas will not cause disturbance or nuisance to the occupiers of other premises in the vicinity. Licenceholders are responsible for ensuring that all other consents and permissions are obtained including from Planning, Building Standards and any road consent or permit.

22.8 When addressing the issue of preventing public nuisance, the following factors are relevant and should be considered:-

- The location of premises and proximity to residential and other noise sensitive premises such as hospitals, hospices, care homes and places of worship.
- The hours of opening, particularly after 11pm.

- The nature of activities to be provided, including whether those activities are of a temporary or permanent nature and whether they are to be held inside or outside the premises.
- The design and layout of premises and in particular the presence of noise limiting features and a CCTV system, which complies with current legislative requirements, is fully maintained and an employee trained in its operation always available on the premises.
- The occupant capacity of the premises.
- The availability of public transport and taxis.
- The wind down time between the end of the licensable activities and the closure of the premises.
- The last admission time.

22.9 The following examples of control measures are given to assist applicants who may need to take account of them in their operating plan, having regard to their particular type of premises and/or licensable activities:-

- Effective and responsible management of premises.
- Appropriate instruction, training and supervision of those employed or engaged to prevent incidents of public nuisance.
- Control of operating hours for all or parts of the premises – for instance, garden areas, bottle disposal and deliveries.
- Adoption of best practice guidance.
- Installation of soundproofing, air conditioning, acoustic lobbies and sound limitation devices which should also be used for external equipment brought onto the premises.

- Management of people, including staff and vehicular traffic and resulting queues, arriving and leaving the premises.
- door supervisors to be easily identifiable by wearing high-visibility clothing;
- door supervisors to be instructed to encourage persons leaving the premises to do so in an orderly fashion without causing disturbance;
- Liaison with public transport providers.
- Siting of external lighting, including security lighting and installation of an effective CCTV system which complies with current legislative requirements is fully maintained and an employee trained in its operation always available on the premises, with the CCTV footage being retained for a minimum period of 28 days;
- Effective ventilation systems to prevent nuisance from odour.

23 PROTECTING AND IMPROVING PUBLIC HEALTH

23.1 Licenceholders can help promote this objective in many ways. They can use materials such as posters, beer mats which promote moderate consumption of alcohol along with awareness of units of alcohol and the recommended current guidelines for consumption of alcohol by men and women. A wine list, for example, might state how many units of alcohol per glass or bottle together with a reminder of the guidelines. The Board is concerned about the link between the consumption of alcohol and public health. The Board wishes to see premises thriving in Renfrewshire but this cannot be at the expense of patrons' health and wellbeing. The Board will have regard to the views of and

take advice from the relevant bodies responsible for and interested in the protection and promotion of public health in Renfrewshire.

23.2 Licence applicants, door stewards where employed and premises managers as well as other staff employed in the premises must remain vigilant at all times to the risks of excessive consumption. There should be an established practice within the premises to ensure that a standard approach is taken where a patron's demeanour demonstrates an excessive consumption of alcohol. There should also be a clear understanding of the offences committed in connection with the service of alcohol to children or young persons or persons who appear drunk and allowing drunkenness on the premises.

23.3 Reference is also made to paragraph 22.4 of this statement relating to smoking.

23.4 The following examples of control measures are given to assist applicants who may need to take account of them in their operating plan having regard to their particular type of premises and/or licensable activities:-

- displaying anti-drunkenness materials along with information on units of alcohol in the context of current recommended guidelines;
- having a workplace alcohol policy in order to raise awareness, minimise harm and ensure that staff are able to access help (without fear of a job loss) when a problem arises; and

- ensuring customers are aware of choice in relation to alcohol measures particularly wine eg small, medium or large glasses should be available.

24 PROTECTING CHILDREN AND YOUNG PERSONS FROM HARM

24.1 The Act defines children as persons under the age of sixteen and young persons as those aged 16 or 17. The Board encourages applications that make venues family friendly and safe for children and young persons. The Board, however, will have particular regard to this objective when:-

- there have been convictions of staff or licenceholders for serving alcohol to underage persons or where premises are in an area where there is a history or other evidence of underage drinking;
- there is a serious element of gambling within the premises;
- entertainment of an adult nature is provided;
- the operating plan shows that the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises is the exclusive or primary purpose of the service provided (referred to as vertical drinking establishments);
- licenceholders or staff have criminal convictions for offences against children or have otherwise been found unsuitable to work with children.

24.2 The Board wishes to see family friendly premises thriving in Renfrewshire.

Where applicants wish to operate such premises, the Board expects them to appreciate that this places additional responsibilities upon them at the same time recognising that parents and other adults accompanying children and/or young persons also have responsibilities.

24.3 The following examples of control measures are given to assist applicants who may need to take account of them in their operating plan having regard to their particular type of premises and/or licensable activities:-

- effective and responsible management of premises;
- appropriate instruction, training and supervision of staff;
- adoption of best practice, including a written policy on prevention of sales of alcohol to children and young persons;
- limitation on the hours when children and/ or young persons may be present, in all or parts of the premises;
- limitations or exclusions by age;
- written policy on mandatory proof of age scheme;
- measures to ensure children and/ or young persons do not unlawfully purchase, acquire or consume alcohol;
- measures to ensure children and/ or young persons are not exposed to incidences of strong and offensive language, violence or disorder; and
- use of fixed fire guards on open fires and prohibition of mobile heaters when young children are in the premises; and
- availability of high chairs and suitable drinking vessels for young children.
- ensuring staff involved with the delivery of alcohol along with takeaway food have appropriate training.

24.4 When preparing the operating plan or submitting an application or an occasional licence, applicants must set out the terms on which children and young persons are to be allowed entry including the ages of children and young persons to be allowed entry, times and parts of the premises to which children and young persons will have access. The Board will have regard to these terms and if the Board consider it to be necessary will arrange a visit to the applicant premises to inform their determination of the application.

25 RELATIONSHIP WITH OTHER STRATEGIES

25.1 The Board will endeavour to secure proper integration with local crime prevention, community safety, health, planning, transport, tourism and equality and cultural strategies. Specifically, in relation to alcohol-related harms, the Board recognises the work of the Renfrewshire Alcohol and Drugs Commission: <https://www.renfrewshire.gov.uk/article/9637/Alcohol-and-Drugs-Commission>

25.2 There are a number of wider issues which require to be given due consideration when dealing with applications. The Board will receive, when appropriate, reports on the needs of tourism in relation to Renfrewshire, from the Council's Director of Communities, Housing and Planning and the Town Centre Action Plan to make sure that these are reflected in the Board's consideration.

25.3 The Board recognises that licensing applications are not, and should not be seen as, a re-run of the planning application process and that there is a clear

separation of the planning and licensing regimes. There will, however, continue to be proper liaison and communication between these two regimes.

- 25.4 In addition, the Board will not attach conditions to a premises licence unless these are considered necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. Conditions will generally be considered unnecessary where these would relate to matters already also covered by other legislation.

26 AVOIDING DUPLICATION

- 26.1 The Board will, so far as possible, avoid duplication with other regulatory regimes such as health and safety at work, fire safety, building standards and planning. However, the Board recognises that there will be areas where responsibilities overlap between the Board and other public authorities or bodies, e.g. the Board's responsibilities under Equalities legislation.

27 CONDITIONS

- 27.1 The Act, in Schedule 3, provides mandatory conditions for premises licences. The Board also has power to impose licence conditions. These conditions will not be inconsistent with or seek to strengthen or restrict mandatory conditions and will only be imposed when considered necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 27.2 In line with the above, the Board have agreed various local conditions to be applied to particular premise type/activities. These are attached at Appendices I, II and III hereof.

28 THE HUMAN RIGHTS ACT 1998

28.1 The Human Rights Act 1998 incorporates the European Convention on Human Rights and makes it unlawful for bodies such as the Board to act in a way which is incompatible with a Convention Right. The Board will have particular regard to the following relevant provisions of the European Convention on Human Rights in respect of its licensing responsibilities:-

- Article 6: that in the determination of civil rights and obligations, everyone is entitled to a fair and public hearing within a reasonable time by an independent and impartial tribunal established by law;
- Article 8: that everyone has the right to respect for their home and private life; and
- Article 1 of the First Protocol: that every person is entitled to the peaceful enjoyment of their possessions including, for example, the possession of a premises licence.

29 EQUALITY

29.1 The Board values and celebrates the diversity that exists within Renfrewshire and wants to ensure that everyone can fully participate in the social, cultural, political and economic life of Renfrewshire.

29.2 The Board opposes all forms of unlawful discrimination including discrimination on the grounds of race, sex, gender reassignment, sexual orientation, age, religion/ belief, pregnancy/ maternity and disability and

recognises that discrimination creates barriers to achieving equality for all people.

29.3 The Equality Act 2010 provides Scottish Ministers with power to impose “specific duties” through regulations on Scottish Public Authorities. The Equality Act 2010 (Specific Duties) (Scotland) Regulations 2012 came into force on 27 May 2012 and can be accessed online at:

29.4 The “specific duties” set by the Scottish Ministers support and enable better performance of the “general duty” which requires public authorities to pay due regard to the need to eliminate unlawful discrimination, advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations as set out in Section 149(1) of the Equality Act 2010.

29.5 Renfrewshire Licensing Board as a public authority is required to publish progress made in mainstreaming the equality duty and a set of equality outcomes in order to meet the requirements of the equality duty. Equality outcomes are defined by the Equality & Human Rights Commission as results intended to achieve specific and identifiable improvements in people’s life chances.

29.6 Reference is made to the Progress Reports on Mainstreaming Equalities and Equality Outcomes of the Board and Renfrewshire Council which are set out

30 ENFORCEMENT, LICENSING STANDARDS OFFICERS AND OTHER SOURCES OF INFORMATION

- 30.1 The Board will follow best practice in enforcement including adoption of the best Regulation Principles and the Hampton Standards, namely, that its actions will be: proportional, accountable, consistent, transparent and targeted.
- 30.2 Renfrewshire Council have appointed Licensing Standards Officers (LSOs) (i) to investigate allegations of unlicensed activities, (ii) to ensure that licence conditions are complied with and (iii) to provide information, guidance and a mediation service. It is a mandatory condition of the Act that the LSOs are fully trained thus enabling them to carry out their functions efficiently. Renfrewshire Council currently employs five officers who hold the statutory appointment of Licensing Standards Officer and have satisfied the above training requirement. However, these officers also require to carry out Civic Government Licensing Enforcement and a range of other regulatory duties. The LSOs are members of the Renfrewshire Licensing Forum.
- 30.3 The Act provides that Licensing Standards Officers' general functions include providing information and guidance; supervising compliance by licence holders with licensing legislation and their licence conditions and providing

mediation. Premises covered by a premises licence are visited by Licensing Standards Officers for their compliance with licensing legislation and licence conditions. Where a premises licence has recently been issued, or where a variation (other than a minor variation) has been granted, Licensing Standards Officers will visit those premises as a priority to ensure compliance with the above requirements.

30.4 The Board recognises that, for members of the public who do not deal with the complexities of the licensing legislation on a daily basis, lodging objections or representations to a licence application (or an application for a review hearing) is likely to be a daunting experience. The Board also recognises that, for those people, the Licensing Standards Officers may be the first contact they have with the licensing authority. The role of Licensing Standards Officers is not to make applications, or objections, on behalf of members of the public, but they are available to offer appropriate support to all parties seeking to be involved in the Board's licensing processes. They will also be able to provide information as to application procedures and may be able to signpost members of the public to helpful resources, such as the Toolkit Resource published by Alcohol Focus Scotland (See Paragraph 14.2).

30.5 The Licensing Standards Officers may be contacted by email at enforcement.licensing.cs@renfrewshire.gov.uk. Where issues are raised with the Licensing Standards Officers which do not relate wholly to licensing matters, the Licensing Standards Officers will be able to provide contact details for other Council Services who may be suitably placed to assist.

- 30.6 Initially, it is anticipated that resources will be targeted towards high-risk premises and activities that require greater attention whilst a lighter touch will be provided in respect of low-risk premises which are well operated.
- 30.7 The Board will liaise closely with its partners to assist licenceholders to comply with the law and the five licensing objectives it seeks to promote. Proportionate but firm action will be taken against those who commit offences. In particular the Board anticipates co-operation with the Police and to share information where appropriate in order to enhance the promotion of the five licensing objectives.
- 30.8 When a matter is submitted to the Board by the Licensing Standards Officer, it is expected, except in the most serious cases, that attempts will already have been made through advice, mediation and negotiation to address the matter. It is, therefore, envisaged that very few such cases will need to be submitted to the Board.
- It should be appreciated, however, that, in appropriate cases, the Board will not hesitate to use its powers to suspend, revoke or vary a licence, notwithstanding that this may have a detrimental impact on the business.

FUNERAL CONDITION

Funeral purveys taking place from 9.30am where alcohol is to be sold require a formal intimation to the Board 24 hours before the function.

APPENDIX II

Local Conditions for Nightclub Type Premises

1. The premises licence holder at all times when the premises are open to the public during the permitted hours shall operate a mechanical or electronic counting system which is capable of accurately recording the number of persons entering and leaving the premises.
2. In relation to the said counting system, the premises licence holder or person or persons appointed by the premises licence holder for that purpose shall at any time upon a request being made by a Police Constable, a Licensing Standards Officer or any member or person authorised in writing by the Licensing Board immediately provide accurate information on the number of persons within the premises.
3. During the licensed hours when the premises are open to the public, the premises licence holder shall have present on the premises stewarding personnel licensed by the Security Industry Authority to provide for the maintenance of public order and the proper management control, safety and the general well being of patrons on the premises.
4. During hours when the premises are open to the public, the premises licence holder shall ensure that empty glasses and bottles from the premises are reasonably cleared from areas to which the public have access. No glasses or bottles shall be permitted in cloakrooms, toilets or on dance floors located in the premises. Sufficient shelves, ledges, tables and counters shall be provided in the premises to accommodate glasses and bottles for collection. It is recommended that any receptacles used in the premises are made of plastic.
5. A person trained to the satisfaction of the Licensing Board in administering first aid must be present on the premises from the initial time of opening the premises to the public.
6. The premises licence holder shall prominently display at the entrance to the premises a noticeboard with a warning in the following terms:-

WARNING

DRUGS AND OFFENSIVE WEAPONS

Under no circumstances will the use of illegal drugs or the carrying of offensive weapons be permitted on these premises.

As part of our commitment to our customers and to achieve a safe and drug free environment, all persons entering these premises are liable to be asked as a condition of entry to submit to a search.

If you are found in possession of drugs or offensive weapons, these will be taken from you and the Police will be informed.

7. Unless there are good reasons for not implementing a search policy in relation to all patrons which reasons shall have been intimated to the Licensing Board in advance of any change in practice, the premises licence holder shall implement a system of searching of all patrons at the point of entry using appropriate search techniques.

APPENDIX III

Local Conditions for Premises Offering Alcohol Deliveries

1. A robust age verification policy requires to be in place for deliveries that include alcohol and must be strictly adhered to by all delivery staff, incorporating a Challenge 25 approach. Documentation presented as verification of age requires to be of a type prescribed in the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 or Regulations under that Act as suitable for that purpose.
2. An order register must be kept on the premises containing details of the items ordered/ despatched, with details of when the order was placed and when the alcohol was despatched.
3. A delivery/refusal register requires to be maintained by the delivery driver containing details of the person accepting delivery or, if delivery was refused, the reason for any refusals.
4. No delivery of alcohol should be left unattended or with children or young persons where there is no adult available to accept delivery.

Renfrewshire Licensing Board requires to carry out a detailed consultation exercise in relation to review of its Statement of Licensing Policy. The Statement of Licensing Policy will set out the policy on which the Licensing Board will base their decisions on how they regulate the sale of alcohol in Renfrewshire. The policy will have to be published by early November 2023 and will apply until 2027, when a further, update policy is due to be prepared for later publication.

The formal consultation is now open and responses are required by **Friday 21st July 2023**.

Prior to the current consultation, the Licensing Board undertook an initial, informal consultation exercise between December 2022 and February 2023 to obtain a range of views as to what should be included in their new licensing policy. Following that initial, informal consultation, a draft Statement of Licensing Policy, with some necessary updating, has been prepared for the purposes of consultation. In addition, the Board have approved this consultation document to assist consultees in responding. The Board would welcome comments from those who wish to respond in relation to the issues set out below. However, consultees may wish to comment on other matters contained in, or which they believe should be covered by, the policy statement, in addition to the matters below.

The Board requires to have regard to statutory guidance in exercising its functions. This statutory guidance can be accessed at the link below. Chapters 4 and 5 of this guidance relate to licensing policy statements and overprovision assessments (which form part of licensing policy statements). The Board is now consulting on both matters in tandem.

The Board will welcome views on all aspects of its existing Statement of Licensing Policy, but would welcome views on the below matters which have been highlighted in its initial consultation exercise. Consultees should note that the Board's policy requires to seek to promote the five licensing objectives, which are: preventing crime and disorder; securing public safety; preventing public nuisance; protecting and improving public health, and protecting children and young persons from harm.

Overprovision Assessment in relation to Licensed Premises

In response to the initial, informal consultation, responses were received from a number of parties as to whether overprovision of licensed premises exists in any locality in Renfrewshire. The Board in its existing policy declares an area in Paisley Town Centre overprovided, in respect of pub type premises used predominantly or exclusively for the sale of alcohol (this does not include restaurant, hotel or nightclub premises).

Following consideration of responses to the initial, informal consultation, the Board decided to select the localities listed below for the purposes of this formal consultation. The Board therefore is seeking views as to whether these areas are overprovided in terms of licensed premises and, if so, whether they are overprovided in terms of all licensed premises or premises of a particular type: e.g., off-sales only premises (where alcohol is sold for consumption off the premises) or on-sales premises. Consultees should state which types of premises they consider overprovided: this may be more specific to the type of operation provided at any premises, for example: pub type premises; nightclubs; supermarkets; convenience stores, etc. If you are responding as a local resident, or on behalf of particular local residents, the Board would welcome your views in relation to whether there may be overprovision, of all licensed premises or of particular type(s) of licensed premises, within any area listed below in which you live.

Consultees should note that, when the Board decides whether overprovision exists in any locality, it must have regard to the number and capacity of licensed premises there and now may also consider other matters, such as the licensed hours of those premises.

In this regard, consultees may wish to consider the information set out in the statutory guidance at the above link, particularly at Paragraphs 5.26 to 5.30 which may assist them. The Board seeks to gather robust evidence from consultees during this process to inform its new overprovision assessment.

Plans showing each of the localities agreed for this consultation with information on numbers of premises, capacities and licensed hours may be viewed at

The Board would also welcome views from any consultees on whether any exceptions should be provided within the terms of its policy, should it find overprovision, to allow potential applicants for a licence to consider what information would assist the Board in deciding whether to make an exception to any overprovision policy. Consultees should note that the effect of an overprovision policy is to create a rebuttable presumption against the grant of a licence application in a locality. It would remain open to an applicant for a licence, in an area considered overprovided, to seek to persuade the Licensing Board that their application should still be granted, as an exception to the policy.

Children's Access

In response to the initial, informal consultation, Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership have suggested that clear and explicit guidance should be provided within the new policy as to when alcohol should be excluded within premises used by “young people”, such as libraries, hairdressers and sports facilities.

The Licensing Board considers applications for the sale of alcohol. Unless alcohol is to be sold, within the meaning of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005, the Board is unable to regulate these matters. Consultees should note that any application for a licence requires to be considered against the grounds set out in the licensing legislation and on the basis of the information before the Board. However, consultees may wish to provide views on what measures licensed premises should take to promote the licensing objective of protecting children and young persons from harm in premises where children (0-15 years) and young persons (16-17 years) may be present.

Equally, consultees may wish to set out any proposed changes in relation to when children and young persons should be able to access licensed premises and the hours during which they may do so and the parts of premises they may access. Any such change would however not amend the children and young person's access to existing licensed premises.

Licensed Hours

The following issues have been raised in response to the initial, informal consultation, upon which the views of consultees are sought:-

- Should the commencement of off sales hours on a Sunday be restricted to 11am in relation to future licensing applications? (currently, premises can enjoy the statutory commencement hour of 10am).
- Should a policy be introduced restricting the licensed hours for new off-sales licensing applications until an earlier hour than 10pm (if so, please specify what suitable policy hours would be). In the event of such a change of policy, should the policy provide for any exception to that policy that an applicant is able to seek hours until 10pm if they can persuade the Board this is not inconsistent with the licensing objectives (having regard to factors such as the control measures in place at the premises to promote the licensing objectives)?

Alcohol Deliveries

The Board's current Statement of Licensing Policy, when agreed and published in 2018, introduced new conditions for premises providing home deliveries of alcohol. These conditions are in the following terms:

1. A robust age verification policy requires to be in place for deliveries that include alcohol and must be strictly adhered to by all delivery staff, incorporating a Challenge 25 approach. Documentation presented as verification of age requires to be of a type prescribed in the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 or Regulations under that Act as suitable for that purpose.
2. An order register must be kept on the premises containing details of the items ordered/ despatched, with details of when the order was placed and when the alcohol was despatched.
3. A delivery/refusal register requires to be maintained by the delivery driver containing details of the person accepting delivery or, if delivery was refused, the reason for any refusals.

4. No delivery of alcohol should be left unattended or with children or young persons where there is no adult available to accept delivery.

Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership have suggested possible changes to these conditions. The Board would therefore welcome views from consultees as follows:

- Should condition 1 above in relation to alcohol deliveries be extended to state: (i) that drivers employed at licensed premises should be trained in relation to the Challenge 25 age verification process to the same level as staff who require to be trained to sell alcohol on the premises, and required to undertake this process when delivering alcohol; and (ii) that, if a third party provides the delivery service, it is the premises licence holder's responsibility to ensure that the third party follows the Challenge 25 age verification process when delivering items including alcohol?
- Should condition 4 in relation to alcohol deliveries be extended to state that alcohol must also not be left with any person who is visibly intoxicated?

Occasional Licences

In their response to the initial, informal consultation, Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership request that governance around events should be strengthened to encourage "no alcohol events" where an event involves children and young persons such as football award ceremonies, school fetes and sporting events. The views of consultees are sought as to whether the current policy should be reviewed to set out how the Board may approach any application for the licensing of such events and, if so, what that approach should be. (Consultees should note that, in the absence of representation on an application received, the Board is required to grant an occasional licence).

Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership also state that they support an approach that any applicant who repeatedly applies for occasional licences should submit an application for a premises licence after a period of 13 weeks.

While limits on the number and duration of occasional licences have been consulted upon at a national level, no statutory limits on these have yet been introduced.

Views are sought however as to whether repeated applications, which are not in relation to specific events and which relate to activities occurring on premises in similar or identical terms regularly over a period of at least 3 months, should be referred to the Licensing Board for a decision. Consultees may also wish to comment on how any change to the policy in this regard should be introduced for premises

which have already been operating on a series of occasional licences and whether any latitude should be allowed to premises who can demonstrate that they have required to continue applying for occasional licences for a longer period due to circumstances outwith their control.

Separately, while not raised directly during the initial consultation, views are sought from consultees in relation to the licensing of external drinking areas, which are usually licensed in Renfrewshire by way of an application for an occasional licence. A practice has arisen where a number of additional conditions of licence have been requested by Licensing Standards Officers and attached to many of these licences. The conditions of licence usually applied are as follows:

1. *That the occasional licence be prominently displayed at point of sale.*
2. *That staff are either personal licence holders or have completed the 2 hours statutory staff training and staff training records are available on the premises for inspection.*
3. *That a Notice at point of entry to the premises clearly states the access policy in relation to children and young persons in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.*
4. *Where deliveries of alcohol are provided the following requirements must be met:-*
 - (a) A robust age verification policy is required to be in place for deliveries that include alcohol and must strictly be adhered to by all delivery staff, incorporating a Challenge 25 approach. Documentation presented as verification of age requires to be of a type prescribed in the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 or Regulations under the Act as suitable for that purpose.*
 - (b) An order register must be kept on the premises containing details of the items ordered/despached, with details of when the order was placed and when the alcohol was despached.*
 - (c) A delivery/refusal register requires to be maintained by the delivery driver containing details of the person accepting delivery or, if delivery was refused, the reason for the refusals.*
 - (d) No delivery of alcohol should be left unattended or with children or young persons where there is no adult available to accept delivery.*
5. *That all alcohol is consumed by patrons in the outside drinking area agreed in the layout plan as supplied by the applicant.*
6. *That all drinks must be sold in plastic or toughened glass receptacles. All bottled drinks must be decanted into such receptacles.*

7. *That no alcohol is to be removed from the designated outside drinking area as outlined in the plan attached to the licence. The area boundary must be clearly defined by a physical barrier, with clear signage indicating that no alcohol may be removed. The designated outside drinking area shall be supervised by staff at all times.*
8. *That all customers must be seated. No vertical drinking shall be allowed.*
9. *That a notice to be easily legible located at point of exit to remind customers to be respectful of neighbouring residents / property on leaving the area to reduce noise and litter to prevent nuisance of anti-social behaviour.*

In addition, in relation to a number of external drinking areas, again licensed usually by way of an occasional licence, a condition of licence is often requested by Police Scotland restricting the terminal hour relating to the external licensed area, usually until 9pm, particularly in town centre areas. Such a condition has been attached to numerous occasional licences for the purpose of preventing public nuisance.

The views of consultees in relation to whether any or all of the above additional conditions should now be formally introduced within the new policy would be welcomed. The Board would welcome any explanation from consultees as to why these conditions should be adopted as a matter of policy with reference to the above licensing objectives.

Miscellaneous

The views of consultees more generally on the Board's current Statement of Licensing Policy will be welcomed. Other general comments received during the informal consultation were to suggest that the new policy might, in addition to the above matters, provide further information about joint working initiatives involving the Licensing Board and provide information about wider strategies. Consultees should feel free to comment further on these and any other relevant matters.

Equality Outcomes and Mainstreaming Progress Report

1. Introduction

1.1 Renfrewshire Licensing Board has a statutory duty to report on progress in achieving its agreed set of equality outcomes and mainstreaming the general equality duty, by 30th April 2023. The report attached at Appendix 1 includes a report on progress in respect of both these matters.

2 Background

2.1 The Board has a General Equality Duty, which requires it to pay due regard to the need to eliminate unlawful discrimination, advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations as set out in section 149(1) of the Equality Act 2010. There are a number of specific duties laid out for public authorities in regulations made under the Act to support the General Equality Duty. These include the duties set out above, at Paragraph 1.1.

2.2 In terms of these specific duties, the Board is required to report its progress on mainstreaming equality and on its equality outcomes by 30th April 2023, as well as to publish gender pay gap information. The Board does not, however, employ staff in its own right, as all staff who provide support to the Licensing Board are employed by Renfrewshire Council. The Licensing Board previously approved three equality outcomes at its meeting on 15th March 2021, as detailed at Paragraph 2.4 below.

2.3 The Progress Report at Appendix 1 provides a single report to provide an update on the Board's progress. The Board is asked to agree to publication of this report to meet its duties to report on progress publicly and in an accessible manner. The report provides information, at Paragraphs 3 to 10, as to what action has been taken to mainstream the Board's general equality duty in the reporting period from 2021-2023. The report also details progress in meeting the Board's equality outcomes, which were published in April 2021.

2.4 The Board's existing equality outcomes are as follows:


- i) Service users across the equality groups are positive and engaged with the Licensing services;
- ii) The licensing process is accessible for all people with protected characteristics;

iii) The Board works with partners to improve access to licensed premises by people with protected characteristics.

2.5 The report details the Board's progress on equalities across the Board's licensing functions. Key highlights of this progress include: widespread public engagement on an ongoing basis during consultation processes to include representatives of those with protected characteristics; modernisation of processes and improved public engagement to ensure licensing procedures remain accessible to relevant stakeholders, and an updated local profile for gambling policy in relation to children and vulnerable people

3. Recommendations

3.1 The Board is requested to note the progress documented within the attached report at Appendix 1 and agree publication.

RENFREWSHIRE LICENSING BOARD'S PROGRESS REPORT ON MAINSTREAMING EQUALITIES AND DELIVERING EQUALITIES OUTCOMES FOR THE PERIOD 2021-2023

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Renfrewshire Licensing Board ("the Board"), as a listed Public Authority, is required to report progress made in mainstreaming the equality duty and in achieving its equality outcomes which were last published in 2021.
- 1.2 This report provides information on the actions agreed to deliver these equality outcomes, along with information on progress the Board has made to make its general equality duty integral to the exercise of its functions. Equality outcomes are defined as results intended to achieve, through the exercise of the authority's functions, one or more of the needs of the general equality duty.
- 1.3 This report also provides other information that the Board is required to publish by 30th April 2023.
- 1.4 The report meets our duties to report the above information, publicly and in an accessible manner. The report, and other Board policies, are available on the Board's web pages and can be reproduced in another format on request.

2. OUR DUTIES

- 2.1 The Board is fully committed to embedding equality into all our functions. The Equality Act 2010 ("the 2010 Act") protects people from unfair treatment and asks public bodies like the Board to show how they make a positive difference to different groups of people. The 2010 Act brings together forty years of equality legislation and covers "protected characteristics", which include:
 - Age
 - Disability
 - Gender reassignment
 - Pregnancy and maternity
 - Race
 - Religion and belief
 - Sex
 - Sexual orientation
 - Marriage/ civil partnership
- 2.2 We usually refer to people covered by the protected characteristics as

“equality groups”. The 2010 Act requires that listed public authorities, such as the Board, take account of the need to:

- Eliminate discrimination, harassment and victimisation;
- Advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not;
- Foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.

In respect of marriage/ civil partnership, only the first of these three duties applies.

2.3 The Act also requires the Board to publish a set of equality outcomes every four years. We last did this in 2021.

3. THE BOARD

3.1 Although the Board has a separate legal status from Renfrewshire Council, members of the Licensing Board are Renfrewshire Councillors appointed to the Board by Renfrewshire Council. Renfrewshire Council's progress report on mainstreaming equality and equality outcomes will also be available on the Council's website, once agreed and published.

3.2 The Board currently consists of ten Renfrewshire Councillors, who were elected to serve on the Board by the Council at its first statutory meeting following the local government election in May 2022. Currently, seven of these Councillors are men and three are women. (Prior to the election of new Councillors to the Board in 2022, five Councillors were men and five were women).

3.3 The legal and administrative support to the Board is provided by employees of Renfrewshire Council. None of the Renfrewshire Council employees who support the Licensing Board do so exclusively. The Board meets using Renfrewshire Council's facilities and services, either in person at the Council's Headquarters or using remote or hybrid means.

3.4 Therefore, the action and information which will be set out in the Council's progress report detailed above once published, in so far as relevant to Council employees and access to Council services, applies equally in relation to the Licensing Board. The close connection between the Board and the Council affords the opportunity to benefit directly from the actions already taken or proposed by the Council to ensure that the Council and Board fulfil their legislative equality obligations by creating a culture which fosters good relations and values diversity, promotes equality and tackles discrimination.

3.5 The detailed information at Paragraphs 3 to 10 of this report illustrates a range of activities and actions that have been undertaken by Renfrewshire Licensing Board to mainstream equalities. Paragraph 11 of this report provides further information in relation to the progress made to date by the

Board in meeting the equality outcomes previously agreed, for the period 2021 to 2023. The Equality Act 2010 (Specific Duties) (Scotland) Regulations 2012, as amended, which legally require this information to be published, also require listed authorities to gather and use employee information, to publish gender pay gap information and to publish statements on equal pay. However, as stated at Paragraph 3.3 above, the Board does not employ any officers of its own. Any officers who assist the Board are employees of Renfrewshire Council, which requires to publish this information in relation to all employees under these Regulations.

4. GOVERNANCE, ACCOUNTABILITY AND POLICY

- 4.1 Renfrewshire Licensing Board is fully committed to actively embedding equality across all its functions and decision making processes, ensuring equality becomes part of the structure, behaviour and culture of the Board. The Board ensures that all customers and partners are treated fairly and with respect at all times. The Board published its last report on mainstreaming equalities in April 2021 and also published a new set of equality outcomes at that time.
- 4.2 The Board is achieving its commitment to equality with clear governance and accountability arrangements as follows:
- 4.2.1 The Licensing Board is constituted in terms of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 ("the Act"). The Board is entrusted with the administration of liquor licensing. It is also responsible for the licensing of gambling premises and other gaming activities in Scotland in terms of the Gambling Act 2005.
- 4.2.2 The Board's meetings are held in public, but deliberations can be in private. All decisions taken by the Board must be made in public and the Minutes containing these decisions, once approved, are published on the Board's web pages, ensuring that these are accessible to people, including those with protected characteristics.
- 4.2.3 The Board is required in terms of Section 6 of the Act to prepare and publish a Statement of Licensing Policy with respect to the exercise of their functions under the Act. In preparing such a statement, or supplementary statement, the Board must ensure that:
- (i) the policy set out in the Statement seeks to promote the licensing objectives; and
 - (ii) it consults the Local Licensing Forum for the Board's area, the relevant health board in terms of the Act and such other persons as the Board thinks appropriate.

As the requirement to prepare and publish a Statement of Licensing Policy (hereinafter, "Statement") is aligned to local government elections, the Board last did so in 2018 and consulted widely on the proposed terms of the policy.

The Board is currently in the process of preparing its next Statement and has already carried out an initial, informal consultation. In order to assess the impact of its new policy against the needs set out in Paragraph 2.2 above, the Board has been asked to agree to now consult, in particular, the following individuals and organisations who represent people with protected characteristics, as well as the Renfrewshire Community Planning Partnership:

- p) Renfrewshire Rising

- r) Renfrewshire Youth Voice
- s) ROAR Connections for Life
- t) Soroptomist Paisley
- u) TransForm Renfrewshire
- v) West of Scotland Regional Equality Council (WSREC)
- w) Women's Aid
- x) YouFirst Advocacy

4.2.4 At the time it agreed its current Statement of Licensing Policy in 2018, the Board agreed new licensing conditions in relation to deliveries of alcohol from licensed premises, designed to seek in particular to protect children and young persons from harm, by introducing checks and safeguards around alcohol deliveries. The Board has, during the consultation process so far in relation to its next Statement, been asked to seek views on whether these conditions should be supplemented or amended. The existing Statement meantime also continues to recognise that the licensing process is a daunting experience for members of the public and continues to provide information about available assistance and resources.

4.2.5 The Board also provides in its current Statement, as a general rule, that only those applications and matters which by statute are required to be considered by the Board will be submitted to the Board and all other applications will be determined by the Clerk and Depute Clerks to, or in some cases two Members of, the Board. This is to avoid people, such as those with protected

characteristics, being required to attend a hearing where this can be avoided. Details of matters which require to be considered by the Licensing Board at a hearing are set out within the terms of the Statement of Licensing Policy. Those matters which are determined under delegated powers are reported to the next meeting of the Board and, as such, are accessible in the Agenda for that meeting and in the Minute of the meeting, once approved. These are all published on the Board's web pages.

4.2.6 The Board also agreed, in November 2021, a Statement of Principles under Section 349 of the Gambling Act 2005 to cover the three year period from 31st January 2022. In respect of the statutory review of this policy, the Board again consulted more widely than required by this legislation and similarly sought views from a wide range of consultees representative of equality groups.

4.2.7 The Licensing Board will consider any requests for reasonable adjustments by a disabled person to enable them to participate in a hearing. The Board has recognised that it now has increased flexibility in this regard since new provisions contained in the Coronavirus (Recovery and Reform) (Scotland) Act 2022 came into force in early October 2022. These provisions now require the Board to consult with parties intending to attend a hearing at a meeting of the Board and to seek their views as to the format of the meeting/ hearing. This process ensures that any parties with protected characteristics have an opportunity to express how they wish to participate before a decision is made as to the format of a meeting/ hearing in consultation with the Convener of the Board.

4.2.8 As set out in the Licensing Board's Statement of Licensing Policy, the Board is committed to actively embedding equality across all its functions and decision-making processes. The Statement of Licensing Policy continues to state that:

"29.1 The Board values and celebrates the diversity that exists within Renfrewshire and wants to ensure that everyone can fully participate in the social, cultural, political and economic life of Renfrewshire.

29.2 The Board opposes all forms of unlawful discrimination including discrimination on the grounds of race, sex, gender reassignment, sexual orientation, age, religion/belief, pregnancy/ maternity and disability and recognises that discrimination creates barriers to achieving equality for all people."

The Board's Statement of Licensing Policy also contains a link to this progress report.

4.2.9 The Board now requires a Disabled Access and Facilities Statement (DAFS) to accompany a valid application for a new licence or provisional licence for premises, following upon a change to the 2005 Act. The Board will make any DAFS available to members of the public, where this document exists. The purpose of DAFSs is to make members of the public aware of the disabled access and facilities within liquor licensed premises.

5. ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT TO THE LICENSING BOARD

- 5.1 All Licensing Board Members are elected Councillors and all Licensing Board staff are employed by Renfrewshire Council, as stated at Paragraphs 3.2, 3.3 and 3.5 above.
- 5.2 The Clerk to the Licensing Board is the Head of Corporate Governance. The Depute Clerks to the Board are solicitors based within Legal and Democratic Services. All staff dealing with applications on behalf of the Licensing Board are based within the Licensing Section of Legal and Democratic Services. The Council has a statutory duty to employ a Licensing Standards Officer (LSO). Renfrewshire Council employs a number of officers able to carry out the role of LSO. However, these officers, who are based in a wider enforcement team within the Council, also require to carry out a range of other regulatory tasks.
- 5.3 The Board is committed to ongoing development for both Board members and staff with the right skills, capabilities and knowledge to deliver the licensing service. In particular:
- Equalities training is made available to all new Board members.
 - All licensing staff and Licensing Standards Officers complete training on equality and diversity using the Council's iLearn Training Package.
 - All licensing staff, and Board Members, have access to the Council's intranet site, which provides information and guidance on equality to increase awareness. They can also access guidance on HR policies relevant to equality.

6. PARTNERSHIP WORKING

- 6.1 The Board is committed to working in partnership with a wide range of statutory and community organisations together with representatives of the trade and local community to promote the licensing objectives which underpin all of the Board's decision-making processes.
- 6.2 The Board has worked to maintain and strengthen existing partnerships to support the mainstreaming of equality. The Board is required to meet with the Licensing Forum annually, but licensing updates are given to the Forum, when available, from the Licensing Standards Officers, who are represented at all Forum meetings, and the Depute Clerk who attends those meetings as required. The Licensing Forum is the medium through which the Board can engage with representatives of all parts of the community, including those with protected characteristics, to ensure that community views are taken into account in the development of Board policies and guidelines. The Forum requires to be representative of a wide range of interests, including persons

having functions related to health, education or social work and young persons.

- 6.3 As stated at Paragraphs 4.2.3 and 4.2.6 above, the Board consulted widely in relation to the most recent review of its gambling licensing policy statement and will consult widely in relation to the ongoing review of its liquor licensing policy statement. Such consultations are also published on the Council's website to maximise engagement from the public in the consultation process.

7. EQUAL ACCESS TO SERVICES

- 7.1 The Board's services continue to be delivered having regard to an approach which provides for mainstreaming the equality duty.

For example:

- All meetings of the Board either take place in the Council Chamber at Renfrewshire House or by remote or hybrid means, following consultation with all persons intending to be heard, as set out at Paragraph 4.2.7. Any applicant who requires to attend in person to submit a licensing application or make a personal enquiry in relation to an application would attend the Council's Customer Service Centre situated within Renfrewshire House which continues to be accessible to people with access needs, in respect of its public areas.
- The Board meets in public (although consideration of applications may take place in private) and all the decisions are made in public. Where hearings require to take place, the Board will attempt to make the experience as informal as possible consistent with the carrying out of the Board's quasi judicial function. The Minutes setting out the decisions made are, once approved by the Board, also published on the Council's website.

8. INCREASING PARTICIPATION AND INVOLVEMENT

- 8.1 The Board seeks to ensure that everyone involved with the licensing process has an equal chance of participating as valued members of a diverse population, including people with protected characteristics. Progress includes:

- The Board's Statement of Licensing Policy sets out information on measures which Licence holders may use to promote the five licensing objectives. All applicants for premises licences are requested to submit information along with their application which demonstrates how licence holders intend to promote the licensing objectives in relation to their licensed premises. This expectation is formalised in the Board's current Statement of Licensing Policy.
- All applicants for new licences are required to include a Disabled Access and Facilities Statement with their application. These Statements may be inspected by the public and are designed to inform them as to what access and facilities licensed premises offer to disabled people.

- The Board actively supports the work of the Licensing Forum by consulting regularly with the Forum. The Depute Clerk to the Licensing Board attends meetings of the Forum as required.
- To ensure an understanding and experience of protected characteristics, Board Members will consider attendance at appropriate events. Members of the Board have previously attended events organised by local health professionals and by Police Scotland. The current Board membership was elected in 2022 and has not yet had the opportunities previously available to Board Members, in the aftermath of the coronavirus pandemic.
- Reviews of the Board's liquor and gambling licensing policies continue to involve extended consultations, which include seeking views of groups representative of people with protected characteristics, as further detailed at Paragraphs 4.2.3 and 4.2.6 above.
- In relation to the reviews of the Statement of Principles under the Gambling Act 2005 which were previously undertaken in 2018 and 2021, the Board sought information to update its local profile. This profile sets out information on: areas with a concentration of households with dependant children; locations of schools; and locations of premises used by vulnerable adults (such as those with learning disabilities, mental health problems or addictions). The current profile also contains information on centres for youth activities, including LGBT+ activities. The information within this profile is designed to assist the gambling industry and members of the public who may wish to raise concerns about licensing applications for gambling premises. Any concerns raised on an application would be considered at a hearing before the Licensing Board.
- The Board's Statement of Licensing Policy for liquor licensing and Statement of Principles for gambling, application forms and information on licensing are all published on the Renfrewshire Council website which meets accessibility standards.
- The language line telephone system and Contact Scotland BSL online interpreter service are accessible on demand and available to the Licensing section at the Council's Customer Service Centre.
- This document and other policies of the Board are available in alternative formats on request.

9. DECISIONS OF THE LICENSING BOARD

- 9.1 The Board requires to make decisions in relation to licence applications and reviews before it in accordance with the statutory grounds set out in the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005. The grounds of refusal and review do not include any reference to equality issues.

- 9.2 However, where nuisance or anti-social behaviour is caused by misuse of alcohol, then the sale/supply of alcohol could be a relevant factor in that misuse. The Board, when provided with appropriate information about the misuse, may consider using its powers appropriately in the circumstances to ensure that negative impact is removed with appropriate actions and decisions. In hearings before the Board since its last progress report on mainstreaming equality and meeting the equality outcomes, the Board has had regard to negative impacts of alcohol misuse including allegedly harmful behaviour towards people with particular protected characteristics, such as age. The Board has received applications, objections and reviews from diverse groups, including Police Scotland and local residents.
- 9.3 The Board has also, in relation to applications considered by them, examined carefully the terms of the children and young persons' access sought in the application. This has resulted in the extent of the children's and young persons' access being restricted in some cases. The Board has also, in relation to applications before it, attached conditions in relation to home deliveries requiring age verification checks and that alcohol is not left unattended, in accordance with the Board's Statement. These restrictions and conditions were agreed by the Board to protect children and young people from harm. Equally, the Board has restricted the hours applicable to a number of external drinking areas, having regard to the potential impact on neighbouring residents.

10. GATHERING EQUALITY INFORMATION AND EVIDENCE

- 10.1 The Licensing Section within Renfrewshire Council, which provides administrative support to the Board, is committed to continuous improvement which ensures excellent service delivery and customer care to a diverse population and people with protected characteristics. As the Board's administration is carried out by Renfrewshire Council staff the Board has access to equality evidence and information being gathered by the Council to support the impact assessment process, plan, design and delivery of services.
- 10.2 Application processes have integrated equality monitoring surveys.
- 10.3 The Board benefits from wider consultation carried out by Renfrewshire Council, which has gathered its own monitoring data to understand better who our citizens are and how their needs can best be met. The Council engages with representative and individual equality groups to ascertain what activities need to take place and how success may be measured.

11. RENFREWSHIRE LICENSING BOARD'S EQUALITY OUTCOMES 2021-2025: PROGRESS

- 11.1 In line with the statutory equality duties Renfrewshire Licensing Board as a public authority is required to publish a set of evidence based equality outcomes every four years. The Board last published equality outcomes in

2021, for the period 2021 to 2025. The Board also requires to publish a report on the progress it has made to achieve its equality outcomes every two years.

11.2 In 2021, Renfrewshire Licensing Board developed three equality outcomes, as listed below:

- i) Service users across the equality groups are positive and engaged with the Licensing services;
- ii) The licensing process is accessible for all people with protected characteristics;
- iii) The Board works with partners to improve access to licensed premises by people with protected characteristics.

11.3 The information in this section is structured in line with the Board's three equality outcomes as agreed in 2021 and details progress against the actions identified to achieve these outcomes.

11.3.1 Equality Outcome 1: Service users across the equality groups are positive and engaged with the Licensing services

Success Measures:

This outcome had been adopted in the Board's first set of equality outcomes, developed for the period 2013-2017. As the initial level of responses from new licence holders to equality monitoring questionnaires was low, the outcome was retained for the period 2017-2021, during which an improvement in responses was noted, as set out in the report published for the period from 2017-2019.

The onset of the coronavirus pandemic in early 2020 and subsequent periods of lockdown impacted adversely on the progress previously made in relation to the collection of this information. Officers have recently refreshed the equality monitoring process and have as a result received some responses from licence applicants covering the period since April 2021. A summary of these responses is attached at Annexe 1 to this report. The Board will continue to collect this information for the Board in the period to April 2025. It is anticipated that this will enable a representative sample of responses to be reported to the Board at that time.

The Board required, in 2021, to undertake its gambling policy statement review and is currently carrying out the latest review of its Statement of Licensing Policy in relation to alcohol licensing. The Board continues to consult widely in relation to these reviews and, in addition to consulting all premises licence holders and various other consultees with an interest in these licensing systems, the Board has included in its full consultations a number of individuals and groups representative of people with protected characteristics, in order to identify any adverse equality impacts. Further

information in relation to these consultations is set out at Paragraphs 4.2.3 and 4.2.6 above.

As set out at Paragraph 8.1 above, the Board agreed in its Statement of Gambling Principles for the period 2022 to 2025 to update its profile in relation to locations of schools and of various facilities to support people with protected characteristics and other relevant information to assist the Board and the public with regard to the exercise of the Board's gambling functions.

Disability Access Facilities Statements (DAFSs) for a number of (liquor) licensed premises are published on the licensing web pages, allowing members of the public to obtain information from the Board in relation to licensed premises as to the access to and facilities in licensed premises for disabled people. While not all DAFSs provided to the Board to date have been published online at this time following upon the coronavirus pandemic, further information in this regard will be published in the period to April 2025.

11.3.2 Equality Outcome 2: The licensing process is accessible for all people with protected characteristics

Success Measures:

This equality outcome was introduced by the Board in April 2021. At that time, emergency coronavirus legislation was in place (and had been in use for several months) which, for the first time, allowed hearings before the Licensing Board to take place by virtual means. The Board continued, from that date, to engage with relevant stakeholders, including the licensed trade, solicitors and other members of the public, such as objectors, to ensure that proceedings before the Board were able to be conducted in a fair and inclusive way to meet the needs of all parties.

While the emergency legislation allowed meetings to take place either in-person or remotely, all meetings of the Board until early 2023 (with the exception of the joint meeting of the Board and Licensing Forum in late 2022) took place by entirely remote means.

The emergency legislation was replaced on 1st October 2022 by the Coronavirus (Recovery and Reform) (Scotland) Act 2022. This new legislation requires parties intending to participate in business before the Board to be consulted as to their preferred format for any meeting/ hearing. In anticipation of the new legislation coming into force, the Board agreed a procedure in September 2022 to allow decisions on these matters to be made in consultation with the Convener of the Board. This allows parties to raise any issues they may have, for example in relation to disability or age, regarding the format of a meeting/ hearing prior to a decision on these matters being made. The Board has already required to take views in this regard into account when deciding the format of proceedings.

The Board's officers, where hearings are to take place using remote facilities, have offered all parties intending to participate an opportunity of a test meeting to ensure that they are able to connect and take part without issues.

In addition to the introduction of online Licensing Board meetings, the Board and its officers have also, in the period from April 2021, made increasing use of online meetings and facilities. The mandatory training of Board Members, following the election of the new Licensing Board in 2022, was delivered using a combination of videoconferencing facilities and an online examination platform. The Board's officers worked closely with the training provider and relevant Council Services to ensure that the training of Board Members could be delivered in an efficient and inclusive manner suitable to their needs, within the relevant statutory timescale, to allow Board Members to participate in meetings of the Board.

11.3.3 Equality Outcome 3: The Board works with partners to improve access to licensed premises by people with protected characteristics

Success Measures:

The Board's Licensing Standards Officers previously visited licensed premises routinely. While, since the coronavirus pandemic, visits are no longer arranged on a rolling basis, these officers continue, when visiting licensed premises, to give consideration to whether licensed premises are accessible to those who may have disabilities or other access needs.


These officers have in previous years worked with Police Scotland to promote public safety messages with a view to improving the safety of all people within Renfrewshire, but particularly people with protected characteristics who may be potentially vulnerable travelling home from licensed premises. The opportunities for joint working with partner agencies ceased during the pandemic and have not yet recovered. However, meetings of the Pubwatch group have recommenced and have been attended by Licensing Standards Officers. The Board's legal officers attend regular meetings of the SOLAR Licensing Group, comprising local government licensing solicitors from across Scotland, which can include presentations by third party invitees on an ad hoc basis which can be relevant to equality issues.

The Board will explore available opportunities to work with partners to improve access to licensed premises by people with protected characteristics between the publication of this report and April 2025.








